UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.

The Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1916, dated 15th March, 1916, made by the Board of Trade under Part II of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 and 2 Geo. 5, c. 55), and the National Insurance (Part II Amendment) Act, 1914 (4 and 5 Geo. 5, c. 57).

The Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the National Insurance Acts, 1911 to 1915, hereby make the following Regulations:---

1. In Regulation 8 (1) (d) of the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912, as amended by Regulation 6 of the Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1913, the following words shall be substituted for the words "three months" wherever those words occur, viz. : "fourteen weeks."

2. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1916, and shall come into force on the date hereof.

TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade, and dated 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for certain branches of the Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade in Great Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 23rd December, 1913, hereby give notice, as required by Section 4 of the above Act, that they propose to vary the following minimum time-rates of wages for female workers fixed by them on the 7th of June, 1915, set out in their notice of that date and made obligatory by the Board of Trade on the 8th December, 1915, as follows:—

1. For female workers of 18 years of age and upwards, from 13s. to 14s. 1d. per week.

2. For female workers of 18 years of age and upwards who have been employed in the trade for an aggregate period of less than 12 months and cannot suitably be engaged on piece work and to whom the Trade Board shall have issued a Certificate on the ground that the employment is not merely casual, from 11s. to 12s. per week.

3. For female workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, from 11s. to 11s. 6d. per week.

The above proposals are on the basis of a week of 52 hours, the rates being subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours actually spent by the
