FOR the better Information of such Persons, who may be willing to Contribute or Adventure Money upon the Act passed in this Session of Parliament, for raising a Million, Their Majesties Commissioners, appointed under the Great Seal of England, for putting in Execution several Matters and Things in the said Act contained, in Reference to the Lots, have desired, that publick Notice should be given as follows, viz.

The Tickets are all Printed, from One to One Hundred Thousand, Three of each sort just number'd alike, bound up in Books, first signed by the Managers, who are appointed by His Majesty, and set upon Oath, and after delivered to the several Receivers appointed by the Lords of the Treasury, who first signing the same, cut thence the severest Ticket, being one of the three of a sort, and give it to whoever pays 10 l. for it; but at the same time the said Receiver is to rebate after the rate of 14 l. per Cent. for as many days as the Money is paid in before the 29th of Sept. 1694. Note, These Annuities are by this Act freed from all manner of Taxes, are made most easie, Transferable; and the counterfeiting of Tickets is Felony.

For, though the Drawing is not to begin till the Eighth of October; the Tenth of September is the longest time allow'd to any Adventurer on these Beneficial Terms to pay in his Money.

Turin, April 10. The Advices from the Frontiers, tell us, That the French do not now talk of taking the Field on this side till the end of May or the beginning of June. The Duke of Savoy is still at Coni, whither he went the last Week to view the new Fortifications which his Royal Highness has ordered to be made for the greater security of that place.

Milan, April 7. On Sunday last our Governor held a great Council of War, and the same Evening Orders were dispatched to the Troops in the Service of this State to put themselves into a readiness to march up, as the first Command. This Week arrived here 300 German Recruits. We are told that General Palfi has by

by the Emperors Order written to the Duke of Mantua to desire him to send from his Court the French Minister, together with the Marquis d'Amorosi, and two more of his Council, who hold a close Correspondence with the Court of France.

Venice, April 9. The next Week will sail from hence a great Convoy with 1800 Land Soldiers for the Levant. We have Advice from Napoli di Romania, That Signior Antonio Zen, late Provveditore General of the Morea, had received his Commission to be Captain General of the Forces of this State; And that he was putting Things into a posture in order to open the Campaign with some considerable Enterprize.

Vienna, April 10. The Imperial Troops will now quickly begin to move towards their Rendezvous in Hungary. In the meantime great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition are sent thither, to be Magazine'd; And the Barks and Gallies which are to serve on the Danube are fitting out with all imaginable diligence. The last Letters from Transylvania give an account, That General Veterani had sent out a Detachment of 3 or 400 Horse to observe a Party of Turks who as he heard was ordered to Conduct some Provisions to Gula. They write from Peter Waradin, That 500 Men of that Garrison marched out the 25th past, with a design to make an Incursion towards the Save.

Frankfort, April 18. The Confederate Forces, who are quartered in these Parts, have Orders to be in a readiness to march by the 25th of this Month; They work very hard on the fortifications of Hattbrun, and several Regiments are posted thereabouts to cover the Men that are employed in that Service. The French Troops begin to move in Alsace; and 'tis said that they are preparing to form a Camp near Landau.

Cologne, April 20. The Duke of Cray came hither the 18th from his Estate at Millendrick, and intends in few days to return towards Vienna. The Forces of the Allies that have Wintered in this District are preparing for their march.

Liege, April 21. Yesterday being appointed for the Election of a Bishop of Liege, the Canon to the number of 46, besides the Great Dean, met accordingly in the Chapter House: The Persons in Nomination were the Elector of Cologne, the Great Master of the Teutonic Order, and Monsieur de Meun, Great Dean of Liege. For the last gave up his interest to the Great Master, and so the Competition lay wholly between him and the Elector of Cologne. The Votes were reckoned at first to be equally divided between them, viz. 23 on each side; but the Deans, who were afterwards brought over from the other side to the Elector. The Deans objected one of the Electors Votes, and insisting to have the Election deferred till the next day, retired out of the Chapter House with 22 of the Canons; The rest proceeded to make choice of the Elector of Cologne, and declared him Prince and Bishop of Liege, upon which the Cannon were fired from the Citadel. This morning the Dean and Canons, who were for the Great Master, met in the Deans House and elected him Prince and Bishop of Liege; and in the evening the great Cannon were likewise fired from the Chapter House. 'Tis generally believed that the Decision of this Matter will be left to the Pope.

Paris, April 19. The French King having taken again the Jars Powder, it has given a stop to his Army, of which he had two Hrs the last Week. The Price of Bread increases still, as well in this City as in other parts of France; And the People suffer extremely; In several places they have fallen upon the Commissaries that had bought up quantities of Corn for the use of the Army, and plundered their Magazines. The Marschal de Tourville won from Beff on the 16th instant towards Tonlon, where he designed to be on the 15th. The 20 Men of War fired at Beff, have its said Orders to sail forthwith. The Marschal de Noailles will part from hence this Week for Catalonia. The Prince's Dewager of Condé is lately Dead.

Brussels, April 21. The Elector of Bavaria received last Night by Express an account, That his Brother the Elector of Cologne was chosen Bishop of Liege, upon which his Electoral Highness was Complimented this Morning by the Nobility, and other Persons of the chiefest Quality at this Court. The Cardinal de Brullen (who continues still at Huy) sent to Liege on Saturday last his Protestation against any Election that should be made of a new Bishop, because he was denied a Pass to be present at it. The Count de Samsbe is gone from hence by the Electors Order to receive on the Frontiers of Gelderland the 6000 Bavarians who are on their march hither. All the Letters from Paris say, That the scarcity of Corn increases in all Parts of France; one reason of which is, That the Kings Commissaries have seized upon all the Corn that has been of late brought from abroad, for the use of the French Forces.

Hague, April 23. N. S. The States of Holland are to meet again on the 27th of this month. They have made a double Election at Lige. In Brabant all things continue quiet; but the Troop on both sides are preparing to take the Field.

Philipsburg, April 17. This day was launched into a new Ship of the fourth Rate, named the Anglesy, carrying 50 Guns.

Dunkirk, April 20. On the 18th instant Sir George Rokeby, Admiral of the Blue, sailed out of the Downs with Three Majesties Ships

under his Command, to the Westward; Yesterday in the Evening passed by the Back of the Goodwin about 30 Sail, whereof 14 or 15 were great Ships, supposed to be Dutch Men of War, with their Tenders and Victuallers, that are going to joyn Their Majesties Fleet.

Whitehall, April 22. By a Flying Packet from Scotland we have received Advice of the Death of his Grace the Duke of Hamilton, who arrived at Edinburgh the 17th in the Evening, having been taken ill in his Journey from hence, and Died the 18th about 11 in the morning. The same Letters give an account, That the Rebels in the Bass had desired to Capitulate, and that the Council had Empowered Major Reed to Treat with them, and to adjust the Articles for the Surrender of the same.
