Turin, May 11.

WE are told from *Milan*, that the Marquis de *Loganex* has sent a Reinforcement to the Garison of *Final*; and that he designs to be here with the Troops of the *Milaneze* (who are to serve this Campagne in *Piedmont*) before the end of this Month. The Germans who have Wintered in *Montferrat*, *Mantua*, and *Parma*, will march hither about the same time. The Enemy do not yet appear in any considerable Body near our Frontiers; only some Battalions of Irish are said to be come into the Neighbourhood of *Susa*.

Dantzick, May 14. The Letters from *Lemberg* of the 29th past tell us, that the Baron de *Meyer* was arrived at the Court of *Poland* with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, to Treat of a Marriage between his Electoral Highness and the Princess of *Poland*.

Vienna, May 12. The Imperial Forces in *Hungary* are marching to their General Rendezvous near *Essecke*. We have yet no certain Advice of Monsieur *Heemskerke*, the Dutch Ambassador's arrival at *Belgrade*, of which there came a Report the last week from *Peter-Waradin*. There are Letters from *Poland* which say, that the Turks have made some Overtures to that Crown for the setting on foot a Treaty of Peace, and have proposed *Jassi*, the chief City of *Moldavia*, or some other Place on the Frontiers of *Poland*, where the Ministers of the several Parties engaged in this War may meet together for the carrying on this Work. The death of the Elector of *Saxony* is like to make some alteration in General *Seloning's* Affairs.

Frankfort, May 20. The Confederate Forces continue to assemble near *Hailbron*, where most of the Regiments of *Suabia* and *Franconia* are already arrived, the Head Quarter being at *Bockinghen*. A Body of Horse and Dragoons is posted on the River *Ens* near *Dornentz*, to secure that Pass; The Garison of *Hydelberg* is reinforced, and the Fortifications so far repaired, that the place is at present in a condition to resist any sudden Attempt. The French Forces are drawing together about *Landau*, and they give out that their Army will consist of 50000 Men.

Cologne, May 21. The Duke of *Croy* parted from hence the 19th Instant for *Vienna*, being to Command again this Summer the Emperor's Army against the Turks. The Armies on the *Upper-Rhine* are drawing together, the Confederates about *Hailbron*, and the French near *Landau*. The *Bavarian* Regiments, who are to serve in *Flanders*, are expected here in few days in their march thither.

Liege, May 21. Upon the death of the Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order Expresses were sent from hence to *Vienna* and *Rome*, and till they return 'tis believed Things will continue here in the same state they are now in; for though the Canons that chose the Great Master seem resolved to make a new Election, yet 'tis believed they will not proceed therein till they know the Sentiments of the Emperor and the Pope in this matter.

Mastricht, May 21. Five Dutch Regiments of Foot, with 3 Battalions of *Suifers*, are marched from hence, to join with the Garisons of *Mafeyck*, *Tongres*, *Hasselt*, *Stoekem*, and *Reckem*, who are all ro Encamp near *Tongres* under the Command of Lieutenant General *Tetteau*. Part of the Horse and Dragoons in Garison here are likewise ordered to march thither, with a strong Detachment from *Liege*.

Paris, May 21. The Dauphin's Journey towards *Flanders* seems to be fixed for the 31th of this Month; but he intends in his way thither to stay 2 or 3 days at *Chamilly*; His Equipage sets out from *Versailles* to morrow; And the Marschal de *Luxembourg* on the 25th of this Month. 'Tis believed here that the French Army in *Catalonia* is by this time before *Palamos*, and that the *Toulon* Squadron is gone towards that Coast. We are told from *Dunkirke*, that 15 Ships arrived there the last week laden with Corn from *Fleckeren* under the Convoy of 3 French Frigats.

Brussels, May 23. General *Tetteau* has already formed a Camp between *Tongres* and *Bilfon* of the Garisons of *Mastricht*, *Mafeyck*, and other Places on that side; and the rest of the Confederate Forces are ready to take the Field upon the first Command. The French do not yet begin to Encamp; but are cantoning their Troops in the Villages about *Mons*, *Maubeuge*, *Valenciennes*, &c. The Letters from the Frontiers continue to assure us, that there are great complaints among them for the want of their Pay. We have an account, that some Spanish Men of War, and *Ostend* Privateers, have lately brought into that Port 15 Prizes, most of them laden with Corn from *Dunkirk*.

