Falmouth, Septemb. 2.

He 29th paft, put to lea from hence the Providence of this place for Virginia, and the 1 inftant, three fhips of London bound with Pilchards for the Streights.

Hull, Septemb. 4. This laft week failed hence three ships of confiderable burthen laden with the Commoditics of these parts bound for Hamborough, Amsterdam and Cadis ; in their places are come in two ships laden with Pitch, Iron, Tarro and Deals, whereof one from Stockholm.

Briftol, Septemb. 5. Yesterday atrived here the Mevis. Merchant from Mevis in 7 weeks. The Fleet of Merchant thips outwards bound from this place are still confined to the Channel, expecting a fair wind.

Channel, expecting a fair wind. Portfmouth, Septer b. 6. On Friday last the Dragon was paid off, and yesterday the swallow and Eagle, to the full latisfaction of the Seamen, of whom an hundred are to go to Briftol to bring about the new ship lately built there, called the Edgar.

The Fleet of Merchant ships which have been long deteined in *Comes* road by contrary winds and ill weather, failed yesterday from thence with a fair wind.

The Soldiers lately leavyed in feveral parts of the Dominions belonging to this Republick daily arrive here, where are also expected 400 German Foor, railed by the Bishop of Argentina, and paid and defrayed by him during their ftay in his territories, and are of erwards to be taken into the Venetian pay, and to be lent with the Hift opportunity to Candia; belides thele, 'tis hoped a confiderable number of 3000 men, Soldiers and Officers may in september arrive there from France with feveral per-font of Quality who intend to ferve as volunteers, to 1 hom may be added about 2000 Foot railed in several parts un der the Spanish jurildiction ; 600 f om Brunfwick, et ter tained upon the accoust of those Dukes, and 1800 under the pay of this Republick, with which affiftance tis hoped we may be able not only to defend the City of Caudia egainft the Enemy, but proceed to action upon them in their Camp', wherein they already fuffer many wants of necessaries, in fomuch as by our late Letters from the Levant we are told, that 800 Janifaries, unable and unwilling to ferve any longer in the Siege, had fallen into mutiny and deferted the fervice, and were feeking for an opportunity to embark them-lelves and return into their own Countrey.

On Sundsy last arrived here a ship from Corfu, and the day before a Tartan from Zante, by which we are informed, that by Letters brought to thole Islands they were adviled, that our Captain General was with 15 Gallies riding about Suda, waiting the motion of the Turkish Fleer, the reft of the Armata in leveral lquadrons and divisions cruiting about the Island ; and that during his being there, intelligence was brought him, that the Balla of Canea had for the supply of the Camp before Candia, by Order from the Vilier lent out 3co cholen Turks our of that Gatrifon to convoy a confid rable number of Cattle great and small to their Arm's whereupon he immediately landed a ftrong party of his Soldiers under the Command of an experienced Captain, who lying close in ambush beyond Picorna by which they were to pais in their march, fell fudenly in amongit them, and after a volly or two of thot dispersed them, killing many of them upon the plate, and with the whole boory and divers priloners returned to their Gallies ; the Cattle were immel diately by the Generals Order fent into Candia; where, there is great plenty of all forts of provisionsThey farther tell us, that Monfieur de St. Andre Montbrun having observed that the Turks began to repose some confie dence in a small work which they had raised near the Lazoretto, from which they hoped to, annoy our ships as they palfed to and fro in the Yort, had with some hun reds of choice men in boats fal en upon the Turks by night in the faid Fort, which after a small tellstance he forced them to quit, and immediately demolished, leaving the Port again free for the passage of any of our ships.

Letters of the 26th of July from Candia advile us, that our Captain was at St. Thodero, expecting the arrival of the Turkifh Fleet which was believed would fuddenly put out from Rhodes. They likewife fay that one of the Enemie's Granadoes happened to fall into the Magazine of St. Peters, where it let fire to leveral Granadoes, but without farther milchlef than the death of three per(ons, and that the Turks are daily playing with their Great Guns upon the Out-works, but with little hart, only General Cattarias Cornaro was flightly wounded in the Arm.

Cornaro was flightly wounded in the Arm. Vienna, Septemb. 2. The Regiment of Gonzague being by Order of His Imperial Majefty reduced to three Companies only, each of them is to coasily of more then theufual number, and three hundred new railed men are defigned to be taken in to fill them up.

The Emperour seems resolved to disband a confiderable part of his forces, some of which are to pass immediately into the Venetian service, and a Courier is lately attived from *Venice* with Orders to the perfort which is or shall be designed to command them. The Court de Kibmanicck has already taken his leave of the Emperour, and is departed onewards his way for *Candia* by the way of *Trieft* with 3000 men designed for that service.

The Court hash continued fome days at Newfiadt, the Emperour intends to be the 5th initiant at Eberfdorf, he has lately taken into the Counfel of War, the Counts of Capraga and Lefly, and the Baron de Goes.

On Munday and Tueffay last happened here and at Meufradt an extraordi ary Tempelt with an Earthquake, to the great terror of the Inhabitants.

From Offen they write, that a certain Greek had brough with much confidence to the Vifier, the News that their forces before *Candia* had made themfelves Malters of that place, and that all the whole Gatti on of the Christians had given themfelves priloners to the Grand Vifier; which was for fome time believed, and the Greek honourably rewarded, but within two dayes after made his efcape, which tufficiently convinced them of the vanity of this report.

The Levant Company pursue their Trade with much such cels and advantage, three dayes since arrived here great quantities of Turkish and Persian Merchandizes to a very confiderable value.

His Imperial Majefty having taken into his confideration the differences between their Highneffes the Electors Palatine and Mayence and Dake of Lorraine, has fent to them, prohibiting any farther Acts of Holfility, and offering his Mediation for their Composure, having already nominated as his Deputies for that purpole the Marquiffes of Baden and Douriatk.

