Edenburg, Septemb. 5.

Efterday and the day before were drawn up at their Rendezvous neer this place, most of the Militia Regiments of Horse and Foot, where they received their Colours and Arms, and are with the Militia's of other Counties in a fit posture to be drawn together upon any occasion for the fecurity of the peace of this kingdom.

**I**almouth, Septemb. 7. The third inftant put to fea from this Harbor, the Brother, the Mary, the Patm-tree of London, with the David and Fonathan, all of them laden with Pilebards bound for the Canaries, and the Streights.

This day came in four great thips from the Downs, bound for Virginia, Barbadoes, and the Canaries.

Rome, Aug. 25. The Duke of Parma is ftill folliciting the reftoring of Caftro; and on Thuilday laft, his Officers carried publickly in Carts, the fumme of Eight hundred and fixty thousand Dollars, one half of the Debt for which the Durchy was engaged to the Treasurer of the Chamber Pietro Nerli, who fent them to the Prelident, from whom they were directed to the Commilfary, who refused it upon pretence of want of Orders 3 whereupon the faid Officers caking witnels of, and recording the tender made by them, carried back the moneys to the Pallace Farnefe, where they remain.

The Duke de Chaulnes, Ambaffadør from His moft Chriflian Majefty, having taken leave of His Holinels, expects daily the arrival of the French Gallies for his transportation; file has made a prefent to Cardinal Roffiglof of his rich Coach of State and 6 horfes with their furniture, to the value of iz thouland Crowns, which he accepted, not without the Popes leave, who has ordered above o thousand liures to be difftibuted in prefents to feveral-performs belonging to the faid Ambaffador.

longing to the laid Ambashador. -Cadiz, Aug. 26. The 21 inftant, the Earl of Sandwich embarked himle's for Tangier, but hath fince met with contrary winds, which may retard his passage; at his departure he was falured by the Town with 15 Guns, next by all the English thips in the Bay, and afterwards by the Holland Convoy, which he returned with the usual civility. " Frankfort, Aug. 28. From the Camp of his Highness the

Elector Pa'atine, we have this account of the late action of his forces again & the Lorrainers, That on the 13th inftanta having left 2000 men in the Camp at Lamb/heim, he came with the man body of his Army rowards the firong fortrels of Landstull, which with small refistance he took by It rm, with the lofs only of three men ; he marched thence the 16th towards Honeck, the Cavalry taking the lower ground, and the Infantry with the Artillery being drawn up upon the Hill ber re the Caftle, the next morning, for the prevention of the effusion of blood, they thought fit to fend in a fummons to the Governour, inviting him to furrender upon honourable terms; but this being refuled, the red Flag was put up, and the great Guns and Morta:-pieces began to play upon it with fuch violence and fuccefs, that the belieged defpairing of a long defence, and finding little hopes of relief, came to a parley, and the 19th inftant concluded upon Articles, and the next day gave up the Caffle, the Governour-marching out with one Waggon, two Carts, ten Horfes, and his Garrilon of 72 common Soldiers belides Officers, in Martial order, and was with a confiderable par ty of the Electors Horfe and Foot convoyed to Hombourg ; the next day His Electoral Highnels went to take a view of Honeck, into which he had ordered a Garrison of 160 men, with all neseflaries for its defence, but 'tis believed intends to demolish both this and Landstull.

Since this fuccels, he had thoughts of attempting fomewhat upon Homburg, towards which place fome of their forces had put themfelves upon the r march; but having intelligence that the Lonain Cavalry were in a marching poflure the forces were ordered to the Camp at Lamb/beim; the Prince Elector Palatine being with his Courcat Francodal, in readinels to observe each motion of the Lotrainers.

The Countrey people under the jur fdiction of Mayence, who at the beginning took the Alarum, and began to take care for the fecurity of their Goods, are now fatisfied, that no violence is intended against them, and the Palatine forces have free liberty of passing through any parts of that Princes jurifdiction.

Madrid, septemb. 5. The Count de Miranda Ambaffador Extraordinary from Portugal, having continued fome days at Caramanthel, where he received the vifus of the Baron de Batteville; defigned Ambaffador for Portugal, is now artived here, and lodged in the houle of the Marquis de Caffel Rodrigo, neer Puerta de la Vega, aud 15 days hence intends to make his folemn entry.

