

Frankfort, June 2. The Forces of the Landgrave of Hesse are on their march, and part of them are already arrived in the Country of *Wetteravia*: Those of *Saxony* expect every hour Orders to leave their Quarters, and to join the Confederate Army; 'Tis said that his Electoral Highness has made choice of the Margrave of *Bavaria* to Command them.

Dublin, June 4. On Saturday last arrived here the *Soestdyke* Yacht, Captain *Phineas Pett* Commander, from *Chester*, who brought over the Lord Chancellor *Porter*, the Lord Chief Justice *Reynell*, and several Officers belonging to the new Regiments now raising here. The day before there came up with them a Ship under *Ostend* Colours, carrying 14 Guns and 6 Patereroes; but soon after she put up French Colours, and bearing down upon the Yacht, as if she would have boarded her, poured into her a Volley of great and small Shot. Capt. *Pett*, who had put every thing into a readiness to receive the Enemy, staid till they had first fired, and then plied them with five Guns he had brought to bear upon them, and with all the small Shot he could make, both of Seamen and Passengers, which so gauled the Privateer, (several of whose Men were seen to drop) that she tackt and stood away right before the Wind: The Yacht having lost in this Rencontre but 3 Men, who were killed by one great Shot in the Stair-Room Yesterday Morning the *Monmouth* and *Soestdyke* Yachts, with an English Privateer of 18 Guns, who was in this Harbor, went out to look after the said French Privateer.

Falmouth, June 4. On the 2d instant in the evening came into this Port the *Kent* of *London*, in 7 Weeks from *Nevis*. Yesterday was brought in here by Their Majesties Ship the *Portsmouth*, a French Privateer, of 12 Guns, called the *Joyeuse* of *St. Malo*; who was taken the 31st past; and two days before the *Portsmouth* retook a Ship of *Bristol*, and sent her to *Plimouth*. The same day came in the *Joseph* Brigantine, *John Howard* Master, from *Guinea*; from whence he came about 3 Months ago, and says, That he then heard but of one French Man of Wars being on that Coast, who had retaken *Senegal*. Last night came into Port, the *William* and *Hannibal* Privateers of *Flushing* from *Cruising*.

Plimouth, June 5. The Fleet passed by this Port yesterday to the Westward; The same day came in the *Adventure* with a French Prize, laden with Salt for *Dunkirke*.

Bristol, June 6. This day arrived here the *Talent* of this place from the *Barbadoes*; having been 6 Weeks in her passage: That Island was very Healthy when she came away.

Yarmouth, June 8. On Wednesday and yesterday morning passed through our Road above 400 Sail of laden Colliers for *London*, under Convoy of two Men of War.

Portsmouth, June 9. This morning sailed from *St. Helens* the Fleet of Merchant Ships bound to the *West Indies*, under the Convoy of several Men of War; and with them Colonel *Ruffel* takes his Passage; who is going to his Government of *Barbadoes*.

London, June 9. The great Fleet of Colliers is arrived in the River.

Whitehall, June 10. We have an account from Captain *Kiggins*, Commander of Their Majesties Ship the *Muntague*, who was cruising to the Northward with the *Oxford* and *Henry* Prize, that they had taken a French Ship of 250 Tun, and 28 Guns, called the *Tyger* of *Dunkirk*, and bound thither with Corn from *Dantzicke*. And by Letters from *Harwich* of yesterday, we are informed,

That the said Prize was brought in there by the *Henry* Prize, together with a small Vessel bound to *Dunkirke* from the Northward.
