#### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914,") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

- 1.—(1) The following words shall be added at the end of sub-section (2) of Regulation 2r:—"and any such order may direct that all contracts, or any class of contracts, or any special contract, affected by any provision applied by the order shall remain in force notwithstanding anything in the provision as so applied, but subject to any modifications for which provision may be made by the order."
- (2) In Provision No. II. of the provisions appended to Regulation 2F, the following words shall be inserted at the end of the provision:—"and where the order prohibits or restricts the use of the article for any special purpose a person shall not (subject to any conditions contained in the order), if the use of the article is prohibited, use the article for that purpose, or, if the use of the article is restricted, use it except in accordance with the restrictions."
- (3) In Provision No. IV. of the provisions appended to Regulation 2r, after the words "the distribution of the article" there shall be inserted the words "or as to the consumption of the article," and the words "distribution or consumption" shall be substituted for the words "or distribution."
- 2. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 10:---
  - "10. The competent naval or military autho-

rity or the Minister of Munitions may by order-

(1) require all or any licensed premises within any area specified in the order to be closed, either altogether, or subject to such exceptions as to hours and purposes, and to compliance with such directions, as may be specified in the order;

(2) make such provisions as he thinks necessary for the prevention of the practice of treating in any licensed premises within

any area specified in the order.
"Any order of the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions under this regulation may be made to apply either generally or as respects all or any members of His Majesty's forces mentioned in the order, and may require copies of the order to be exhibited in a prominent place in any licensed premises affected thereby.

"If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of an order made under this regulation or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations, and the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions may cause such steps to be taken as may be necessary to en-

force compliance with the order.

"In this regulation the expression 'licensed premises 'includes any premises or place where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under a licence."

3. After Regulation 10s the following regu-

lation shall be inserted:

"10c. Where it appears to the Admiralty or the Army Council or to the Minister of Munitions that the use of any premises or place (whether licensed for the purpose or not) for public singing, dancing, music, or other public entertainment of the like kind, is prejudicial to the discipline of any members of His Majesty's forces, or to the production of war material, the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions (as the case may be) may by order require the premises or place to be closed for those purposes, either altogether, or subject to such conditions as to hours and purposes or otherwise as may be specified in the order.

"If the occupier of any such premises or place or any other person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of an order made under this regulation or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations, and the competent naval or military authority or the Minister of Munitions may cause such steps to be taken as may be necessary to enforce

compliance with the order."

4. The following regulation shall be inserted after Regulation 35a:—

"35AA. It shall be lawful for the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions, with the concurrence of a Secretary of State, to make and apply to any factory or other premises in or upon which any explosive substance or any substance required for the production thereof is manufactured, treated, produced, stored, or in any way used or handled, rules with a view to securing the health of all or any of the persons managing, or employed or being in or about such premises, and in particular rules requiring any occupier of such premises to provide any form of medical attendance, whether on the premises or otherwise, nourishment, clothing, ventilation, or other

sanitary arrangements, or to provide and use or to refrain from using any machinery, appliance, method, or process, and by such rules to impose duties on the persons managing, or employed or being in or about such premises.

Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any such rule shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

5. At the end of proviso (c) to the first paragraph of Regulation 41a after the words "may direct" there shall be inserted the following

paragraph:

"It shall be the duty of every person who under this regulation is required to make such list as aforesaid, or who keeps such record as aforesaid, to deliver forthwith to the recruiting officer for the locality in which the premises at which the persons included in the list or record are employed, or if such persons are not employed at or about any premises the employer's premises, are situated, a true copy of such list and record, and thereafter to deliver to such recruiting officer during the first week in each calendar month a written report showing any alterations and additions to the said list and record down to the last day of the preceding calendar month, and if he fails to do so he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

6. After Regulation 41A the following regu-

lation shall be inserted:-

"41AA.—(1) Without prejudice to any duty imposed on employers by Regulation 41A, it shall be the duty of every person who in Great Britain takes into his employment any male person who has attained the age of 18 and has not attained the age of 42 in any establishment where munitions work, as defined in section nine of the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916, is carried on, or in an establishment of any class to which this regulation may be applied by order of the Army Council, to deliver, within twenty-four hours after such person is so taken into employment, to the recruiting officer for the locality in which the premises at which such person is employed, or if such persons are not employed at or about any premises the employer's premises, are situated, the particulars in writing concerning. such man specified in the table annexed to Regulation 41a, and if any person fails to comply with this regulation, or gives any false information in the particulars required to be delivered, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

(2) It shall be the duty of every person who is taken into employment in any establishment to which this regulation applies, to furnish to his employer, when so required, such information as may be necessary to enable him to deliver the particulars aforesaid, and if he fails to do so, or gives any false information, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations."

