

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, May 16.

THE Pope has appointed a Congregation of Cardinals to consider of the Matter about the late Elections at *Liege*, who have met several times, and 'tis expected they will quickly come to some Resolution in it. The French Cardinals have frequent Conferences with the Chief Ministers of this Court, upon the present juncture of Affairs. The Popes Gallies are not yet gone from *Civita Vecchia*, though the Venetian Ambassador does very much press their Departure for the *Levant*. The Differences about the Inquisition at *Naples* are not yet adjusted.

Milan, May 18. Our Governor, the Marquis *de Leganz*, is gone to *Final* to view that Garrison and the Condition of the place; and from thence designs to go to *Turin*. The Troops of this State are all Recruited, and will now in few days begin their march towards *Piedmont*. A very fine Train of Artillery is preparing here, and his Excellency has given the Command of it to Signior *Cristoforo Angiolini*.

Venice, May 21. By Letters from *Napoli di Romania* of the 16th past, we are told, That the Fleet lay ready to Sail, and the Troops to Embark, waiting only for the arrival of the great Convoy that went from hence in the beginning of the last month. Four Venetian Men of War, who had been to carry some Provisions to the Garrison of *Spina Longa*, and afterwards to Cruize in the *Archipelago*, were returned to *Napoli di Romania*, and gave the Captain General an account, That they were informed by some small Vessels they took, that the Turks were fitting out all their Men of War and Gallies; and that they had sent a Reinforcement of Men, with a great Supply of Provisions and Ammunition to *Negrepoint*.

Coruna, May 29. The Letters from *Madrid* of the 19th instant, say, That on the 15th, about 40 Sail of French Ships from the Northward, passed by *Cadix* with a strong West Wind, towards the *Straits Mouth*, supposed to be the Squadron Commanded by Monsieur *de Chasteau Renault*, and the next day they were seen off *Malaga* at a great distance. The *Ostend* Convoy was arrived at *Cadix*; and the 4 Spanish Men of War and Gallies had landed the Soldiers they were sent with to *Binesima*, and the former were returned to *Cadix*. We hear by Letters of the 22th from *O Porto*, That the English Merchant Ships bound to *Lisbon*, were arrived with their Convoy in that River.

Vienna, May 22. The Imperial Forces in *Hungary* are marching from their several Quarters to the General Rendezvous, which is appointed near *Essecke*; And in the mean time Count *Guido* of *Staremberg*, who Commands on that Frontier, has given Orders for two Bridges to be made over the *Danube*, one near *Peter Waradin*, and the other between that Place and *Essecke*, for which purpose a great many Boats have been already provided and sent down the *Danube*. We have of late had different Advices concerning Count *Tockley*, some

saying, that he was sent a Prisoner to *Adrianople*, and others, that the Grand Signior had indeed given Orders for seizing him, but that by the Interposition of some of the *Bassa's*, they were not put in Execution; This they all seem to agree in, That *Tockley* is at present in no Credit at the Port; and that the Hungarians of his Party do daily Desert him. They write from *Transilvania*, That the Imperial Forces on that side were preparing to take the Field, and 'twas believed they would make some attempt upon *Gyula*.

Hailbron, May 29. The Imperial Forces that are to act on the *Upper Rhine* this Summer, with those of *Franconia* and *Saxonia*, are encamped in our Neighbourhood; where Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is expected to morrow or next day. The French Troops assemble between *Neustadt* and *Philipsburg*; and the *Marschalls de Lange* and *Joussy* will be there in few days. The Enemy are laying a Bridge over the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*, which is almost finished; and they have got a good number of Boats together, for the making another, in case they find it necessary.

Francofort, May 30. On the 25th of this month marched by this place 1200 men of the Elector *Palatin's* Troops, to joyn the rest of the Forces of the Allies, who lie at present near *Hailbron*, to the number of about 28000. The Forces of *Saxony* are expecting every hour Orders to march; but 'tis not yet known whether they will join the Main Army Commanded by Prince *Lewis*, or Form a separate Body, together with the Troops of *Hesse* and *Munster*, about *Mantz*. We have Advice, That the French encamp near *Neustadt* and *Langfeldt*; that there may be at present about 25000 men, and that several other Regiments are on their march thither from *Lorraine*, *Alsace* and *Burgundy*. The Elector of *Brunswick Lunenburg*, who has been some time at the Bath at *Wishaden*, designs to part from thence in 2 or 3 days, on his return home.

Cologne, June 1. By the last Advices from the *Upper Rhine*, the Forces on both sides were forming their Camps; Those of the Allies near *Hailbron*, and the French about *Neustadt*. Of the former there were already about 30000 in a Body, and when the Saxons, Hessiens, and the rest of the Confederate Troops have joined them, they will be 60000 strong; The French give out that their Army will consist of about the same number. Two days ago passed through this City the Baron *de Saffig*, in his way to *Flaniers*, whither he goes in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Trier* to His Majesty of *Great Britain*.

Liege, June 1. The Disemper that lately Reigned very violently in this City is wholly ceased. The Troops that were in Garrison here are marched out, and are encamped in the Lines about this place. The *Marschal de Bonffers* is forming a small Camp near the *Meuse*.

Antwerp, June 3. N.S. About 11 this morning the King of *England* passed by this City, and was Saluted by the Cannon from the Cittadel; His Majesty Dined at a place called *Cantich*, and intended
