Turin, April 5.

They continue to work with great diligence on the new Fortifications of *Com*, and the Duke of *Savoy* is gone again to see them, and to take a Review of the Garrison of that place. The French Troops begin to move from *Dauphine* towards *Susa*, and they are sending a Battalion to strengthen the Garrison of *Pignerol*. Our Preparations are at the same time carried on with all the vigour imaginable. The *Vaudois* attackt lately a French Detachment which was going to *Pignerol*, and routed them, having killed about 20, and taken several Prisoners, together with 14 Mules laden with Provisions for that Garrison.

Vienna, March 31. The Recruits that have been raised in the Hereditary Countries are on their march towards *Hungary*. Orders are given for filling all the Magazines with Provisions, and furnishing all the Garrisons with Necessaries, but especially *Peter Waradin, Essecke, and Tirul*, the last is a small Town upon the River *Theysse*, upon which the Turks have of late designed some attempt, but were prevented by the care that was taken for the security and defence of it.

Vienna, April 3. We hear from *Turkey*, That the Grand Visier designed about the middle of the last month to set up the Horse Tail, as a Signal of his speedy departure for *Hungary*, where he intends to enter early into the Field with all the Force he can get together, which 'tis believed, (by reason of the great Supplies they are forced to send against the Prince of the Arabs, who does waste the Turkish Territories with a numerous Army,) will not exceed 50000 Men of regular Troops, and these too will consist for the most part of new raised Militia, being raw and unexperienced Men; This is to be their principal Army with which the Visier is to Act on the *Danube*, and they design to have another Body of Troops on the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, composed of *Teckelcy's* Men and the *Tartars*. On our side all things are preparing to open the Campaign towards the end of *May*; The Duke of *Croy* is expected here by the beginning of the same month, and will be going soon after for *Hungary*. The Negotiation still continues about General *Schoning's* Affair; This Court insists that he should enter into the Service of the *Venetians*, to which the *Electors of Saxony's* last Answer is expected by the return of the Courier that was lately sent from hence to *Driften*.

Frankfort, April 14. Prince *Lewis of Baden* continues still at *Guntzberg*, giving the necessary Orders about the preparations for the Campaign. The Confederate Troops in the mean time begin to move towards the *Neckar*, in order to form a Camp near *Hailbron*. Two Regiments of *Brandenburgers* are passed by *Aichaffenbourg* in their march towards *Piedmont*.

Cologne, April 16. The Troops of *Brandenburg*, who have had their Winter Quarters in this Diocess, are Comanded to march towards the *Maeße*; The Troops of

Hesse Cassel are likewise ordered to be in a readiness to march. They write from the *Upper Rhine*, That the French talk of forming a Camp between *Landau* and *Neustadt*.

Paris, April 9. The scarcity of Corn has lately occasioned an Insurrection of the Peasants in *Burgundy*, where 5 or 600 of them being got together, they forced several Castles and other Places, and took away the Corn that was laid up in them. The like has happened in *Nivernois*, and several other parts of this Kingdom. The Duke of *Nailles's* Mules went hence on Tuesday last for *Catalonia*, and he himself will follow very suddenly. 'Tis still said that the French intend to Besiege *Barcelona* both by Sea and Land; and that to this end several Men of War will be sent from *Brest* to joyn the Squadron in the *Mediterranean*.

Paris, April 12. The Price of Corn increases here every Market day, which multiplies likewise the number of the Poor; And they write from *Lion*, That the passing of the Troops through that City towards *Piedmont* had made Bread so dear, that the Bakers had been obliged to shut up their Shops for fear of being plundered by the ordinary sort of People. They write from *Brest*, That the 20 Men of War that are fitting out there would be joyned by 15 from *Rochfort* and *Port Louis*, and that they took in Provisions for 6 Months. The Dutchess of *Chartres* lies dangerously ill.

