

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, July 10.

**T**he Abbe *Scarlatti*, who resides here on the part of the Elector of *Baravia*, had Audience of the Pope on Monday last, the occasion of which was to notify the Marriage concluded between his Electoral Highness of *Baravia*, and the Princess of *Poland*; Tho' he likewise made use of that opportunity to sollicite the dispatch of the matter about the late Election at *Lige*. The Congregation of Cardinals and Prelats, appointed for the Examination of it, were to have met the 15th of this month; but upon the representation of the Persons that are employed here on behalf of the Cardinal *de Bouillon*, that they could not be ready by that time, a respite is allowed them till the 20th, but with a positive Order, that the said Congregation shall then meet, and determine this Affair. We have Advice, That the Pope Gallies have joyned with the Squadron of *Malta*, and that they are proceeded together for the *Levant*.

**Genoa, July 4.** On Monday last parted from hence 7 Spanish Gallies, Commanded by the Duke of *Turisti*, for the Coast of *Spain*. where they are to joyn with the Gallies of *Sardinia* and *Sicily*, of whose arrival at *Port Mahon* they had advice before they left this Port. Signior *Salvago* who was lately sent to *Milan* to accommodate some differences arisen between the Spaniards and this State, is not yet come back; but in the mean time two Barks belonging to *Final*, which were stopt here by way of Reprizal, have been discharged; and the like has been done at *Final* to 5 Genouese Barks which were under Arrest there by Order of the Governor of *Milan*; From whence we conclude, that the matters in dispute are in a fair way to be amicably adjusted.

**Milan, July 14.** We hear that a Regiment of 1000 *Hussars* is arrived at *Como*, in their march towards *Piacenza*. The Troops that are to be employed in the Blockade of *Casal* are marching thither.

**Venice, July 16.** Since the departure of the last great Convoy, several new raised Troops are come to the *Lido*; who were mustered there some days ago, and are to sail with the next Ships to the *Mores*, except 600 Men, who are ordered to *Dalmatia*. The last Letters from *Spalero* say, That the Provencere General *Delfino* was returned thither, after the taking of *Gickler*; and that he was preparing for some new Enterprize, for which a fair opportunity seems to be offered by the Turks having weakened all their Garrisons on that side, to reinforce their Army in *Hungary*. The Advices from *Turkey* by the way of *Ragusa* say, That the new Grand Visier set out from *Astracane* about the end of *May*, in order to joyn the *Osman* Forces, who were to Rendezvous near *Sofia*.

**Turin, July 17.** The Duke of *Savoy's* Forces, with part of the Germans, encamped the 12th at *Astracane*, about 2 Leagues from *Pignerol*; where they expect to be joyned by the Spanish, and the rest of the Imperial Troops, (who were by our last advice not far from them) and then our Army will be compleat. The French have sent a Detachment of 12 Battalions towards *Provence*, where they are mightily alarmed by the advice of the English Fleets being come into the *Straites*. The *Vaudois* have within these 2 or 3 months taken from the French 700 Horses and Mules.

**Vizna, July 17.** The Count de *Hoyersheim* intends to go hence on Tuesday next to the Army in *Hungary*, and General *Caprera* a day or two after. In the mean time the Imperial Forces lie encamped in 3 Bodies near the *Drava* and the *Danube*, for their more convenient Subsistence. We hear that the Turks have put a great Convoy of Provisions into *Temeswar*; That they have laid a Bridge over the *Sava*; and another over the *Danube* near *Semendria*; and that the Grand Visier is expected at *Belgrade* about the end of this month. The last Letters from *Transilvania* tell us, That things continued very quiet on that Frontier, and that they did not yet hear of the march of the *Tatars*, who 'twas expected would be going about this time to joyn the Turks in *Hungary*; However, General *Peterani*, to secure that Country against any sudden Invasion, had taken care to place sufficient Guards upon all the Passes and Avenues to it.

**Frankfort, July 18.** The Confederate Army under the Command of Prince *Lewis of Baden*, continues encamped at *Hockenheim*, between *Hydelberg* and *Philipburg*; 'Tis believed their next march will be to *Manheim*. where a Bridge is going to be laid over the *Rhine*, in order to their passing that River. A great number of Boors is Summoned in to work on the Fortifications of *Manheim*, which they hope to have perfected in a short time, so as to be fit to receive a Garrison. The *Marschal de Lorge* lies still with the French Army about *Alzheim*. We do not hear that he has yet sent any Detachment towards *Flanders*.

**Hamburg, July 25.** The Letters from *Stockholm* inform us, That the King of *Sweden* had taken a progress into *Lapland* the most Northerly Part of his Dominions; which he begun the 14th of the last month; That he had visited the Cities of *Uma* and *Pitka*, and was gone from thence to *Torne*, situated in the bottom of the Gulf of *Bothnia*, where they have no night, during the Months of *May, June, July, and August*; and that his Majesty purposed to return to *Stockholm* about the 20th of this month. They write from *Berlin*, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* was going to *Crossen* to take a Review of his Troops, which he finds to reinforce those he has already in the Emperor's Service in *Hungary*. The Princess of *Polonia* is expected here in the beginning of *September*, in her Journey to *Flaviers*, and in the mean time one of the best Houses in this City is making ready for her Reception.

London, July 27.

Amsterdam, July 30. The 8 Dutch East India Ships which are arrived in the *Texell*, 6 of them from *Batavia*, and 2 from *Ceylon*, parted from the Cape of Good Hope on the 16th of April last. On Sunday last sailed out of the *Vlie* a Fleet of 150 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to the *Souid*, under Convoy of 11 Dutch Men of War.

Whitehall, July 28. Since the Letters from my Lord Berkeley of the 17th from before *Havre de Grace*, we have received this farther account; That it blew very hard all that day and the night following; The 18th towards Evening the weather was calmer, and the Bomb Vessels warp'd in as near as they could to the Town, being covered by a great many Beasts mann'd with Seamen and Soldiers; The Enemy fired all the while from their Batteries on the Shore, but without doing us any damage; The night was spent in throwing in about 250 Bombs; and they had fired more, but that the Wind grew very high; which obliged them to stand off again in the morning. In the night they saw several Fires in the Town and one particularly, which by the great Blaze, and the time it lasted, they believed to be a Magazine of Naval Stores. The Enemy sunk 6 Ships in the Mouth of the Harbour; Above one half of the Town was destroyed, and the rest much shattered by the Bombs. The 21th, my Lord Berkeley sailed from *Havre de Grace* towards *la Hogue* and *Cherbourg*, allarming the Enemy all along their Coast, who fired a great many Guns, and made Fires on the Shore, to give notice of our approach; and being informed that there was a French Frigate with 4 or 5 Merchant Ships at *la Hogue*, He detached 2 or 3 of our light Men of War, with a Fireship, to destroy them; but before they could arrive there, the said French Ships were got away to the Westward. The 25th in the Evening my Lord Berkeley came to an Anchor at *St. Helens*. In this Expedition, the Officers and Seamen of the Fleet, and the Land Forces Commanded by the Earl of *Macclesfield*, behaved themselves very bravely in their several Stations: Sir *Martin Beckman*, and Colonel *Richards*, performed their parts extremely well: And Captain *Berbow* was very active and useful in placing the Bomb Vessels. The Fleet will Sail again in few days.
