Cadix, June 6. N. S.

**R**ear Admiral *Neville* continues with the English and Dutch Squadron in this Bay; Where 10 Spanish Men of War lie likewise ready to sail under the Command of Admiral *Papachino*.

*Malaga*, June 8. N. S. Yesterday sailed out of this Road the Fleet of English and Dutch Merchant Ships, bound home from *Alicant* with their Convoy. The French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies was by our last Advice in the Bay of *Rosés*, intending to sail from thence towards *Palamos* and *Barcelona* to second the Designs of their Army in *Catalonia*.

*Madrid*, June 16. Upon the late Advices from *Catalonia*, the Council of State has met several times to give the necessary Orders for opposing the Enemy, who, according to our last Letters, were still before *Palamos*: Many of the *Grandeas* are, by the Kings particular Order, gone to their Estates to raise Men; and the last week was published an Order, requiring all the Knights of the Four Military Orders, except such as have a reasonable Excuse, to repair, with their Servants, well Mounted and Armed, to His Majesties Army in *Catalonia*. The Duke *d'Offina*, who was appointed by the King to be Vicar General of *Andaluzia*, and was preparing for his Journey thither, died suddenly in the beginning of this month as he was coming from *Council*. The Marquis *de Gastañaga*, is, as we are told, made General of the Spanish Forces in *Biscay*. Don *Francisco de Castilla*, formerly Governor of *Charleroy* in *Flanders*, is named to be Mestre de Camp General in *Catalonia*; where Don *Francisco de Pignatelli*, who has likewise served long in *Flanders*, is made General of the Artillery.

*Naples*, June 1. This week arrived here from *Genova* 5 Gallies of the Duke of *Turkis*'s Squadron, to join with those of *Naples* and *Sicily*, which are now fitting out. Our Viceroy continues his care, to supply the Governor of *Milan* with Money from hence, having lately remitted to him a considerable Sum, for the Service of the War. The Coasts of this Kingdom are much infested by small Corsairs, who have taken several Satees and other Vessels that were coming hither from *Sicily*. We are told from *Messina*, that the Gallies of *Malta* are expected

there about the middle of this month in their way towards the *Levant*.

*Genova*, June 5. This Republick has resolved to send their Secretary *Salvago* to *Milan*, to Adjust the Matter about the Contributions, which has been depending for some time. Two days ago arrived here Signior *Erizzo*, Ambassador from the State of *Venice* to the French King; and from hence he intends to pass by Sea to *Marseilles*.

*Milan*, June 10. General *Caprara* parted from hence on the 5th Instant for *Vienna*, after having had several Conferences with the Marquis *de Leganes*, our Governor, about the Affairs of the War. The Troops of this State will begin their march in few days towards *Piedmont*. The Imperial Forces are moving that way; Those that have Wintered in the Duchies of *Parma* and *Mantua* taking their march through this Country. In the mean time we have an account from *Turin*, that the Duke of *Savoy's* Cavalry was already Encamp'd between *Pancalier* and *Villa-Franca*, and that the Foot had likewise Orders to leave their Quarters. Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* is daily expected from *Vienna*, and till he arrives the Imperial Forces are Commanded by Count *Palffy*.

*Warsaw*, June 10. The King of *Poland* has written to the Pope, the Emperor, and other Princes, to acquaint them with the Conclusion of the Treaty of Marriage between the Princess his Daughter, and the Elector of *Bavaria*. The Baron *de Meyer*, who Signed this Treaty on the part of his Electoral Highness, is returned to *Brussels*; and the Count *de Prysingen* is to come hither with the Character of his Electoral Highnesses Ambassador, to conduct the Princess to *Flanders*. Several Conferences have been lately held at *Zolkiew*, where the Court still continues, to consult about the Preparations for the Campaign, as well as the Treaty of Peace with the Turks, which is to be set on foot at some convenient place on the Frontiers of *Hungary* or *Moldavia*. The Tartars assemble their Troops in the Country of *Budziacke*; and the Han, as we understand by the Advices from those parts, will begin his march towards *Hungary* about the middle of this month. The Garrison of *Caminiec* continues to suffer very much by the scarcity of Provisions: They have long expected a great Convoy from *Moldavia*; and in the mean time some small Supplies get by stealth into the place, which but just afford them the means of subsisting.

Vienna, June 16. They write from *Hermensdorf* that two Hungarian Officers, who had considerable Commands under *Teckley*, have followed the Example of *Darozzi* in quitting his Party, and retiring to their own Estates, upon a Promise of the Emperor's Pardon for what is past. Count *Teckley* continues to have his Residence at *Passerowitz*, being in very little Credit at the Port. The Tartars begin to be in motion in *Valachia* and *Moldavia*; and General *Veterani* has thereupon taken care to secure all the Passes on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, to prevent the Incursions which their Parties might otherwise make into that Country. The Imperial Forces assemble near *Effecke* on the *Drave*; and when the Troops that are marching thither are all joined, they will make an Army of 44000 Germans, besides the Hungarians and *Radziens*. General *Caprara* is daily expected here from *Piedmont*; The Count *de Hayderheim* is to Command under him as General of the Horse, and Count *Guido of Staremberg* as General of the Foot. We hear from the Frontiers, that the *Radziens* have defeated a Party of 400 Turks who were conducting several Wagons with Provisions to *Belgrade*.

*Plimouth*, June 26. Yesterday sailed hence for *St. Maio* the *Betty* Transport Ship with 142 French Prisoners. And this day came into this Port the *Spanish-Alliance* Pacquet Boat in 6 days from the *Greyn*.

*Bristol*, June 27. Yesterday arrived here the *John and Susanna*, the *Richard and John*, the *Malaga-Merchant*, and the *Lamb*, all four from *Virginia*, who confirm the News of the taking of a French Man of War of 56 Guns off of *Cape-Clare* by the *Weymouth* and *Dunkirke*, after the former, commanded by Capt. *Fumper*, had fought her from morning till night, when the *Dunkirke* coming in she yielded, and was carried to *Kinsale*.

*Portsmouth*, June 29. This morning my Lord *Berkeley*, with the Fleet under his Command, sailed from *St. Helens*, and about 3 in the Afternoon they were out of sight, the Wind at *W. and W. S. W.*

*Deale*, June 29. Yesterday in the afternoon arrived in the Downs Their Majesties Ships the *Greyn*, *Norwich*, *England-Frigate*, and *Delaval*, with the homeward bound *O-Ringo* and *Lisbon* Fleets and some Light Victuallers and Tenders, in all about 60 Sail, most of which are sailed for the River; There also came in with them 3 Ships from the *West-Indies*, to wit, the *Hope* from *Barbadoes*, the *Kent* from *Nevis*; and the *King William* Yacht from *Jamaica*.

*Deale*, June 30. Yesterday in the Evening arrived here 10 Sail of Merchant Ships from *Alicant* and *Malaga*, 8 of which, without stopping in the Downs, proceeded for the River. They parted on the 2d Instant near the *Streights Mouth* with the rest of the *Alicant* Fleet under the Convoy of the *Rochester* and *Winchester*; who went to *Cadix*.

There are Two Mails wanting from Holland, besides that of Friday last.

London, July 2. On Saturday night last Eleven hundred eighty one thousand nine hundred twenty five Pounds was subscribed towards the Bank of England, and the Commissioners will continue to meet at *Mercers Hall* in *Chancery*, till the whole Sum of Twelve hundred thousand Pounds is subscribed; And in the next Thursday's Gazette notice will be given when and where the Subscribers are to meet to chuse the first Governour, Deputy Governour, and Twenty four Directors of the intended Corporation.
