**T**HE Imperial Court is now at *Laxenburg*, and will continue there till the 4th of the next month. The Emperor has declared Count *Palffy*, who is at present in *Piedmont*, the Earl of *Carlingford*, and Count *Veterani*, Vice-Marshal General. The Imperial Forces in *Hungary* are to be all at their Rendezvous near *Esseck* by the middle of the next month. The Bulincfs about General *Schwym* is not yet adjusted.

**F**rankfort, June 2. Most of the Confederate Forces that are to act on the *Upper-Rhine* lie now in the Neighbourhood of *Hailbron*; Their next Camp is designed to be at *Sentzheim*, and in the mean time several Bridges are laid over the *Neckar*. We hear that the *Marschal de Lorge* was to go from *Strasbourg* the 29th past towards *Neubreda*, near which place the French Troops, he is to Command this Summer, are drawing together.

**Cologne**, June 4. Three Regiments of Bavarian Foot, making together 3500 Men, are passed down the *Rhine* towards *Flanders*; and one of Horse and another of Dragoons march thither by Land. The Troops of *Hesse* are on their march to join the Confederate Army on the *Rhine*.

**Paris**, June 4. The Letters from *Catalonia* of the 23d past told us, that the *Marschal de Noailles* was advanced, with 28000 Men, within two days march of *Gironne*, and that a Detachment of the Spanish Forces lay encamped near that place to guard the *Rosca*, and last night arrived at *Marli* the *Chevalier de Noailles*, with an account, That on the 25th the French Army passed the *River*, which runs by *Gironne*, and being opposed by the Spaniards, there happened a sharp Dispute between them, in which the French pretend to have had the advantage; but to be truly informed of this Action, and of the Loss on both sides, we must stay for a farther and more particular account of it. The *Marschal de Tourville* sailed the 19th of the last month with the Men of War from *Toulon*; but the Gallies having been twice beaten back by foul Weather, 'twas the 22th before they putted the last time from *Marfeilles*; They both directed their Course towards *Catalonia*, and are said to have on Board about 5000 Land Soldiers: Abundance of poor People from the Neighbouring Provinces, where they are not able to subsist, coming hither for Relief, and being very useles and burthen to this City, the Government made an Order to oblige them to return to the places from whence they came, but it has not been thought fit to put the same in execution, fearing it might occasion a Disturbance, as well by reason of their great numbers, as the Compassion it might move in others who suffer under the same Necessities.

**Liege**, June 4. The *Brandenburg* Forces who had their Winter Quarters about *Wesel*, are now on their march towards *Aix la Chapelle*, where their Rendezvous is appointed. The Troops that have been drawn out of this Garrison and *Maestricht* are encamp'd near *Hasselt*, under the Command of the Earl of *Athlone*, and Lieutenant General *Teresu*, consisting of 9 Regiments of Horse, 3 of Dragoons, and 10 of Foot. The *Marschal de Boufflers* lies with 12000 Horse and Foot at *Chiney* between the *Meuse* and *Luxemburg*.

**Brussels**, June 6. They write from the Frontiers, that the Dauphin designed to take a Review of his Army on the 7th or 8th Instant, and there was a Discourse among the Officers, that he would in a little time return to *Verfailles*. They write from *Mos*, that 6 Swiss Regiments were come into that Town; and 'twas thought they would not be employed in the Field this Summer, being much

weakened by Desertion, and those that remain being ready to Muriny for want of their Pay. The Elector of *Bavaria* has been with the Elector of *Cologne* to wait upon the King of *England* at *Bethlem-Abby*; and in few days his Electoral Highness will take the Field with the Spanish Troops.

**From His Majesties Camp at Bethlem-Abby, June 7.** The King came on Thursday last from *Breda* to this place; where He was met by the Elector of *Bavaria*, and his Brother the Elector of *Cologne*, who both returned last night to *Brussels*. His Majesty found Encamp'd here 25 Regiments of Foot, of which He took a Review on Saturday; and this day their number is increased to 58; five Regiments being come from *Louvaine*, and 28, who are most English and Scots, from the several Garrisons in *Flanders*: They marched from those Parts under the Command of the Duke of *Wirtemberg* and Sir *Henry Bellasis*: 7 Regiments remain at *Ghent* to bring up the Artillery, and 12 more are within a days march under the Command of Sir *David Collyer*. Our Horse lie between this place and *Dindermonde*, within two eadie days march, being Commanded by Monsieur *d'Auverquerque*; and a considerable Body of Horse and Foot is coming to join us from *Liege* and *Maestricht*. The French Army remains cantoned between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse* about *Maubeuge*, not having yet formed a Camp. The Dauphin arrived in those parts on the 3d Instant, and 'tis said, that after having taken a Review of the Army, he will return to *Paris*. On Saturday last the Magistrates of *Louvain* came to wait on the King, and made the usual Present of Wine; and in the Evening the States of *Brabant* came likewise to Complement His Majesty.

**Hague**, June 8. The States of *Holland* meet again to morrow. The Baron *de Gors*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brunswicke*, is come hither from *Brussels*, and assisted yesterday at the Congress of the Allies. They write from *Flanders*, that the Confederate Forces are marching from their several Quarters to His Majesties Camp at *Bethlem-Abby* near *Louvain*; That the Dauphin was come to *Maubeuge*; And that the main Body of the French Foot was Encamped thereabouts on the other side of the *Sambre*; but that their Cavalry lay in the Villages along that River, their Horses being in an ill Condition, and still at Grass.

**Dover**, June 4. On Monday the 28th of the last Month the Right Honourable the Earl of *Romney*, Lord Warden of the Cinque-Ports, and Master General of the Ordnance, came to *Tilbury* Fort, where he spent some time in viewing the Works of that Place; His Lordship passed afterwards over to *Gravesend*, and from thence went and visited *Sheerness*, and *Gillingham* Fort, with the other Forts and Batteries on the River *Medway*. The 29th his Lordship came to *Rocheſter*, where he was met at the Water-side by the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities, and by a great number of the Gentry of the County, one of the Militia Regiments of Foot being drawn up on each side the Street. And in the afternoon the Mayor and Aldermen waited on his Lordship at his Lodgings, and presented him with his Freedom of the City. The 30th his Lordship saw Colonel *Smithes* Regiment of Militia Horse, and Sir *Philip Butlers* Regiment of Militia Foot, drawn up about a mile from *Rocheſter*, and then proceeded on his Journey to *Canterbury*, and in his way was met by several others
