

wounding the Captain, and killing several of his Men; But there being little Wind, the Privateer got away with the help of his Oars. They write from Madrid of the 30th of the last month, that the Duke d'Escalona, Viceroy of Catalonia, and the Marquis de Conflans, were joined with the Nobility of that Kingdom, and some Troops of Arragon, and made a Body of 16000 Foot and 4000 Horse.

Hailbron, July 6. The Confederate Army under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden is marched from Felsloch nearer to the Neckar. 'Tis said that they intend to resort to Mannheim; and that the Circles of Franconia and Suabia offer to furnish 12000 Boors for this Service.

From Prince Lewis's Camp near Schwetzingen, July 6. We are now encamped within an hours march from hence towards Mannheim; Prince Lewis has given Orders for providing of Materials to lay a Bridge over the Rhine. We expect in a day or two the rest of the Saxon Forces, and the Brandenburg Troops who are to join us; The Hessians and Munsteriens lie at present at Gernsheim, and make a Body of 10000 Men. The French are encamped on the other side of the Rhine between Osthouen and Westhouen, from whence they have sent out Detachments to Oppenheim and Guntersblum with Orders to destroy the Country where e're they come. We have sent out several Parties to observe them.

Francfort, July 8. The French Army repassed the Rhine the 29th of the last month, and is since marched lower down towards Wormes and Oppenheim; They destroy all the Corn and Forage they find on the Ground. Prince Lewis of Baden marches towards the Rhine; and has at present his Head Quarters at Schwetzingen. Several Parties of Hussars are gone over that River, to annoy the Enemy all they can. The Troops of Hesse, Munster, and Paderborne, are marched towards the Neckar, and are to join to morrow with the Neuburgers at Gernsheim. The Election of a new Great Master of the Teutonic Order is to be made on the 11th Instant at Mergenthal.

Cologne, July 9. The Letters from the Palatinaz tell us, that the French Army was marching back from Oppenheim to Frankendal, destroying the Country in their march, that the Germans may not be able to subsist on this side the Rhine. Prince Lewis of Baden had ordered a Bridge to be made at Mannheim.

Hague, June 13. N. S. The Deputies of the Admiralties are gone home, after having had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States. The Dutch Men of War that came lately into the Texell are ordered to go forthwith to Sea again, being reinforced with several other Ships. Our Army in Flanders continues encamped at Roosbeck; and the French between Tugres and Warhem; The Elector of Bavaria is marched from Ische nearer to His Majesties Camp. The Baron de Ley is come hither from the Elector of Trier.

Falmouth, July 7. On the 3d Instant came into this Port the Dartmouth, Captain Vaughan Commander; who two days before retook the Thomas and Francis of London, bound home from Malaga. This Evening arrived here the Spanish Expedition in 7 days from the Groyne.

Bristol, July 7. On the 5th arrived here the Rose of this place in 6 weeks from Antegoa, the Commander whereof informs us, that before he left that Island two of our Men of War had

taken two French Merchant Ships bound home from Martinico.

Chester, July 8. We have an account from Belfast in Ireland, by Letters of the 30th past, that the Dolphin Frigate of 24 Guns, Capt. Kercher Commander, was come in there with a Ship of London, bound home from Antegoa, which was taken by a French Privateer of 34 Guns and 250 Men, and retaken by the Dolphin, after a Dispute of 3 hours, when the Privateer bore away.
