

The undermentioned have been awarded a Clasp to their Distinguished Conduct Medal for subsequent acts of conspicuous gallantry:—

5516 Company Serjeant-Major J. W. Lawn, 1st Battalion, King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on the 29th September, 1915, south of Hohenzollern Redoubt, when he assisted in repulsing counter-attacks on the trenches. His cheerfulness, courage and devotion throughout the day exercised the greatest influence over all ranks, and inspired them with confidence under the most trying circumstances.

9409 Acting Company Serjeant-Major A. Stringer, 2nd Battalion, Bedfordshire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry on the 30th September, 1915, in front of Hulluch. Acting Company Serjeant-Major Stringer handled his bomb throwers with great skill and courage both in counter-attacking the enemy, who had gained a footing in the gun trench, and in repelling further vigorous attacks made by them. His devotion to duty was most marked.