London, May 24. The King came hither on Friday night from the *Hague*; yesterday His Majesty was Complimented by all the Gentry of this County; and in the afternoon arrived here Count *Aversberg*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor. His Majesty intends to leave this place towards the latter end of this week, and to go from hence to *Breda*.

Hague, May 25. The States of *Holland* will Adjourn in 2 or 3 days, after which some of the Members of that Assembly, together with the Pensioner, design to go and wait upon the King at *Breda*, whither we hear His Majesty intends to be going from *Lee* on Saturday next. The Fleet

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of Merchant Ships which parted from *Graveland* on Friday last, arrived in the *Maeße* on Sunday under the Convoy of two Dutch Men of War. The Prince of *Sleswich*, who has been at *Utrecht* and *Amsterdam* to see those Places, parted from the last of them on the 23d Instant on his return home.

Dunwich in *Suffolk*, May 12. Their Majesties Charter for restoring this Town to their Ancient Liberties was brought hither this day, and publickly Read in the Town Hall, being received with great Rejoycing and Ringing of Bells; and afterwards such of the Magistrates Places as were void by death were filled up by choosing others in their room.

Whitehall, May 18. This day came in an Express from the Fleet, and brought Advice; That Admiral *Russell* being informed that there lay in *Bertraume Bay* a Fleet of French Merchant Ships bound to the Eastward, he detached on the 8th Instant Captain *Pickard* in the *Monmouth*, with the *Resolution*, and *Roebuck* Fireship, to endeavour to take or destroy them. They proceeded accordingly on this Service, and the 10th in the morning as soon as 'twas light made the French Shoar, about 7 miles distant from them; Upon which they Steered away directly to *Conquer Bay*, and about 5 a Clock they saw divers Ships behind a point of Land, who upon a Signal from one of their Scouts immediately loosed Sail. Captain *Pickard* ordered out his Boats to attack a great Flyboat, and after some resistance from her, and the Scouts before-mentioned, they took her. Then Captain *Pickard* pursued the great Frigate that was their Convoy, and gained so much upon her, that he was preparing to give her a Broad-side when she haled in with the Shoar, and run against the Rocks under the outermost Fort, where she blew up soon after; And this Ship, as the Prisoners declared, was the *Jersey* which the Enemy took from us some time since in the *West-Indies*. Our Frigats after this stood into *White Bay* as far as they could with safety, plying their Guns upon the French Ships that were there; who all ran ashore, being about 27 in number, and as many more in and about *Conquer*. Then our Frigats stood into *Bertraume Bay*, and took one of the Merchant Ships, the Cattle plying them all the while with Great Shot and Bombs. There were in this Fleet 6 Sloops carrying from 10 to 16 Guns, two of which, as Captain *Pickard* was informed by the Prisoners, were burnt by the blowing up of the *Jersey*: There were likewise among them 4 Ships, part of whose Lading was Guns and Mortars, and the biggest of these was put ashore on the Rocks of *St. Matthew's Point*. The Merchant Ships were in all about 55 Sail, of which 35 were burnt or sunk, viz. 25 in *White Bay*, 4 on the South side of the Point of the Bay, and 6 on the South side of *Conquer*, their Lading being generally Salt, Wine, and Brandy. It being now 4 in the Afternoon Captain *Pickard* thought it advisable as the Wind then was, to stand off again to Sea, as he did, having thus successfully Executed his Orders.

Whitehall, May 19. By another Express this day we have an account, that Their Majesties Ships the *Forefight*, Captain *Townsend* Commander, and the *England* Frigate, Captain *Croger*, being out a Cruising; on the 17th Instant, about 6 in the morning, having 4 English Privateers in their Company, they espied to the Eastward of *Cape le Hogue* a Fleet of French Merchant Ships bound to *Diep* and *Dunkirk*, and gave them Chace, and about Eleven tacked upon Five Sail, one of

which was a Man of War of Twenty two Guns, the rest Merchantmen, and put them all ashore at a rocky place called *Osmorvel*, where they were protected by a small Castle; Our Frigats stood in within Gun Shot, but finding they could do no farther Service there, they made Sail after the rest of the Fleet, and forced several of them ashore at *Cherbourg*, and whilst they kept off the French Men of War the Privateers took 6 of the Merchant Ships. The Fleet consisted of about 50 Sail, the greatest part of them laden with Corn and Bread for the Service of the French Army in *Flanders*, being Convoyed by 7 Frigats, one of 40 Guns, and the other six from 8 to 22 Guns each.
