Madrid, June 9. We have an account of a Battle between the Spanish and French Forces in Catalonia; The chief particulars are: That the Marquis de Villana, Viceroy of that Country, being informed, that the French had assembled their Forces, and were marching towards Girona, he drew together a Body of about 11000 Foot and 4000 Horse, most of them new raised; and posted them with 12 pieces of Cannon, to defend the passage of the River Ter; but had not time to call up sufficient Reinforcements. The Enemy in the mean time advanced their march, having received a great Reinforcement by Sea which made up their Army to 20000 Foot and 3000 Horse; And on the 27th of the last month they passed the River Ter at the Head of Gualca, and passing up in 5 Spanish Battalions that were posted there, after some dispute put them into disorder: The Spanish Horse came up and charged several times, but were likewise dispersed by the Retreat of the Foot; The Viceroy finding they were overpowered by the enemies numbers, ordered all the Troops to retire, and to secure the Pass of Girona, having before taken care to send off the Artillery. The Foot retreated accordingly to Girona, where the Express that brought this News left above 2000 in a Body; and the Horse to Contem jar, being 3700, besides the Guards. The Conde de Pensabita, and Don Alonso de Granada, are killed; and the Marquis de Grignon, General of the Horse, and Don Juan Colonna, taken Prisoners, the latter being mortally wounded; and upon a Murther taken since the fight, there are found to be missing 2800 of the Foot, and Three Hundred of the Horse, so that our whole loss is about 3000 men. Since this Action, the Viceroy has put 5000 men into Barcelona, and a like Reinforcement into Girona. On the 2d the French Invited Palamos; and on the 3d raised three Batteries against it, and at the same time threw in Bombs from the Sea; And we hear this day, that the Belieged have made 2 or 3 vigorous Salies with considerable loss to the Enemy; however its thought the place cannot hold out long. There has been lately a Tumult at Saragossa of the common People against the French, who are permitted to live there. Several were killed, many Houses plundered, and some fired, and nothing could appease them till the Viceroy promised to banish all the French out of the Kingdom of Arragon, and to Confiscate their Estates. The Military Men are all ordered to repair to their Commands; and several of the Grandees are gone to their Estates to raise Men.

Turin, June 11. The Duke of Savoy has put out an Edict, dated the 23th of the last month, by which he Revokes his Edicts made in 1686. against the Protestants of the Valleys of Piedmont, takes of all Forfeitures and Confiscations, and restores them to the free Exercise of their Religion, and the Enjoyment of their Ancient Rights and Priviledges. His Royal Highness's Cavalry lies at present between Pancalier and Villa Franca, but the Infantry are not to leave their Quarters till the Germans and the Troops of the Milanze begin to approach this way, which they will now do in few days. Some French Troops are encamped near Feneffelle. We hear that the Dukes of Mantua and Modena are fully agreed with the Imperialists about the matter of the Contributions, and have already paid greatest part thereof; and his believed the Duke of Parma will follow their Example.

Venice, June 11. The Convoy designed for the Levant lies now ready to sail with 2500 Soldiers, a great Sum of Money, and large supplies of Provisions for the Army.
