

32670 Sjt. F. Wilkinson, 58th By., 35th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry when laying and repairing telephone wires under heavy fire. He has set a fine example.

C/M.T./2938 Pte. G. B. Wilson, A.S.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as a Motor Ambulance driver. He has driven his ambulance under heavy shell fire.

483 L./C. J. Wilson, Lanark. Yeo. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry when in charge of a bombing post. Though severely wounded he stuck to his post and assisted to repel an attack.

14282 Sjt. W. Wilson, 6th Bn., North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative. During an intense bombardment by the enemy he showed great coolness when securing the defences against any attack. Later he led a bombing party down the trenches on his flank and discovered that the enemy had carried out a raid. He at once placed sentries and assumed command of these trenches until relieved.

307 Actg. Sjt. W. Wilson, Lanark Yeo. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry. When the enemy had gained a footing in a bombing station, he immediately led a party forward and assisted in retaking the station and holding it during the night.

8841 Coy. S./M. A. E. Winton, 24th Divl. Sig. Coy., R.E.

For conspicuous and consistent good work and zeal since the commencement of the campaign.

634 Actg. S./M. P. Witheridge, Rif. Bde. (P.S., 8th Bn., Lond. R., T.F.).

For consistent gallantry and good work at all times. He has frequently shown coolness and ability under fire and has set a fine example.

6331 Coy. S./M. J. Wood, 1st Bn., Wilts. R.

For consistent good work. He has also frequently displayed great gallantry in action.

28 By. S./M. W. Woodman, 14th Lond. By., R.F.A. (T.F.).

For consistent good work and energy on all occasions, notably in his management of the waggon lines, often under great difficulties. He has set an example of cheerfulness and devotion to duty.

803 Pte. T. Worrall, 11th Bn., Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry. When a live grenade slipped from his hand into the trench, he shouted a warning to the men round him and then stamped the bomb into the mud and jumped aside. The grenade exploded and wounded him in the leg, but he saved his comrades.

12509 L./Sjt. B. Worsley, 4th Bn., Worc. R.

For conspicuous good work when making

valuable reconnaissances in front of our line previous to an advance.

5662 L./C. G. Wright, 14th Hrs. (attd. R. Horse Gds.).

For conspicuous gallantry. He collected wounded men under heavy fire. On another occasion, when he with a party had lost touch with their regiment, he joined another unit and went into action with it.

8322 Coy. S./M. W. Wright, 2nd Bn., S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous and consistent good work. He is always ready to volunteer for dangerous enterprises. On one occasion he voluntarily joined a bombing party to deny a crater to the enemy, and by his courage and good example helped to save a critical situation.

8516 Coy. S./M. E. Yates, 9th Bn., Sco. Rif.

For consistent good work in the trenches. He has also carried out fine patrol work.

G/2326 Sjt. T. H. Young, 8th Bn., R. W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill when leading his platoon after his Officer had been wounded.

G/5567 L./C. W. Young, 8th Bn., E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in bringing back, assisted by a private, a wounded man of his patrol under heavy machine gun fire, from within 30 yards of the enemy's trench. Finally they had to seek assistance and the platoon commander came out to help them.

The undermentioned has been awarded a Clasp to his Distinguished Conduct Medal for subsequent acts of conspicuous gallantry:—

A.1143 Actg. Coy. S./M. W. L. McIntyre, 8/Bn., K.R. Rif. C.

For consistent gallantry and good work. When all his Officers became casualties, he temporarily commanded his Company very efficiently.

(The Distinguished Conduct Medal was awarded for service in the South African War, whilst belonging to the Highland Light Infantry, *vide* London Gazette dated 31st October, 1902, page 6904.)

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

145 L./Cpl. T. W. Adeney, 2nd Fld. Coy., Australian Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When shot through the shoulder he begged the medical officer to allow him to remain at the front, and has since done consistent fine work. He has assisted to bomb the enemy out of important positions.

805 Cpl. G. D. Cook, 2nd Australian Fld. Arty. Bde., Hdqrs., 1st Divn.

For conspicuous gallantry. He went out under heavy shell fire, and re-established communication when telephone wires were cut. He was seriously wounded.
