

new Reinforcement: The Sieur Gurski endeavoured thereupon to retire, but finding himself beset on all sides, he resolved to fight his way through these detachments of the Enemies Troops, and effected the same with the loss only of about 40 men. Soon after, another of our Parties of 600 men attackt the Enemies Rear, with whom they had a very sharp dispute, killing 4 or 500 of them, and on our side were killed about 100. The Tartars perceiving our Forces began to draw together from all parts, thought fit to retire in time, and on the 15th of this month, they had quitted the Territories of this Crown, after having committed great Spoil in several places. While this was doing on our Frontiers, the Chann himself marched with another Body of Tartars against the Cossacks, who have of late made great Inroads into the *Chimée*.

Whitehall, July 14. By Letters from the Fleet, under the Command of my Lord Berkeley, dated the 9th Instant in *Diep-Bay*, we have Advice, That they arrived there the day before, but had not yet attempted any thing by reason of the blowing Weather.

Whitehall, July 15. This Evening arrived here an Express from my Lord Berkeley, with Letters dated the 13th, in *Diep-Bay*, giving an Account that the Day before, and the Night following, they fired above eleven hundred Bombs and Cannon-balls into the Town with very good effect, setting it on Fire in several places, which burnt very violently, and still continued when this Express came away; 'Twas believed that half of the Town was then burnt and beat down, and that by the next Morning the rest would be likewise in Ashes. Several Troops were seen on the Hills on each side the Town; And the Enemy fired on the 12th at least fifteen hundred Shot and Bombs, most of which went beyond our Bomb-Vessels: And we had not above 4 or 5 Men killed and wounded. One Shell fell in one of our Bomb-Vessels, and broke upon the Deck, but the men had time to leap over-board, who were all saved, and the Vessel did not receive much damage.