7. After Regulation 41s the following regu-

lation shall be inserted:-

"41c.—(1) Regulation 41B shall apply to any country which is for the time being under blockade on the part of the Allies in the same manner as it applies to an enemy country, and to any persons who would be enemies if the. country so under blockade were an enemy country in the same manner as it applies to

(2) This regulation shall be deemed to have: had effect as from the eighth day of December, nineteen hundred and sixteen.'

8. After Regulation 42A the following regu-

lation shall be inserted:

42B. If any person, without the consent of the Admiralty or Army Council respectively, communicates either directly or indirectly with any member of any of His Majesty's naval or military forces or with the commanding or other officer of such member with intent to induce or assist such member to obtain or apply for his release, transfer to the reserve, or discharge, so that he may during the continuance of the war engage in civil employment, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these

'Any communication with a member of any of His Majesty's forces or an officer of such member stating that if such member is released, transferred to the reserve, or discharged, employment can or may be found for him, shall be deemed to have been made with the said intent

unless the contrary is proved.
"Nothing in this regulation shall apply to communications with or by a Government de-

partment.

"The Admiralty or Army Council may by order grant exemptions from the provisions of this regulation as respects any members or class

of members of His Majesty's naval or military forces respectively.

9. In subsection (11) of Regulation 56 the words "an aliens officer, or a person authorised by the Government Department concerned" shall be substituted for the words "or an aliens officer"; and the following words shall be inserted at the end of that subsection: -- "Where any of these regulations enables any Government Department to apply by order the regulation or any provision contained in or ap-pended to the regulation, or to make rules or orders, the Government Department by whose order the regulation or provision is applied, or by which the rules or orders are made, shall, for the purposes of this provision, as respects offences against the regulation as so applied, or offences by way of contravention or failure to comply with the rules or orders, be the Government Department concerned; and where the administration of any regulation is assigned by the regulation to any special department, that Government Department shall, for the purposes of this provision, as respects offences against that regulation, be the Government Department concerned."

#### PRESEÑT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 14th day of December,

1916, in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we consider that certain changes should be made in the Regulations governing the conditions of service of Officers of Your Majesty's Fleet employed on Transport Duties:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the establishment of a Royal Naval Transport Service, under the Regulations set forth in the annexed Schedule, with effect as from the 1st December,

''The Commissioners of Lords Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

#### "SCHEDULE.

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If provided with quarters or victualled, a deduction to be made equivalent to the regulated allowances for lodging and provisions.

2. The consolidated rates to cover every

allowance except: --

(a) Outfit allowance for Retired, Emer-

gency, and Temporary Officers.

(b) Bonus of 25 per cent. for Retired Officers, which is to be assessed on the rate of full pay they would receive under ordinary conditions.

(c) The bonus of 25 per cent. to Emergency Officers, which is to be assessed on the same basis, but payment is to be in accordance with the special rules for Emergency Officers.

3. The consolidated rates to be subject to the usual deduction for commuted retired pay and for gratuity on discharge from Active List.

4. The above rates of pay not to apply to Engineer Officers, Accountant Officers, Chief Gunners, Chief Boatswains, Officers of the Carpenter Branch, Chief Officers of Coast Guard, Lieutenants and Quartermasters Royal Marines, and all these Officers to retain their present rates of pay and allowances.

5. Officers granted a higher relative Rank under the above table to enjoy the status and wear the uniform of that higher Rank, but not to be entitled to use the higher naval title.

6. Officers now serving to retain their present rates of pay until the termination of their present appointments in cases where it is

to their advantage to do so.'

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 23RD DECEMBER 1916.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

The restrictions on movement of swine imposed by the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 and the Norfolk (Swine-Fever) Order of 1915 shall not apply to the movement of swine from the sale mentioned in the Schedule hereto to any premises in Great Britain not being in a swine-fever infected place, if the swine are accompanied

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by a licence in the Form F set forth in the First Schedule to the said Order granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate and subject to the following conditions:

- (i.) The swine shall be moved to the place of destination specified in the licence and not elsewhere and shall be there detained and isolated from other swine for twentyeight days, unless they are slaughtered on such premises before the expiration of that period, or are moved under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence in the Form C set forth in the said First Schedule to a bacon-factory or slaughter-house in the same Scheduled Area.
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and during the movement shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all swine not being moved with a licence under this Order.
- (iii.) After completion of the movement the licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest policestation in the same District by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing such movement.

A licence under this Order shall for the purposes of the above-mentioned Order of 1908 be treated as a licence under that Order.

