

# The London Gazette.

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From Monday August 6. to Thursday August 9 1694.

Malaga, July 20.

**O**N the 17th instant in the Evening came in here Captain *Bankes* in the *Carlisse* Frigate, with 4 Ketches to fetch fresh Provisions for the Fleet, under the Command of Admiral *Ruffel*, which he left the same day off this Place; And the 18th, Captain *Bankes* sailed again with the Vessels before-mentioned, to rejoin Admiral *Ruffel*, who took his Course towards *Barcelona*. On the 13th of this month six French Men of War appeared off *Almeria*, where they would have had Provisions for their Money, but 'twas refused them; These are supposed to be Scouts sent out by the *Mareschal de Tourville*, who is retired with the French Fleet to *Thoulon*. The Gallies of *Naples*, *Sicily*, and *Sardinia*, are come to *Cartagena*, where they lie ready to joyn our Fleet as they pass by. The Turkey Ships, with 5 Men of War their Convoy, are now in sight of this place plying to the Eastward.

*Madrid*, July 28. This Court is extremely pleased with the news they have received of Admiral *Ruffel's* being come into the *Mediterranean*; He passed by *Malaga* with the whole Fleet on the 17th of this month, keeping out of sight of that place towards the *Barbary Coast*, but sent in the *Carlisse* with several Ketches for fresh Provisions. On the 20th appeared off *Malaga*, the English and Dutch Merchant Ships bound to *Turkey* and *Italy*, under the Convoy of 5 Men of War. The Spanish Bark, which was lately seized by some French Passengers on board her, as she was going with Goods to a considerable value from *Cadix* to *Seville*, and carried by them to *Lagos*, is by Order of the King of *Portugal*, together with the lading, restored to the Owners, and the Persons that took her are prosecuted for Pyrates. We hear from *Catalonia*, That the French have taken two Castles, *Fellu* and *Ostalic*, the latter being within two Leagues of *Barcelona*.

*Venice*, July 24. The last Advices from the *Levant* inform us, That the Earthquake which lately happened at *Negrepont* had thrown down one of the Bastions, with part of the Wall of the Town, and that the Turks did very much apprehend the Venetians would make use of this accident to attack that place, for which reason

they have sent a strong Reinforcement thither, and work night and day to repair the Fortifications.

*Warsaw*, July 23. The King of *Poland* is expected here with the whole Court about the 6th of the next month, and about the 15th will be celebrated in this City the Marriage of the Elector of *Bavaria*, with the Princess of *Poland*, at which all the Senators, and the other great Men of this Kingdom are invited to be present. The Forces of this Crown are drawing together on the Frontiers of *Podolia*, and a Train of Artillery is going to them from *Lemberg*. The Tartars, who lately conducted a great Convoy of Provisions to *Camirac*, (by which that Garrison is supplied till Winter) are returned to *Budziac*; and none of their Parties have since appeared near our Frontiers, being probably called home, in order to march with the Han to *Hungary*.

From on Board Their Majesties Ship Soldadoes Prize, Captain *Allen* Commander, in Jersey Road, July 27. On the 23th cruising off Cape de *Diague*, in Company of the *Hind* Pink, we espied in the morning 6 Sail, which proved to be French Ships, one a Frigate of 26 or 30 Guns, three of them Privateers from 16 Guns downwards, and the other two Merchant Ships of 100 and 80 Tuns each. They all stood into *Granton Bay*, where one of the Merchant Ships run ashore about 3 miles short of the rest, but she was fetched off, and carried away by two Privateers of *Guernsey*, while we engaged the Enemy, which we did for 6 or 7 hours: At last they all put their Ships aground and left them; We sent in our Boats in hopes to have burnt them, but the Shore was so lined with Horse and Foot that we could not effect it; The 24th in the morning we espied 5 Sail and stood after them; They proved to be English, under Convoy of the *Swallow* Prize, upon which we returned into the Bay, and found that 4 of the above-mentioned French Ships were got off again, and were sailing close under the Shore, we gave them Chace till night, and the next morning went back to the Bay, where with our Boats we burnt the other Merchant Ship, notwithstanding they fired very warmly from the Shore to defend her.

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*Falmouth, August 4.* On the first instant came before this Harbour Their Majesties Ship the *Prince of Orange* and *Quaker Ketch*, with about 50 sail of Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound to the Westward, who were joynd by several out of this Port; The 2d passed by about 30 Sail of outward bound Merchant Ships, under Convoy of the *Archangel*, *Berkeley Castle*, and the *Josiah*; who were put back on the 3d. The same day Their Majesties Ship the *Forefight* brought into this Port a Ship belonging to *St. Malo*, and bound home from the *West Indies*, with Tobacco, Indigo, and Hides: She has 14 Guns mounted, and ten in the Hold, being built to carry 24, and was taken on Sunday last to the Westward of *Scilly*. This morning arrived here the *Spanish Expedition* in six days from the *Groyn*.

*Plymouth, August 5.* On the 3d instant was brought into this Port by Their Majesties Ship the *Wymouth*, Captain *Jumper* Commander, a French Privateer of 24 Guns, which he took on the 31th past, after a long Chace, the said Privateer being counted the best Sailer that belonged to *St. Malo*. This day arrived here the *Josiah* of *London* of 300 Tuns and 28 Guns from *Gamboa* in *Guinea*: As also the *Virginia* Merchant of *London* from *Virginia*. Their Majesties hired Ship the *Society* has brought in a Prize laden with Salt.

*Bristol, August 6.* On the 4th arrived here the *England* Frigate in 100 days from *Plymouth*, and this day came into *Kings-Road* the *Recheffer*; as also the *Prince of Orange* and *Quaker Ketch*.

The Principal Officers and Commissioners of Their Majesties Navy, observing in the payment of Their Majesties Fleet, that Their Majesties, as well as their good Subjects are exposed to great Abuse from false Letters of Attorneys, divers of them being daily detected; Have thought fit for preventing thereof for the future, to give notice, That no Wages for any Mans Service in Their Majesties Ships, will be paid where the Person does not appear himself, (or the Witnesses to his Letter of Attorneys) by any Power, but such as shall be Writen by Two or more Commission or Warrant Officers of Their Majesties Ships, or by Two or more of the Officers of Their Majesties Yards, or by the Mayor, or Two or more of the Magistrates of some Corporation, or by the Minister and Churchwardens of the Parish, (where the ship cannot be had) or here in London by a Publick Notary, or some of the Officers, or Clerks of the Navy.
