

Parish of Penistone) for a distance of 12 chains or thereabouts to its junction north of Hen Holmes with the footpath leading into Park Lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such footpath for a distance of $23\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Park Lane and almost opposite to the southern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the Close numbered 4 upon the *Map or Plan* annexed to this Representation, and extending thence, first northward to the said fence, and then first north-eastward, and then north-westward, along such fence and along the fence forming the eastern and north-eastern boundary of the Close numbered 5 upon the said *Map or Plan* for a distance of $10\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the south-western corner of the Close in which the house called Windy Bank Hall stands, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the roadway leading from Windy Bank Hall into Hill Top Lane for a distance of 12 chains or thereabouts to the junction of such roadway with Hill Top Lane, and extending thence, first westward, and then north-westward, along the middle of Hill Top Lane for a distance of $27\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Don Hill Height, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Don Hill Height for a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction near Don Hill House with the footpath leading into Hunshelf Hall Lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such footpath for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hunshelf Hall Lane, and extending thence, first north-westward, then westward, and then again north-westward, along the middle of Hunshelf Hall Lane for a distance of 38 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Tofts Lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Tofts Lane for a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Underbank Lane, and extending thence, first south-westward, and then in various directions, along the middle of Underbank Lane for a distance of 72 chains or thereabouts to the centre of Unsliven Bridge which carries such lane across the Porter or Little Don River, upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Penistone from the said Parish of Bolsterstone, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the said Diocese of Sheffield and of the said Diocese of Wakefield respectively.

ORDER.

DRAWN STEEL RODS AND BARS, STEEL WIRE AND STEEL WIRE ROPE.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Act, 1914, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) No. 2 Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Munitions of War Acts, 1915 and 1916, and all other powers thereunto enabling him, hereby orders that all persons engaged in the manufacture, sale or purchase of, or other dealings in drawn steel rods or bars, steel wire or steel wire rope, shall comply with the following regulations:—

1. No order for drawn steel rods or bars, steel wire or steel wire rope shall be accepted for manufacture, and no such material shall be manufactured unless the purpose for which it is required has been approved. Such approval must be evidenced by one or other of the following, which must be quoted in writing by the ordering firm to the manufacturer, together with a written statement of the specific purpose for which the material is to be used:—

(a) Admiralty contract reference and number or Admiralty Priority Section permit reference and number.

(b) War Office contract reference and number.

(c) Marine Department, Board of Trade permit reference and number for Merchant Shipping.
