The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows: --

Contraction of Limits of Swine-Fever Infected Area.

1. The limits of the Swine-Fever Infected Area declared by Order of the Board dated the twenty-fourth day of February, nineteen hundred and sixteen, are hereby contracted so

as to comprise only the Area described in the Schedule to this Order, and the Area so described is hereby declared to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area for the purposes of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twelfth day of June, nineteen hundred and sixteen.

(b) The area enclosed between the parallels of latitude 51° 40′ N. and 52° 00′ N., and the meridians of longitude 1° 55' E. and 2° 32' E.

Remarks.—Although these limits assigned to the danger areas, it must not be supposed that navigation is necessarily safe in any portion of the southern waters of the North
