Rome, May 29.

THE Matter about the late Election at Liege is still depending at this Court. The French press the Pope to declare it void, and to require the Chapter to proceed to a new Choice; And on the other hand, the Imperial and Spanish Ambassadors, as well as the Minister of the Elector of Bavaria, have had also long Audiences on this Subject. To determine it, the Pope has appointed a Congregation of six Cardinals, and as many Bishops, who have met several times, but are not yet agreed upon the Report they are to make in this Affair. The Soldiers designed for the Assistance of the Venetians, are now marching to Civita Vecchia, where they will Embark the next week on the Popes Gallies, which may be ready to Sail about that time for the Levant. The Gallies of Malta are to joyn them at Messina.

Milan, June 2. The Marquis de Leganes returned hither on Thursday last from Turin; and has since given out Orders for the Troops of this State to march into the Field. The Imperial Forces who have Wintered in the Duchies of Mantua, Modena, and Parma, are likewise going to leave their Quarters; The Commissary General, Couart de Briner, being come purposely from Turin to hasten their march.

Venice, June 4. Our new General, the Count de Strinsari, will Embark about the 12th of this month with all the Forces that lie ready here to pass with this Convoy to the Levant. Signior Erizzo parted from hence some days ago on his Embassy to France.

Turin, June 7. Yesterday marched from hence a Troop of the Duke of Savoy's Life-Guard, with a Regiment of Horse, and another of Dragoons, being ordered to encamp near Pancalier, with some other of his Royal Highness's Forces, who are already come into the Neighbourhood of that place. The French Troops in Dauphine march towards Sufa; but we do not hear that they are yet together in any considerable Body.

Warsaw, June 5. The Baron de Meyer, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, having concluded the Treaty of Marriage between his Electoral Highness and the Princess of Poland, parted from Zolkiew some days ago on his return to Flanders; and the King of Poland, with the whole Court is shortly expected in this City, where the Ceremony of the Marriage is to be performed on the 15th of August next.

Vienna, June 9. The Ministers of this Court, and of the Elector of Saxony, having after several Conferences adjusted all the Articles of the Treaty about General Schoning's Liberty, the same was sent to Dresden by an Expreit, who returned hither on the 6th instant with his Electoral Highness's Ratification of it; and in a day or two the

Ratifications on both sides will be exchanged, and General Schoning set at Liberty, in pursuance of this Agreement: One Condition of which is, That he shall not be employed by his Electoral Highness in any Affairs, Civil or Military, without the Emperors Consent. We have an account from Hungary, that many of the Imperial Regiments are already arrived at their Rendezvous near Buda on the Danube, and that the whole Army will be assembled there by the middle of this month. The attacking of Tera by the Turks, and their having been repulsed in three several Assaults, with the loss of 500 men, is confirmed; but the Letters add, That in their Retreat they made themselves Masters of a little Fort or Palanque, which was defended by 80 Haydukes, of whom 13 were killed, and the rest taken Prisoners. We hear that the Enemies Troops begin to assemble about Belgrade; but the Grand Viceroy is not expected there till the end of this month, or the beginning of the next. The Prince de Cambray is returned to Plannet; And Prince Eugen of Savoy, who is to Command the Emperors Forces on that side, intends to set out this week on his Journey thither.

Hallbronn, June 15. The Confederate Army was yesterday encamped at Eppingen; their Head-Quarter being at Seckbach; The Regiments of Horse that were posted at Vabingen have joined them there; and the Saxon Troops, who passed the Neckar at Wimpfen two days ago, are on their march to do the like. The French Army lies between Bruchsal and Boflar, being about 50000 strong; But we hear that they will decamp this day, and march towards Bratten.

Frankfort, June 16. Prince Lewis of Baden was by our last Advice encamped near Eppingen; and the Marechal de Lorge near Bruchsal; The latter intended to march yesterday; and its thought he will endeavour to engage the Confederates in some Action before the Troops of Saxony and Hesse have joyned them; To prevent which, Prince Lewis is using all the necessary Precautions; and in the mean time has sent to the Forces that are coming up to him, to hasten their march.

Cologne, June 18. The Elector of Cologne's Horse and Foot Guards, who, upon his Electoral Highness's going to Liege, were ordered to continue at Bonn till his return, are now Commanded to follow him to Flanders, and accordingly began their march thither yesterday. The Brandenburg Troops that were quartered in this Diocess are marched towards the Meuse.

Paris, June 18. The last Letters from Catalonia tell us, That the Castle of Palamos held out still; and that the Marechal de Tourville was arrived before that place with the French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies: The Spaniards have put a strong Reinforcement into Gironne, and another