Hamburg, Septemb. 7. The Conftable Wrang's is at prefent here, where is fuddenly expected the Field Marihal Horne, who is to be preferred to the Government of the Durchy of Bremez. Ordets are also dai y expected from Swiden for the difpolal of the Army, which has been fo long quartered in the faid Datchy, a great part whereof 'tis faid are to be (hortly disbanded, especially the new raifed forces, out of which the old Kegiments are to be compleated and fill kept on foot.

The Dukes of Lunenburgare refolved to affift the Venetians with fome Companies under the command of Count Waldee, and tis believed that a confiderable part of the forces which were fent into the United Provinces, may be employed in the fame fervice.

From Ratisfonne they tell us, that some forces are also raising there for the affiltance of the Republick of Venice, and that the Diet have taken into their confideration, the Directorium of Mayence for the fecurity of the Empire, and find it convenient that an Army of 40 thouland men be conftantly kept up and maintained at the common charge of all the States; Lordifhips and Countreys, for the publick fervice and defence of the Empire.

Hambeurg, Scptemb. 15. The late Rains which have fallen in great abundance in these parts, have deftroyed a confiderable part of our Corn and Fruits, with which we hope to be fupply'd out of the great plenty they have in Pruffia.

From Stockholme, Letters of the 26 h pass tell us, that the Convention of Estates will fuddenly rile; and that the Senate on the 22. complexed its nuv ber of 40, by the ele-Ation of four new Senators, viz. the Count de Steenboch, Masser of the Horse, Monsieur Fleming, brother to the late deceased Ambassador of that name, President of the Supream Cout in Liessand, Monsieur Gullenstiern, Chancellour of the Court, and Speaker of the present Diet, and Monfieur Boond.

From Copenhagen they write, that the Duke and Dutchefs of Hølfiein, having been honourably received and entertained by their Majeities, took their leaves of the Court at Neukoping, and are returned homewards, and the King with his Cou t again fixed at Copenhagen; and that feveral ships are hastning out, intending for the East Indies, hoping to fail by the end of September. Denzig, Septemb. 8. From Warfare we are adviled, that the Dier beginning according to appointment, and the election of their Marshal or Speaker being over, the 30th pass they fell upon, the debite, whether or ne they should intreat. His Majesty to cortinue his Begal Government; but finding many disputes arising upon this point, they fattlit alide for fometime, and reloved to define His Majesty to declare if he still continued his refolution to refigue, to which he returned his answer by his Vice-Chancellour in the affirmative, but withal, defired that before his abdication, the Republick would for his life-time grant him the Oeconomies of Marienburg and Grodno, the Customes of Lythuania and Russad, with 50000 Rix-Dollars yearly out of the Salt-pits near Cracow; but to this the Diet have by their Deputies answered, that as to the point of Revenue after abd cation, they had no instructions, and confequently could not determine any thing till they had full communicated it to their brethen at the next Land-days; fince this they are again debating the first question, which is opposed by those especies.

Venice, Sept. 8. About the end of this last week arrived here a Saich from Dalmatia di patched huher by General Priuli for money (as is believed) for the payment of the Souldiery in thole parts; By this Veffel we are told that his Excellency is at p. elent at Spalatro, attending the motion of the Turks, who have drawn rogether a confiderable force about Clinb, and have lately made forme inconfiderable incurfions into fome parts of the Connty of Zaras but the Country people being upon their Guard, coppoind thems and forced them back.

They allo inform us of the arrival of ieveral Turkiff Merchants, and fome Jows from Confiantinople, all of them affirming, that the Turks are generally full of difcontents and mnimurs against the Grand Visier, which daily increase, with the ill news they frequently receive from Candia: They having loss before that place above 80 thouiand of their choiceft Souldiers, and in 2 years time not been able to make themfelves Matters of any one confiderable Poft : And as generally affirming their Propher cannot in justice favour a Way which was with fo little reason undertaken by them.

