2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) John Loveys, R.F.A., Spec. Res., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He directed the fire of his battery with great coolness and courage under heavy hostile fire from artillery and trench mortars. On another occasion he kept his battery in action under most intense hostile fire.

2nd Lt. Frederic Charles Louis Arthur Lowndes, Oxf. and Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and initiative in organising a bombing party at a critical time. Later, although wounded, he continued to carry out his duties and remained out for two days.

Capt. John Valentine Macdonald, M.B., I.M.S., attd. I.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in attending to the wounded under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Eric Norman MacNaught, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy's trenches with great courage and skill. He set a splendid example throughout.

Lt. Marcus Beresford Maude, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in repelling an enemy raid, and later led a bombing attack against the enemy. He has on many occasions carried out daring patrol work.

2nd Lt. William Ernest Moore, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and skill in maintaining communication under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

2nd Lt. Charles Leslie Munday, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative in bringing up reinforcements under heavy fire.

Later, he organised and led a bombing attack against the enemy. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Eric Burbey Nichols, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Single-handed he attacked and captured an enemy machine gun, killing the two men who were firing the gun.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) James O'Brien, Duke of Corn. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried a message under very heavy fire. He later displayed great courage and coolness in going back to organise and direct bearer parties.

Temp. Capt. Arthur John Rushton O'Brien, M.B., A. Med. Serv., attd. Gold C. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He repeatedly dressed and tended wounded men under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and coolness throughout.

Temp. Lt. Denis Shaftesbury O'Hagan, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he did excellent work in reorganising his own men and men of other units in the captured position, and in forming a defensive flank where neighbouring units had been held up. He set a fine example of courage and coolness throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Woodford Orton, Dorset R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative in reinforcing and holding the most advanced points reached in our attack, thereby checking an enemy bombing attack. He was wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Nigel Vernon Oxenden, M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative in the placing of his machine guns during an attack on the enemy's trenches. Later, he rescued a wounded man under very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. Maurice Falcon Marshall Parkes, Oxf. and Bucks. L.I., attd. Sig. Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed marked courage and ability when in charge of the brigade signals, working continuously under heavy fire. On one occasion he rescued several men who had been buried by a shell.

2nd Lt. Bertram Petley, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination when in charge of the battalion runners. He was continually in the front line collecting information which proved of great value.
