**T**He 1200 Soldiers who arrived here some days ago from *Naples*, are landed, and marched towards *Milan*. The loss of two Gallies of the Duke of *Turfs* Squadron is confirmed by Letters from himself, wherein he gives an account, That being bound hither from *Barcelona*, with Soldiers for the Service of the *Milaneze*, they were surpris'd by a violent Storm off of *St. Firrenzo*, during which the Gallies called the *Spinola* and *St. Marie* foundred at Sea, and most of their Men were lost; and that the rest of the Gallies are put into *Corsica*.

*Milan*, Decemb. 16. Our Governour upon the Advice he has received that the French are retired out of *Piedmont*, has ordered the Spanish Troops (who remained together in a Body on the Frontiers to hinder the Enemy from sending Relief to *Casal*) to separate and to march to their Winter-Quarters. The German Troops who are to Winter in the Dutchies of *Mantua*, *Modena*, and *Parma*, will now in few days begin their march thither; and in the mean time we hear that the Contributions for their subsistence are fully agreed with those Princes. Part of the Recruits we expected from *Naples* are landed at *Genoua*, and are on their march hither; and the rest will soon follow.

*Venice*, Decemb. 18. This week arrived at the *Lido* several new raised Companies of Foot, in order to embark on the next Convoy that goes to the *Levant*, where the Venetians propose to reinforce their Army very considerably against the next Campagne. Signior *Venier*, now Ambassador of this Republick at the Court of *France*, is appointed to go with the same

Character to *Spain*, in the place of Signior *Ruzzini*, who is to remove from thence to *Vienna*. The Popes Bull for a General Jubilee will be published here in few days.

*Turin*, Decemb. 23. The French Troops have repass'd the Mountains, to take their Winter-Quarters in *Dauphine*, and *Burgundy*; The Marechal de *Catinat* was, according to our last advice, still at *Pignerol*, but designed to part from thence in 2 or 3 days for *Versailles*, to give the French King an account of the State of things on this side. The Recruits for the Duke of *Savoy's* Troops are made with good success; The Germans expect a great Reinforcement; and several thousand Men are coming from *Naples* and *Spain* to recruit the Spanish Forces in the *Milaneze*; and at the same time the other necessary preparations are making for an early Campagne the next year.

*Stockholm*, Decemb. 9. Yesterday the late Queen of *Sueden* was Interred with all the Pomp and Magnificence that could be contrived; The States of the Kingdom, to wit, the Nobility, Clergy, Burgers, and Peasants, assisted at the Solemnity, and were afterwards very Splendidly Entertained.

*Vienna*, Decemb. 23. The last Letters from *Turkey*, by the way of *Valachia* and *Transilvania*, say, That the Cham of *Tartary* was come to *Adrianople* to be present at a great Council of War, and that the Turks make great Efforts, to prepare for the next Campagne. They continue in the mean time to work very hard on the Fortifications of *Belgrade*: And the Imperialists do the like at *Peter-Waradin*; These being now the two Frontier Garisons between the *Ottomans* and *Us*. They write from *Sclavonia*, that things remain very quiet on that side, the care they have taken to secure their Frontiers having probably disappointed the design the Enemy seem'd to have, of infesting that