Paris, April 16. The French King at his return from Hunting on the 12th instant in the Evening, was seized with a Fit of an Ague, for which he took the Jesuits Powder; however, he had another Fit on the 14th, but 'twas not so violent as the former; and whether he has had any farther returns of it this day we do not yet hear. The Troops that are to compose our several Armies are in motion towards the places of their Rendezvous. The Hundred Troops of new raised Carabiniers are divided into 3 Bodies, one is ordered to march to *Piedmont*, the other to *Germany*, and the third to *Flanders*. They write from *Brest*, That the *Marschal de Tourville* went thence on the 9th instant to view the Ships in some other Ports. The Letters from *Provence* say, That the *Toulon* Squadron would be ready in a short time, but that the Gallies were not in the same forwardness.

Brussels, April 11. The French Troops begin to be in motion all along their Frontiers, and 'tis said, that a Body of them is drawing together near *Maubuge*; They talk likewise of forming a flying Camp near *Farnes*, to which last place they have sent several pieces of Cannon and other Stores of War. The French King has by the Cardinal *de Bouillon*, (who is still at *Huy*) sent to the Chapter of *Liege* a Declaration, dated the 15th of the last month at *Versailles*, by which he offers the City and Country of *Liege* a Neutrality, and Suspension of all Acts of Hostility to the first of *May*, upon Condition that the Allies shall withdraw their Troops from the Citadel, and all the Forts, Lines and Retrenchments, about the City, to the end that the Election of a new bishop may be wholly free, and without any appearance of force to influence it; and Consents, that after the Election is over, the same Troops shall be at liberty to return without any opposition or hindrance on his

his side. The Earl of Athlone, who has been to take a Review of the Dutch Cavalry in the several places where they are in Garrison, returned hither yesterday.

Brussels, April 14. The Chapter of Liege has given an answer to the Declaration of the French King, That they will accept of the Neutrality he Offers them, provided that he on his part does first restore Dinant, Huy, Boxillon, and all he is now in possession of belonging to the Church of Liege. The Troops in Garrison are commanded to be in a readiness to march by the 16th of this month, and the same Orders are also given to all the other Garrisons. The 6000 Bavarians which his Electoral Highness has obliged himself by Treaty to bring into the King of Spain's Service in these Countries, are already arrived in the Neighbourhood of Francfort, in order to their coming hither.

Brussels, April 18. The States of Brabant have at last granted an Extraordinary Subsidy of 800000 Florins, and the Commonalty of this City have consented to it. On the 16th instant in the Evening arrived here a Trumpeter from the Cardinal of Bouillon, with a Letter to the Elector, to demand of his Electoral Highness a Pass, that he might go to Liege to be present at the Election of a new Bishop, to which his Electoral Highness answered, That he could do nothing in this matter without the Consent of the rest of the Allies. They talk here of forming two Camps, one at Tongres, and the other at Parke near Louvain.

Hague, April 13. Count Aversberg, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to His Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here on Saturday last from Vienna. Four Companies of the Duke of Holstein Ploem's Regiment which have been this Winter here, are ordered to march to Maastricht to join the rest of the Regiment. The States have sent their Resolution about the Ships stopped in the Sound and at Amsterdam to their Minister at the Court of Denmark, and we expect to hear in a very short time that this matter is accommodated.

Hague, April 16. All the Officers belonging to the Dutch Men of War have Orders forthwith to repair on Board their respective Ships, which will sail in few days to the Rendezvous on the Coast of England. The Regiments of Lewison, Coy, Matthews, and Fairfax, which came lately from England are landed at Williamstadt. The Elector of Bavaria has sent Commissaries to Francfort to receive the 6000 Bavarians who are to serve in Flanders this Campaign.

Hague, April 20. The Merchants concerned in the Greenland Fishing Trade have presented a Petition to the States, desiring, That the Embargo formerly laid upon their Ships, may be taken off, seeing the reason of it, which was the providing the Fleet with Men, is ceased, the Men of War having all their full Number. Lieutenant Admiral Allemonde intends to go on Board this Week in the Texel. They write from Liege, That the Election of a new Bishop continued fixed for this day; Of the several Pretenders, the Elector of Cologne, and the Great Master of the Teutonick Order, seem to have the greatest Interest amongst the Members of the Chapter. We hear, That the Confederate Forces are going to form a Camp near the Meuse.

Cherter, April 16. On Saturday last arrived at Highlake Sir Henry Bellasis's Regiment of Foot from Dublin, which landed yesterday, and is expected here this Evening.