Dantzick, Sept. 5. From Hurfam we are ftill confirmed of, the King of Poland's refolution of refigning his Kingly Power, into the Hands of the Diet, having been fo far trainforred against one of his Court who would have diffwaded him from it; that he drew his Sword upon him to punish him for his too earnest profiling him with an advice fo much courtary to his inclination. Hazue, Sept. 11. From Deventer they tell us, that the Bishop of Munfter and the Count d. Bentem are now at Bentem, where they took possifier of a Church belonging to those of the Reformed Religion is where they ordered Mathe to be fung j dealing fomewhat there by with their Minister.

The States General having received Anfacers from all the Seven Provinces, in relation to the Propolals made to them by the C mons of swifferLand, have accordingly ordered a Letter to be written to the faid Cantons, giving them Thanks for the freenels of their Offers, with an account of their **B** folution upon the whele matter **j** with which their Envoye is to be fuddenly di milled.

From Flushing we are told of the arrival there of one Ship from Grenade, one from Martinege, and another from Surinam. Some more of the Greenland Fleet are arrived at the Texel, one of them with the freight of 13 Whalos taken about the height 'of 78 degrees, where they met with an extraordinary number of thole Filh. Several others are also expected with a confiderable return.

A Ship arriving allo in 20 day:s from Molecovy, informs us that the Fleet of Merchant Ships which went out from the Texel and other parts of these Provinces, were happily arrived at Archangel, where the Faires are observed at the time which they were anciently used to be kept.

Hague, Septemb. 13. The Sieur Romfwinkel, Envoye from Brandenburgh and the Heers Burgersdijck and Vander To bt, deputed from this State, are going hence for Malines to end a difference there depending between their Mafters.

The Count de Eent cm has by his Letter to the States informed them, that he is lately become a Koman Catholiek and a Member of the Empire; withall, defiring his Children who demanded their protect? n' might be fent to him.

The Lunenburg forces will be ludden'y pai.. off and dilmilled, and 'tis laid, the Dukes of Lunenburg are Treating with the Republick of Venice to have them I at for Candia.

Fruffetts, Sept. 14. The people belonging to the Ferritories of this City are much diffutisfied with the Contributions charged on them towards the quartering of the Spanish forces; and on Thursday 'alt the Women getting together, went with much noi's to the Town-Houle, crying out against the Bourgomaster; who appearing to them, had probably ran fome hazard of his life, had he not timely fled from their fury.

The Citizens are not yet pleafed to commit the Guard of their Ports to the Spanish Soldiers, but in order thereunto the Commons have been feveral times called together, where it has been proposed to them that for the preventiop of Tumults and Diforders, they would give way at least for a time that fome of the Spanish forces might be drawn into the City, but as yet without any effect; in the mean time double Guards are fet upon all the Gates, and care tak n for the prevention of any tarther diforders.

The oth inftant was publifit an Elift at Lille, by which a'l the Nobility of the Provinces who enjoy any Effates within the places lately conquered by the Freich, are commanded to refide upon the places where their Effates lie, upon pain of Confication.

The Plague which continues with much Violence in the French Quarters, begins to fpread it felf into out Neighbourhood, but the Magistrates are taking what cate they can to put a ftop to it.

Paris, Septemb. 15. The Chevalier d'Almeras is ready to fail from Thoulon for Conftantinople to attend our Am baffidor in his return home; the Count de St. Paul and Duke de Rounnez, with the Officers and V lunteers ste at Marfcilles, where they may embark the 15th inflant for Can lia.

The Prefident Barentin Inten 'ent of the Province of *PotHou* having fent to the Court to define forces might be fent thicher to fecure the peace of the Countrey againft those of the Reformed Religion; the D. de la Vieuville's by His Majestics Order to march within i days into the Province belonging to his Government with a party of 500 horse.

The Duke Jean Frederick of Hanouer arrived here the

4th inftant incognite, and the next day went to Marbiffon, to vifit the Daughters of the Princels Palatine; where he made choice of the Princels Beneditte for his Wife, and figned the Contract of Marriage. On Tuefdsy laft he returned again, having left full power with Monfieur Groot to marry her by Procusation, and to attend her into Germany.

F. om the Netherlands we are adviled, that the Spaniards having fent a Troop of Horle to take possibilition of Fountain P Evelopue r the Sieur de Landes Governour of Binche, drew a Company of foot into the Castle to keep possibilition as a dependant on the Castleleny of Binche 5 but having farther i telligence that the Spaniards had drawn a company of soot into the Town, feifing on the Gates, and keeping the Castle befieged, he immediately drew our a party of Horle and Foot from Binche, and lummon d the Spanish Officer in chief to fend him the Keys of the Town, and to march out, which was accordingly done without any farther difturbance.

Bruges, Sept. 16. The Marquis de Caffel Rodrigo having taken a view of Oftend, and Nemport, and the 12th inftant returned hither, went hence on Thursday Mo ning to Ghent. The same Evening arrived ar Offend Don Pedro de Velasco our New Governour, with 5 Spanish Men of War. On Friday Night the Marquis h v ng notice thereof return, d hither, and yesterday morning went hence for Oftend to at end Don Pedro, who with the greatest part of the Nobility and Court is expected here this Night or to mornow.

Tarmouth, Septemb. 7. On Squarday last failed from this road to the N. thwards about 200 fail of light ships, and were this day f-llowed by about 200 more.

Portfrouth Septemb. 8. On Sunday morning a small vef-Newhich came from Rouen with Linnen and Barly for the Canaries, by the heating of the Corn took fire and burnt down to the water, two of the company peristed with the vessel, the Master and two others getting away in their boats.
