N Sunday last the Cardinal de Beauvas had a long Audience of the Pope about the Bufiness of Liege, and the same Evening he dispatched an Express to the Court of France. On Tueiday the Pope declared his Intention of going to Civita Vecchia to view his Gallies, and the new Buildings that are making there by his Order; but the Weather proving very cold, he has, by the Advice of his Phyfirians, laid afide the thoughts of this Journey for the present, and has resolved to tend thither the Cardinal Negroni. This morning arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from Bruffels, with Letters to the Elector of Bavaria's Minister at this Court, giving an account of the Elector of Cologne's being on the 20th of the last month choice Bishop of Liege by 24 Voices.
