Constantinople, April 7.

THE new Visier *Ali Bassa* is not yet arrived at *Adrianople*, that we hear of, but in the mean time Orders are given to provide all things necessary for his going into the Field; His Predecessor tet out the 10th of the last month towards his Government of *Tripoli di Sorza*, having obtained an Order from the Grand Signior to proceed thither without any molestation, for which he gave the Messenger that brought it 5 Purfes of Money, but notwithstanding this a Capigi with several Bostangies was dispatched after him, to bring him back; and now all his Estate is seized, and he himself is a Prisoner, and in great danger of loosing his Life; Another Capigi was sent about the same time to fetch the Head of *Ali Bassa*, who was Grand Visier before him, and the *Kehaia* of *Osman Bassa* (the deceased *Kimacan* of *Adrianople*) was put under confinement, and both his own and Master's Estate seized on: Which is done to bring in Money towards defraying the Charges of the War. The Grand Signior has ordered that the *Divan* shall for the future meet twice a week in the *Seraglio*, which had been left off for some years. On the 26th the Head of *Ismael Bassa* was carried to *Adrianople*; and the Head of the *Bassa* of *Ferusalem* is sent for, for oppressing the People under their Government. On the 29th the *Caimacan* of *Adrianople* was Married to the Daughter of the late Sultan *Mahomet*; The Bride was conducted with great State from the *Seraglio* to her Husbands House; The *Tefterdar* and *Janifar Aga*, made her Presents to the value of 10000 Dollars each, by the Grand Signior's particular Command; and the Grand Signior and the *Sultana* were present at the Wedding, which lasted 3 days. On the 2d Instant the *Kislar Aga* was discharged from his Office, and banished to *Grand Cairo*, which was procured by the *Sultana*, and the *Bach Agasi*, or Eunuch that attended her, is put into his place. On the first Instant 1200 *Janifaries* marched from *Adrianople*, carrying with them a Sum of Money to pay the Garifons of *Belgrade* and *Temeswar*. We are told that there are great Disturbances among the *Tartars*, which may hinder the *Han's* march to *Hungary*.

The Grand Signior's Order for the departure of the Venetians out of this Empire is signified every where, and they must all be gone by the latter end of this month.

Kinsale, June 22. On Wednesday last came into this Port Their Majesties Ships the *Dunkirke*, Captain *Dilkes*, and the *Weymouth*, Captain *Funper* who brought in with them a French Privateer of 54 Guns, and 340 Men, called the *Invincible* of *St. Maio*: The *Weymouth* engaged her on Sunday the 17th at two in the morning; The Privateer made a running Fight till Eight at night, when her Maintopmast was brought by the Board, and thereupon she immediately Struck. The *Weymouth* had but one Man killed, and 15 wounded; and the French had 12 killed outright, and 42 wounded. They were both very much shattered in their Masts and Rigging. Soon after the Fight our Frigats met with 6 *Virginia* Ships homeward bound, 5 of which are sailed for *Bristol*, the other being bound for *London* is still in this Harbour.

Dublin, June 27. This day arrived here Their Majesties Ship the *Scarborough*, the *Pearle*, and *Talbot Pink*, with some Merchant Ships under their Convoy; Who on the 24th off of *Youhall* met with two French Privateers, and two small Prizes in their Company which they had taken on that Coast. The *Scarborough* gave chase to the Privateers, but they got away; and in the mean time the *Pearle* and *Talbot Pink* retook the two Prizes. Their Majesties Ship the *Dolphin* sailed out of this Bay two days ago to cruise.

Falmouth, June 30. Yesterday came into this Port the *Salamander* of *Rotterdam*, and bound thither, with Tobacco and Logwood for *Curassow*. This day passed by a Fleet of Merchant Ships, being between 20 and 30 Sail, to the Westward.

Plymouth, July 1. On the 27th arrived here in 27 days from *Cadiz* the *Paraketa* of this place laden with Wine and Oyl. And this day came in the *Arne* of *London*, and the *John* and *Thomas* of *Colchester*, both from *Malaga*; They came from *Cadiz* under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War; who are gone North about with divers Dutch Merchant Ships. Last night arrived

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ried here the *Nevis-Merchant* in 42 days from Barbadoes; whence she came in company of about 20 Sail more who are pass'd by to the Eastward. Several Ships are now seen in the Offin, coming in from the Westward; suppos'd to be some of Their Majesties Ships, with the Merchantmen under their Convoy from Ireland.

Bristol, July 2. On the 30th arriv'd here the *Adventure* of this place in 6 weeks from Virginia. Yesterday came in the *Susanna* Brigantine in Eleven weeks from Jamaica; The *Vine* and *John* Frigats, both of this Port, came out in company with her, and are expected in every Tide. Last night arriv'd the *Drummer* Ketch of and from Antegoa, but last from Milford.

Yarmouth, July 2. Yesterday came into our Road about 300 Laden Colliers with their Convoy bound for the River.

Deale, July 3. On the 30th arriv'd in the Downs the *Granada*, Captain *Keble* Commander, from Malaga. On Sunday came in Their Majesties Ships the *Swiftsure*, *Elizabeth*, *Garland*, *African*, and *Godwin* Prize, and brought in with them about 60 Sail of Suedes and Danes laden with Corn, Deal Boards, Pitch, Tar, &c. for France. This morning arriv'd in the Downs 19 Sail of Merchant Ships from Barbadoes.

Rye-Bay, July 3. The Fleet under the Command of my Lord *Berkeley* came to an Anchor here this Afternoon: We had yesterday very bad weather, in which some of the small Vessels and Tenders were separated from the Fleet.
