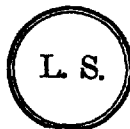
(SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREA.)

INSTRUMENT substituting the new Church of Saint Mary, situate within the new parish of Low Harrogate, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, for the old Church of Saint Mary, situate within and hitherto being the parish church of the same new parish.

To all to whom these presents shall come, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England send greeting.

WHEREAS a new church has lately been built within the new parish of Low Harrogate,

in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, and has been consecrated and is known as the Church of Saint Mary:

And whereas the Right Reverend Thomas Wortley, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, as such Bishop, the Reverend Charles James Procter, of the Vicarage, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk in Holy Orders, acting on behalf of himself and of John Henry Buxton, of Easneye, Stanstead Abbots, in the county of Hertford, Esquire; Robert Barclay, of High Leigh, Hoddesdon, in the said county of Hertford, Esquire; and the Right Reverend John Taylor Smith, formerly Bishop of Sierra Leone, the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Low Harrogate, and the Reverend Ernest Augustus Chard, Clerk in Holy Orders, as the Vicar or Incumbent of the said Vicarage of Low Harrogate, have by an Instrument under their hands, bearing date on or about the tenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, certified to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, that it would be for the convenience of the said new parish of Low Harrogate that the said new Church of Saint Mary, situate within such new parish, should be substituted for the old parish church (also known as the Church of Saint Mary) of the same new parish:

Now therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other