Contraction of Limits of Swine-Fever Infected

1. The limits of the Swine-Fever Infected Area declared by Order of the Board dated the fifth day of October, nineteen hundred and sixteen, are hereby contracted so as to comprise only the Area described in the Schedule to this Order, and the Area so described is hereby declared to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area for the purposes of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908.

#### Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-seventh day of December, nineteen hundred and sixteen.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 23RD DECEMBER 1916. )

NORTH OF ENGLAND (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1916.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Movement out of, and Holding of Markets, etc., within, Scheduled District.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine, shall be moved out of, and no market, fair, sale or exhibition of any such animals shall be held on any premises situate within the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereto 1914, and of every other power enabling inafter referred to as the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such District, except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### Offences.

3. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animals, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

#### Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the North of England (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1916.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 23RD DECEMBER 1910.,

YORKSHIRE (WEST RIDING) AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1916.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be landed in or moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District;

provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District, without unnecessary delay, and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed

to be within the Scheduled District.

#### Power to Restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

- 2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath, or right-of-way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say;
  - (i) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.
  - (ii) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.
- (2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.
- (3.) A copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

#### Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.

- 3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a Notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—
  - (a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the Notice, dogs on such premises;

or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;

or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after source of any such Notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by Notice affixed

or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such Notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such Notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

- (3.) Every Notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further Notice served by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority.
- (4.) A copy of every Notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Secretary, Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place. London, S.W.

#### Local Authority to Enforce Order.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### Offences.

- 5.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the owner, and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (3.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

#### Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the Yorkshire (West Riding) and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1916.

YORKSHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1916.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

#### Movement of Animals out of Scheduled District.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of the district described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such district by railway from a place

outside such district to another place outside such district without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such district, except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

Holding of Markets and Sales of Animals for Immediate Slaughter.

- 2.—(1) No market or sale of animals shall be held on any premises situate in a Scheduled District to which this Order applies, unless the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.
- (2) An animal exposed for sale at any such market or sale shall not be moved out of the market or saleyard unless it is accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district in which the market or saleyard is situate and only to a slaughterhouse in the Scheduled District.
- (3) Every licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (4) A copy of a licence granted under this Article shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the police station nearest to the place of destination specified in the licence in any case in which that place is situate in another district.
- (5) Where animals are moved with a licence under this Order, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an Officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police station in the same district by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

#### General Provisions as to Movement.

3. Animals while being moved with a licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the slaughter-house specified in the licence, where they shall be detained until they are slaughtered.

#### Saving for Orders and Regulations.

4. The holding of a market or sale and the movement of animals under this Order are subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

#### Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

5.—(1) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board, or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or

extract from it to be taken by the person to

whom it is produced.

(2) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

#### Offences.

6. If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

#### Interpretation.

7. In this Order-

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases

of Animals Act, 1894.
"The Board" means the Board of Agricul-

ture and Fisheries.

"Animals" means cattle, sheep, goats, and

"Slaughter-house" means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon-factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Prohibition of Landing except for slaughter within Landing Place.

- 1.—(1.) Cattle, sheep, goats or swine shipped from Ireland shall not, unless and until it is otherwise ordered by the Board, be landed after the date hereof at any port or place in Great Britain except in accordance with the following provisions of this Order.
- (2.) Cattle, sheep, goats or swine shipped from any port in Ireland which is mentioned in the First Schedule to the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Consolidation and Amendment Order of 1914, may after the date hereof be landed at any landing place defined by Order of the Board as a landing place for Irish animals, but only for the purpose of slaughter within the landing place.
- (3.) The landing of any animals under this Order must be authorised by the Superintendent or person in charge of the landing place.
- (4.) Animals so landed shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Consolidation and Amendment Order of 1914, except that the animals shall not be moved from the landing place, and shall be slaughtered therein within ninety-six hours after their landing.

Special Provision as to Animals Destined for Manchester Irish Animals' Landing Place.

2. Animals, if intended to be landed at the Manchester Irish Animals' Landing Place under this Order, shall not be carried through the Eastham lock until they have been examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Board, and unless and until the Inspector certifies that his examination and information do not show that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

#### Local Authority to Enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### Offences.

4. If any animal shall be landed or moved in contravention of this Order, or is not slaughtered as hereby required, the owner thereof and the owner and the lessed and the occupier of the place of landing, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the landing or movement, and the owner and person in charge of the animal owner and person in charge of the animal which is not so slaughtered, and the owner and the charterer, and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, as the case may be,

shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act,

5. This Order may be cited as the Animals (LANDING FROM IRELAND) ORDER OF 1916.
