Rome, July 3.

ON Tuesday last, the Constable de Colonna presented to the Pope, in the Name of the King of Spain, from whom he had for this occasion the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary, the Annual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples. The Cardinal de Fourbin had this Week a long Audience of the Pope, about the business of Liege, and introduced to him the Sieur Valieri, who is sent hither by the Cardinal de Bouillon, to justify the Protestation he has made against the Election of Prince Clement of Bavaria, Elector of Cologne, to that See, but the Pope has referred the consideration of this whole matter, to the Congregation of Cardinals and Prelates, who are to meet the 22th of this month. The Popes Gallies are sailed for the Levant; and there are gone with them 1000 Land Soldiers.

Venice, June 9. The Letters from Dalmatia give us the particulars which follow, of the taking of the Fortres of Ciclut, by the Forces of this Republick. About the beginning of the last month, the Proveditore-General Desino drew together 12000 Foot and 4000 Horse, of Regular Troops, and the Militia of Dalmatia, and having taken a Review of them, he caused the Foot, with the Artillery, Ammunition, and Provisions, to Embark on the Gallies, and other Vessels that were provided for this Service; and on the 12th, came within a Mile of Ciclut, where he Landed his men, and soon after Invested the place. The Night following, they began to work on two Batteries, which were finished the next Morning, and made use of to batter two Towers, which covered the Enemies Bridge on the River Narenta. The 13th, the Turks that were Posted in them surrendered, upon condition to march away with their Arms and Baggage: Towards Night we made our selves Masters of the Suburb of the Town, and raised a new Battery of two Mortars. The 17th, Signior Capello rejoined us with the Horse, which had marched by Land through very difficult ways. The same day, 500 Turkish Horse appeared, as also divers Barks with Foot, who attempted to put Relief into the Town, but were repulsed; upon which, the Garison Capitulared on the 18th, and marched out the 21th to the number of 500 men, with their Arms and Baggage, and were conducted towards Albania. We found in the place 18 Pieces of Cannon, with a good quantity of Ammunition. The Turks appeared again with a great Body of Horse and Foot, but finding the Town was surrendered, they soon retired. This place will be of great advantage to us, in extending our Contributions, since it opens a passage into Albania, Bosnia and Arcegovina;

and there are several Salt Mines near it, which the Turks made great Profit of. Several Castles in the Neighborhood, which were Garrisoned by the Enemy, have since submitted; and divers Christian Families are come in, and have desired the Protection of the Republick; to whom the Proveditore-General has assigned Lands for their Subsistence. We lost but 20 men in this Siege.

Turin, July 10. The Duke of Savoy will go to his Army on the 12th or 13th of this month; by which time the Marquis de Leganes is expected back from Milan. The Troops designed for the Blockade of Casal are marching thither.

Vienna, July 10. Two days ago arrived here from Poland the Sieur Saphia, General of the Forces of Lithuania, who designs to pass this next Campaign as a Voluntier, in the Imperial Army in Hungary. General Caprara will part from hence in two or three days, together with the Count de Heydershim General of the Horse; and in the meantime, the Imperial Forces, who have had their Rendezvous on the Drave, are marching towards Peter Waradin. The Turks do not yet appear in any considerable Body near our Frontiers, but have lately furnished the Garison of Temeswaer with fresh supplies of Provisions.

Madrid, July 14. Yesterday arrived here an Exprez from Cadiz, with the welcom News of Admiral Russell's being passed by that place with the English and Dutch Fleet towards the Straights, having sent in a small Frigate, with Orders to Rear-Admiral Newille to come and join him near Cape Spartel; The said Frigate arrived at Cadiz on the 8th Instant; and the next morning, the English and Dutch Squadron, as also 10 Spanish Men of War, which lay in that Bay, sailed from thence with a fair Wind. On the first Instant, the homeward-bound English and Dutch Alicant Convoy set sail from Cadiz. And on the 3d, went from thence, St. Mary Port, and St. Lucar, divers Satees, and other small Vessels, with above Two Thousand Soldiers and Seamen belonging to the Marine Tercios, being ordered for Barcelona to succour that place. They arrived at Malaga the 5th, where lay 6 Gallies to Convoy them, under the command of their General the Marquis de Camareffes, who intended to sail that Night. The same day arrived at Alicant 10 Spanish Gallies, and six more were passed by that place for Carthagena; Some others were expected; and when they were all joined, they would be 28 in number.

From on Board Their Majesties Ship the Queen in Havre de Grace Road, July 17. The Bombs we had

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fired at *Di p*, had all the effect that could be expected. The fire continued the 13th with great violence; The Night following, two Magazines blew up, in one of which there could not be less than 4 or 500 Barrels of Powder, as we judg'd by the report. We believe likewise, that several Ships were burnt and blown up, we hearing some Guns go off first, and presently after several blows; one of these Ships was probably a Privateer, which we chased in on the 12th. On the 14th we failed from *Diep*, at which time the whole Town lay in Ashes, there being hardly a House left standing. The 15th in the Afternoon, we came before *Havre de Grace*: My Lord Berkeley sent in several Boats to sound all about the Harbor, and the Earl of *Macclesfield*, who commands the Land Forces, ordered one of the Engineers to go with them, to observe the place. Soon after the Fleet Anchored as near the Town as conveniently they could; and the Bomb Vessels being placed in their Stations, with several small Frigats, and a great many Boats Manned with Soldiers and Seamen, near them, for their security, against any attempt of the Enemy in the Night, we began to play our Bombs yesterday about Four in the Afternoon; And by Eight at Night, they had set *Havre de Grace* on fire in several places. The Enemy all this while, fired a great many Shot and Bombs from the shore, most of which went over us; One Shell unfortunately falling in the *Granada* Bomb-Ketch, blew it up, but the men were all saved except thirteen: Captain *Wilshire*, the Commander, was very much hurt, and Captain *Silver* had his Leg broke. Besides this Accident, we had but one man killed, which was by a Cannon Shot, and two or three wounded. The Earl of *Macclesfield*, and my Lord *Berkeley*, went in their Pinnaces to visit the Bomb-Vessels, and to encourage the men, and were on Board one of them called the *Firedrake*, when the *Granada* blew up near her. This morning it blowing very fresh we ceased firing, but intend to begin again so soon as the Weather is better. We reckon that half of the Town is already destroyed, with several of the Ships in the Harbor, at the entrance whereof, the Enemy sunk two, to hinder our going in; And some Ships sunk themselves to prevent being burnt.

Falmouth, July 16. Yesterday was brought into this Port, by Their Majesties Ship the *Dartmouth*, a Privateer of *St. Malo*, carrying 6 Guns, 4 Patereroes, and 70 men, which she took on the 13th in *Mounts-Bay*.

Whitehall, July 21. This Afternoon came in Letters from Admiral *Russell*, (by the way of the *Groynes*) dated on Board the *Brisannia* the first of this month, Old Scile, off *Tangier*; He did not touch at *Cadix*, but sent Orders to Rear-Admiral *Neville*, who was in that Bay with a Squadron of English and Dutch Men of War, to join him to the Westward of *Cape Spartell*, which they did on the 30th of *June*. And when these Letters were written, Admiral *Russell* was proceeding with all the expedition he could towards *Barcelona*, being informed that the French Fleet lay between that place and *Alfagues*. He had ordered the Turkey Ships, both English and Dutch, with the Men of War appointed for their Convoy, to make the best of their way to *Cartagena*, and to expect there farther Orders, which he would send them

from *Allicant*, according to the Intelligence he should receive of the Enemy.

The Letters from Holland of Tuesday last are not yet come in.
