Naples, April 6.

THE Gallies that were sent from hence in February last to change the Garifon of Porto Longone, returned hither 3 days ago. An Express was dispatched this Week to the Viceroy of Sicily to hasten the fitting out the Gallies of that Kingdom, which are ordered, so soon as they are ready, together with those of Naples, to go and joyn the rest of the Spanish Gallies.

Milan, April 15. The Preparations are continued here with great application for an early Campagne. Our Governor went the last Week to Pavia, and other Places of this State, to take a Review of the Troops in Garifon there; and returned hither yesterday, having been accompanied in his Journey by our Mairre de Camp General, the Count de Louvigny. In the Evening he held a Council of War; and this day his Excellency parted from hence for Turin, to Concert with his Royal Highness divers Matters with relation to the opening of the Campagne.

Turin, April 20. The French Troops in Dalmatine begin to move towards the Frontiers, in order, as they give out, to form a Camp near Susa; Tho' at the same time they seem to have no other design than to act Defensively on this side: But they talk of making a great Effort in Catalonia this Campagne, and particularly of Besieging Barcelona; To which end they have sent a strong Detachment to their Army in those Parts. Yesterday the Duke of Savoy, and the Governor of Milan, accompanied with several General Officers, rode round this City to view the Fortifications; And his Royal Highness gave Orders for some New Works to be added to them. Part of the German Troops are already on their march hither from their Winter Quarters; The rest will soon follow; and his Royal Highness's Troops are ordered to be in a readiness to march upon the first Command.

Venice, April 16. Divers Officers are come hither, who intend to Embark on the Convoy, which is ready to Sail with the first fair Wind for the Levant; By this opportunity will be sent thither a considerable Sum of Money, and great quantities of all sorts of Stores, together with 1500 Land Soldiers: And so soon as this Convoy arrives in the Morea it's believed our Army will take the Field. The last Advices from thence say, That the Turks fearing the Venetians would attack Negropont

this Summer, had made all the Provision they could for the Defence of it. The new Fortifications which the late Doge Morosini ordered to be made to secure the Pass of the Isthmus of Corinth, are quite finished, and the Enemy thereby sufficiently hindered from making any Inroads into the Morea.

Warsaw, April 14. The King of Poland is perfectly recovered of his late Illness; and 'tis laid that the Court will shortly return hither from Zolkiew. The Advices from the Frontiers continue to say, That the Turks at Caminica are reduced to great Streights for want of Provisions, and that without a considerable Relief they will be forced to Capitulate in a short time. The Envoy of this Crown, who was sent some time ago to the Cham of Tartary, and followed him to Adrianople, with an Answer to the Proposals which the Cham had made by his Envoy to this Court, has written to the King of Poland to acquaint him with his having executed the Commission he was employed upon, and that he was come as far as Jassi (the Capital City of Moldavia) in his return home.

Vienna, April 21. The last Letters from Peter Waradin tell us, That the Turks continued very quiet on the Frontiers of Slavonia and Croatia, and were so backward in their Preparations for the Campagne, that they were apprehensive some of their Frontier Places would be attackt before their Army could be in the Field, and were therefore very careful to supply them with Provisions, and all things necessary for their Defence. The Imperial Troops will now shortly leave their Quarters, and march to their Rendezvous between Buda and Essecke; 'Tis generally believed that the Duke of Croy will Command them again this Campagne; who is expected here in few days from Germany. Divers Vessels are providing with Ovens, which are to pass down the Danube, and keep as near the Imperial Army as they can to Bake Bread for them. And a great number of other Barks and Boats are lading here with Ammunition, and Utensils of War for the use of the Campagne in Hungary.

Frankfort, April 28. Prince Lewis of Baden, who has been some time at Guntzburg, is expected in few days at Hailbrun, where the Confederate Troops begin to draw together. The Fortifications of that Place are almost finished.

Mentz, April 29. The Imperial Commissaries have provided Magazines in this City for the subsistence of a great Body of Troops; and they still continue to buy up great quantities of Corn for the same Service. We have Advice that the Troops of *Franconia* and *Suabia* have received Orders to march forthwith to *Hailbron*, near which place it's thought will be formed their first Camp. The French begin to move likewise in *Alsace*; and 'tis said they are going to encamp about *Landau*.

Edinburg, April 26. The Forces designed from hence for *Flanders*, set Sail last Sunday in the Afternoon, but the Wind changing soon after, they were obliged to come to an Anchor again in the *Frith*.

Plymouth, April 29. On the 27th came into this Port Their Majesties Ships the *Norwich*, *Crown*, *King Fisher*, *Coronation*, and *Delavall*, with a great Fleet of outward bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy. Several Portuguese Ships are arrived here from *Lisbon*, and *O Porto*.

Portsmouth, April 29. Admiral *Ruffel* came to this place last Friday Night; and the next Morning went on Board the *Britannia*. The same day came in a Dutch Vice-Admiral with four Men of War from the Eastward, and joined the Fleet at *Spinhead*.

Hurwich, May 1. This day was Launched here a new Third Rate Ship, of 70 Guns, called the *Ipwich*, built by Mr. *Mundy*.

Whitehall, April 26. His Majesty has been Pleased upon the Death of Sir *Thomas Duppa*, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to Confer that Place upon *Fleetwood Sheppard Esq;* Gentleman Usher Dayly Waiter to His Majesty. And at the same time His Majesty was Pleased to Confer upon him the Honour of Knighthood.

Whitehall, May 1. On the 28th of the last month Their Majesties Ships the *Essex* and the *Edgar* discovered on the South part of the *Broad Fourteens*, 11 great Flyboats and Gallies, with two French Men of War their Convoys, and gave them Chace; About 9 in the morning they were come pretty near them, when there arose a very thick Fog, during which the French dispersed, and steered different ways; The Fog, after having lasted 3 hours, clearing up, our two Frigates got sight again of some of the French Ships, and took six of them laden with Corn for *Dunkirk*, which are brought into *Margate Road*.
