606 Cpl. A. McI. Morrison, 6th Fd. Coy., Canadian Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry. He laid wires to blow up an enemy post about 20 yards from the enemy's trench. With a Lance-Corporal he carried and laid charges, and when he found himself unable to explode them he returned for an instantaneous fuse, relaid his charges, and then exploded them.

5447 Cpl. A. C. Oxley, 2nd Fd. Coy.; 1st Canadian Divl. Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry, courage and resource throughout the campaign, notably when putting positions in a state of defence under fire.

71860 Coy. S./M. T. Patterson, 27th Canadian Inf. Bn.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty. He has set a fine example of cool courage on several occasions.

45034 Cpl. C. Platts, 3rd Fd. Coy., 1st Canadian Divl. Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry throughout, notably when, after a dangerous enterprise, he skilfully extricated his men, and then, for the rest of the night, carried in wounded men from exposed positions. He set a fine example.

21747 Pte. L. Preston, 7th, Canadian Inf. Bn.

For conspicuous gallantry on several occasions, notably when he established a telephone station in the enemy's trenches during an attack after entering with the attacking party. He had previously volunteered to go in as a bomber.

69811 Pte. E. M. Robertson, 26th Canadian Inf. Bn.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the signaller's dug-out was demolished by a shell during a heavy bombardment, he stuck to his telephone, although his left foot was blown off and his right leg was fractured.

110482 L./C. L. A. Robertson, 5th Bn., Canadian Mtd. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry. He went out in view of the enemy and under heavy shell and rifle fire, and successfully established communication, using a shell hole for his telephone station.

40549 By. S./M. J. Smith, 3rd By., 1st Bde., 1st Canadian Divl. Arty.

For consistent good work as Battery Sergeant-Major and for coolness under fire at all times.

NEWFOUNDLAND CONTINGENT.

417 Pte. W. J. Gladney, 1st Bn. (now attd. 2nd Bn.), 1st Newfoundland R.

For conspicuous gallantry. He went out alone to within 25 yards of the enemy's trench, located four enemy machine guns, shot two sentries, and brought back a valuable report.

NEW ZEALAND FORCE.

3/317 Pte. J. F. Cardno, N. Zeald. Med. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work when attached to an infantry battalion.

12/1627 Sjt. J. H. Francis, 1st Auckland Bn., N. Zeald. Force.

For conspicuous good work in throwing bombs and training bomb throwers.

8/872 Sjt. (now 2nd Lt.) A. G. Henderson, 1st Otago Bn., N. Zeald. Force.

For conspicuous and consistent good work in charge of the machine-gun section of his battalion.

14/43 Sjt. F. Jenkins, 2nd Coy., N. Zeald. Divl. Train.

For consistent good work. For a considerable period he performed the duties of an officer, and by his ability, application, and sound common sense was equal to all emergencies.

9/1316 Sjt. J. Little, Otago Mtd. Rifles Regt., N. Zeald. Force.

For conspicuous ability and good work. He made frequent night reconnaissances to ascertain the effect of his bombs and to discover targets.

3/269 S./M. F. W. Moor, No. 1 Fld. Amb., N. Zeald. Med. Corps.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty.

6/1129 Cpl. H. Rhind, Canterbury Bn., N. Zeald. Force.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work when in charge of scouts and snipers. He also frequently went out alone on risky enterprises, and has accounted for several of the enemy.
