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They continue to work with great diligence on the new Fortifications of Com, and the Duke of Savoy is gone again to fee them, and to take a Review of the Garifon of that place. The French Troops begin to move from Dauphine towards Sufa, and they are fending a Batalion to strengthen the Garifon of Pignerol. Our Preparations are at the same time carried on with all the vigour imaginable. The Vaudois attackt lately a French Deachement which was going to Pignerol, and routed them, having killed about 20, and taken several Prisoners, together with 14 Mules laden with Provisions for that Garifon.

rion. Viema, March 31. The Recruits that have been raised in the Hereditary Countries are on their march towards Hangary. Vienns, April 3. On our side all things are preparing to open the Campagne towards the end of May; The Duke of Cropist peeted here by the beginning of the same month, and will be going soon after for Hang 2ry. The Negotiation still continues about General Schoning's Affair; This Court insists that he should enter into the Service of the Venetians, to which the Elector of Saxony's last Answer is expected by the return of the Courier that was lately sent from hence to Dressen.

Francfort, April 14. Prince Lewis of Baden continues still at Guntzberg, giving the necessary Orders about the preparations for the Campagne. The Considerate Troops in the mean time begin to move towards the Neckar, in order to form a Camp near Hailbron. Two Regiments of Brandenburgers are pussed by Aschaffembourg in their match towards Pieamont.

Cologue, April 16. The Troops of Brandenburg, who have had their Winter Quarters in this Diocess, are Commanded to march towards the Maese; The Troops of

Heffe Caffel are likewife ordered to be in a readiness to march. They write from the Upper Rhine, That the French talk of forming a Camp between Landau and Neufladt.

Paris, April 9. The scarcity of Corn has lately occasioned an Insurrection of the Peasants in Burgundy, where 5 or 600 of them bring got together, they forced several Castles and other Places, and took away the Corn that was laid up in them. The like has happened in Niverness, and several other parts of this Kingshim. The Duke of Naules's Mules went hence on Tuesday last for Catalonia, and he himself will follow very suddenly. The French King has by the Ca dinal de Boutken, (who is still at Huy) sent to the Chapter of Liege a Declaration, dated the 15th of the last month at Versailly, by which he offers the City and Country of Liege and Neutrality, and Suspension of all Acts of Hossilly to the first of May, upon Condition that the Allies shall withdraw their Troops from the Cittadel, and all the Forts, Lines and Retrenchments, about the City, to the end the the Election of a new bishop may be wholly free, and without any appearance of force to influence it; and Consents, that after the Election is ever, the same Troops shall be at liberty to return without any opposition or hindrance on him
