And whereas by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 22nd day of May, 1883, the 9th day of May, 1892, the 29th day of June, 1896, and the 10th day of August, 1903, the Dues leviable in respect of the said Lighthouses for the Classes of Ships therein respectively mentioned were duly fixed:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the 21st day of October, 1912, His Majesty directed that, as from the 1st day of April, 1913, or from the time of the receipt of notice of that Order, if that be later, by the Officers authorized to collect Light Dues, the Dues thenceforth to be levied should be as follows, that is to say, in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, three-sixteenths of one penny per ton, and in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse one-sixteenth of one penny per ton, of the burden of every Ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said Lights respectively, subject in each case to a reduction of 25 per cent:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the said Dues should be altered in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers so vested in Him by the above recited provisions, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth by this Order in Council order, and it is hereby ordered, that as from the 1st day of April, 1917, or from the time of the receipt of this Order, if that be later, by the Officers authorized to collect Light Dues, the Dues thenceforth to be levied shall be as follows, that is to say, in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, three-eighths of one penny per ton, and in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse one-eighth of one penny per ton of the burden of every Ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said Lights respectively.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 14th day of December, in the year 1916, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the

31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called ‘the said Benefice’) of Harlington, in the County of Middlesex, and in the Diocese of London:

“Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Harlington is vested for an estate in fee simple, subject only to a Mortgage, in Emily Pauline Batty, wife of Erskine Fitzherbert Batty, of Ballyhealy, in the County of Westmeath, Ireland, Barrister-at-Law, Pauline Anna French, wife of Major Arthur French, of Cloonyquin, in the County of Roscommon, Ireland, and Annette Mary Victoria Haddock, of No. 24, Bathwick Street, Bath, in the County of Somerset, Spinster:

“And whereas the said mortgage is vested in Archibald Edward Wilson, of Kingsgate House, Winchester, in the County of Hants, Esquire, upon trust for Mary Lady Wilson, of The Moorings, Woking, in the County of Surrey, Widow, for her life, and afterwards for Jeannie Catherine Wilson, of The Moorings aforesaid, Spinster:

“And whereas the said Emily Pauline Batty, Pauline Anna French, Annette Mary Victoria Haddock, Archibald Edward Wilson, Mary Lady Wilson, and Jeannie Catherine Wilson are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Harlington should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Arthur Foley, now Bishop of London, and his Successors in the same Bishopric:

“And whereas the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore-mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

“And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Harlington, which is hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson, so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Harlington:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Emily Pauline Batty, Pauline Anna French, Annette Mary Victoria Haddock, Archibald Edward Wilson, Mary Lady Wilson and Jeannie Catherine Wilson, (in testimony whereof they have severally signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme, and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the
