Rome, January 16.

THE Pope being recovered of his late Indisposition, gave on Thursday last the usual Audiences to the Foreign Ministers; and the Resident of *Savoy* took this occasion to acquaint him with the Duke his Masters having rejected the Proposals of Peace that were lately made to his Royal Highness on the part of the French King, and with his unalterable Resolution not to separate from his Allies, and the common Interests of *Christianity*. Some days ago was held here a private Consistory, in which several Bishops were Preconised, and others Proposed, and Cardinal *Francis Barberini* was declared Legat of *Romania*; whether he will be going in a short time. The Differences about the Inquisition at *Naples* are not yet accommodated, it proving a work of much difficulty to find out an Expedient to maintain the Authorities and Jurisdictions of that Tribunal on one side, and to content the People of *Naples* on the other. It is at present very Cold here, beyond what has been known in many years, and abundance of Snow is fallen. Several Couriers have of late passed through this City with Dispatches from the Governor of *Milan* to the Viceroy of *Naples*, to hasten the new Levies that are making in that Kingdom for the Service of the *Milaneze*. The Pope has ordered his Gallies to be refitted, and the Officers of the Land Forces that are to Embark on them, to be in a readiness to depart towards the end of *March*, in order to joyn the Venetian Fleet in the *Levant*.

Leghorn, Jan. 7. The Great Prince of *Tuscany*, and the Cardinal *de Medicis*, are come to *Pisa*, and are expected here in few days. New Levies are making for the Service of our Great Duke. We have Advice by a Vessel come from *Argiers*, that several of their Men of War returned home about the middle of *November* from Cruising in the *Levant*; In going up they took two Barks belonging to *Malta*, but the Men got away; They afterwards proceeded to *Rhodes*, and took there a small Vessel, under French Colours, and a Pass from the French Ambassador at *Constantinople*; but the Algerines finding likewise on board her a Venetian Pass, and the Men being mixt, part of them French, and part Venetians and other Nations, they made the Ship Prize, and at their re-

turn to *Argiers*, sold the French as well as the rest, notwithstanding all the Endeavours of their Consul to prevent it: At *Cyprus* they took two Venetian Ships bound home from the *Levant*; one of the Prizes afterwards Foundred at Sea, the other they brought to *Argiers*.

Genova, January 9. Monsieur du *Pré*, the French Envoy, is gone from hence to the Courts of *Mantua* and *Parma*, to divert those Princes from paying any Contributions to the German Troops; but we are told that this matter is already settled. A Minister is coming hither from the Governor of *Milum* to adjust with this Republick the Contribution demanded of it in lieu of Winter Quarters. The five Gallies of the Duke of *Turkey's* Squadron continue still in this Port; and to repair the loss of the two Gallies that were lately cast away in their Voyage from *Barcelona*, the said Duke has bought a new Galley that is building here, and intends to buy another at *Civita Vecchia*. The Senate have made choice of Signior *Giacomo Lommelino* to go in the Quality of their Envoy to the Court of *France*, but he has excused himself.

Venice, January 22. By the last Letters from *Dalmatia* we are told, That the Proveditor General of that Province was making Preparations for some Expedition, having to that end ordered a good Body of Troops to draw together; but the particular design of it was not yet known. The next Week will Sail from hence, if the weather permit, a Convoy for the *Levant*; The Soldiers now at the *Lido* will begin to Embark in a day or two; and great Supplies of Stores will be sent by this opportunity for the use of our Fleet and Army in the *Levant*. This Week arrived here a Vessel from *Cyprus*, whence she came on the 22th of *September*; the Master whereof Reports, That the Pestilential Distemper which had for a long while reigned in that Island, was very much abated when he came away. We have advice from *Turkey*, by the way of *Ragusa*, That the Cham of *Tartary* was come to *Adrianople* to assist at a Divan or Council of War, about the Affairs of the next Campaigne.

Beaumarris, Febr. 2. We have this day received an account, That a French Ship of about 200 Tun was on the 31th past forced ashore by a violent Storm, at a place called *Cricket*, about 14 Miles from *Cannarvan*, and 26 from hence: We do

not yet hear what she is laden with, but its supposed to be Wine and Brandy; Eleven of her Men are come ashore and secured.

Plymouth, February 6. This Morning a Dutch Man of War of 50 Guns failed hence for *Spitthead*. Here are no Ships come in since my last.

Deale, Febr. 7. On Monday last in the Evening arrived in the *Downes* from the Westward about 40 Sail of Merchantmen, under Convoy of the *Hampshire* and another Frigate, most of which were Coasters, and Ships from *Ireland*, laden with Butter and other Provisions for *Oxford*; Besides these, there came in two Merchant Ships from *Antegoa*, one from the *East Indies*, one from *Jamaica*, one from *Barbadoes*, one from *New England*, one from *Nevis*, and one from *Lisbon*, who are all failed for the River.

Westminster, February 8. His Majesty came this day to the House of Peers attended with the usual Solemnity, and being in his Royal Robes Seated on the Throne, and the House of Commons being sent for up, His Majesty gave the Royal Assent to