From the Legant we are adviled that the Turks omitting no opportunities of annoying the City of Candia, are continually plying it with their great thor and Mortars, and in the mean time cealed not to make their, nearer approaches with their Mines, one of which they lately forung under fome part of our Outworks near the Fort Sabianeras, and afterwards adventur'd to form it : but our people forefacing their intentions, drew two great Guns to the Defence of that breach, by which, and the affiftance given them from the great Fort of Saint Demetrius, they beat off the Enemy, forcing them with much flaughter to quit that Post, and retire themfelves to their old line.

On Thursday last arrived Leuersfrom Candia, bearing date the 8th paft, telling us that the Turks Fleets confifting. of 52 Gailies and 29 men men of War, were departed from Rhodes, and intended to have landed tome confiderable forces at Gira Petra, but were by a Tempeft scattered, and forced towards the coaffs of Barbary; and that the Viller had lately given feveral fierce affaults to the Outworks of Gandia, continuing them for 36 hours without intermilision, in which he had los 8000 of his mens in all which, the befieged had behaved themfelves with infinite.courage and refolution, though with the loss of many men and fome Officers ; and that the Turks having railed a new forrification at Sancta Veneranda, the beforged made a ftout fally upon them, beating them out with much lols, which giving an allarum to the Camp, the Vilier came in perion to their alliflance, where he received a Mulquet flor in his head, buy how dangerous we yet know not.

Paris, Septemb. 19. On Friday left arrived here a Coust rier Extraordinary from *Rame*, fince when 'tis faid, that the bufinefs concerning the four differring Bifthops is fo ended, that the faid Bifthops shall not be obliged to revoke the Orders of Mandates formerly given out by them, and that the Pope shall fend a new Brief with certain Modifications, to which His Majesty will order the said Bishops to subscribe.

The Duke de Kequelaur is nominated by His Majefly to be fent Ambassador to the Court of Spain in the place of the Bishop of Befiers, who is returned for Dantzig, with Letters of exchange for confiderable summes of Money.

The 17th inflant, His Majefly went to Verfailles, where he gave a great entertainment to the Ladies of the Court, and on Monday next intends to let forwards for Chambourg.

From Nancy we are advertifed, that the Count de l'Islebonne had drawn together the Lorrain Cayalry, with intentions to have engaged the Elector Palatines forces; but finding them retreated to their Camp after the taking and demolifning of Landfull and Honeck, he was marched into the faid Prince Ele Cors territories to forrage and plunder the Countrey; but 'tis hoped by the mediation of the Emperor and His mock Christian Majelty, those differences may admit of a speedy reconciliation. It is farther told us, that the Duke of Lorrain has ordered the Governour of Landfull to be executed, as having been wanting to his Duty in the Defence of that place.

From Lille we are advertifed, that the Cirtadel of that place which was formewhat advanced, not having a firm foundation, was inta great part fallen down, infomuch as they are thinking to change the place of its foiquation; and that eight Baftions or Bulworks are ordered to be built at Aeth.

Letters from the Ballern parts advile us, that fome Ftench ships departing from Madagafcar, were met by a great number of Hollanders, and obliged by them to firike fail.

Bruges, Septemb. 19. On Monday laft the Marquis de Caftei Radrige with the new Governour the Conftable at Caftei Radrige with the new Governour the Conftable at Caftille departed from Oftends, and in their approach to this City were at the Skipfiale neer this City attended by the Burgomsfters and Magiftrates of this place : the new Goovernour lodged that night at the Abby of St. Andrews, half a mile diffant from the City; the next morning, the Marquis with a great Train of Coaches and all his Guards attended him at the Abby, and in much flate conducted him into the City, where they heard Mais; which ended, they took Coach; The New Governour having the precedency, and went that day to Ghem; from whence they intend for Mechelen, where they may continue till all things are prepated at Bruffels for their receptions

With the Conflable there arrived at Offers a neer 2000 Spanilh Foot, and 1500 horfemen unmanned, with a confiderable fumme of Moneys.

Whitchall, Septemb. 12. His Majefly, accompanied by his Royal Highnels, and attended by feveral eminent perfons of the Court, went on Thurlday, last from Baglhot to Portfmouth, where he was pleased to take a view of the Port, with the forces of the Garrison, and this day returned again to this place.
