st Christophers Island, Dec. 25. Here is within this week arived 10 or 12 Sail of French Merchantmen at the Back Star in the French-Ground, from their Royal Company. It teems that the Knights of Malta have told their Right here in St Kitts to the French King; and that the Company do intend to mannage a Trade in these Parts: they will not admit a Datchman or any other Nation to Trade among them, and they will sell their Goods at their own Rates and Prizes; so that what with the discontentedness of the private Merchant being forbid to Trade, and what with the Companies exacting on the French Planter, they are ready to rise in Rebellion, so that we are forced to stand upon our own wards.

Letters from Warfovia tell us, that the King of Poland hath sent to each County in his Dominions, his Instructions against the enluing Diet; in which, he tells them, that during the space of 17 years, in which he hath ruled the Kingdom, he always endeavored, what he might, to manifest his love and affection to the people, which hath been ever finisterly interpreted. That he had proposed to them the Election of his Successor, to the end, that after his death, the Kingdom might not fall into confusions: But some people to whom he had done great kin inesses, had ungratefully sown jealousies and fancies in the heads of his Subjects, which have been the cause of all those evils which have of late befaln the Kingdom, giving them afterwards an account of Lubomirski, of the success of the last Campagnia, the Treaties set on foot, and what he hath done from time to time to reduce him to obedi-Lastiy, he tells them, That to satisfie all good men, he hath called a Diet, as the onely proper method he can use to put an end to all the miseries of his Kingdom; desiring them to consider of the sittest ways and means to arrive at the end, which he believes are to pay off the Soldiery at present, and to make affignations for the future, so, as to take from them all pretences of mutiny, which hath been the ruine of these Countreys, and of the Revenues both of the King and Church, which now are wholly wasted: To satisfie the Emperor for what he hath advanced towards their affiftance at the Swedes Invasion: To pay off the Marqueis of Brandenlurg, Dake of Curland and Croy: To restore to his Highneis, and to the Queen, the moneys borrowed for the common Interest, in time of their greatest necessities; and to tatisfie wholly all other debts of the Republick, which will amount to many Millions of Florins.

Paris, Feb. 24. Monsieur Le Comte de Vivonne, Genetil of the Gelleys, hath brought the Galleys that were at Marfeilles, to Thelon, to joyn with the other Vessels, that, in great diligence, are there preparing, where they report they have 18 Men of War, and 2 Fire-ships.

The French King hath sent 400000 Livres to Tholon, to defray the expences of his Sea affairs. A Son of Monsieur Les Diguicres, and another of Monsieur De Villeroy, have each of them the command of a good ship, but have able Lieutenants appointed them to instruct them in that employment, they being themselves young Soldiers.

They have lately imprisoned an English man at the Isle of Rhé, upon suspirior of being an Enginier, and that his business was to observe the Isle.

Post from Cleve two days since, and assured arrived here Post from Cleve two days since, and assures us, He less the Treaty with Helland, signed; which exceedingly rejoyces this Court. The terms we yet diffirely know not.

Yesterday came hither the news of the death of the Prince of Conti; by which, among other things, is become void the rich Government of Languedoc, which the Town says must be kept for the Dolphine.

Last week returned hither, the President de Nouion, with the rest of the Commissioners lately deputed by the King, for holding the Grands-jours in Auvergne, which it seems were ended the last of January.

Genoua, Feb.3. There have of late been six single persons inscribed into the Nobility: Some of them, for their honor, paying 120000, others 100000 Royals of Plate, each; nor any made this time for buoni meriti, though there have been many pretenders.

Zealand, Feb. 17. The States being informed by several of their Officers and Commanders, that many inroads and plunderings are acted and committed by straggling Soldiers, pretending to belong to the Bishop of Munster, in, and near the Quarters of Willemstad, who are protected in the Territories of the King of Spain; to the great abuse of the State, and their good subjects; and that these injuries daily increase, by giving them a retreat into their Dominions, permitting them publickly to sell the Goods they have plundred, notwithstanding their former promises to the contrary; and also that caily feveral designs have been formed by them against the Frontier. Towns of the State, lying upon Brabant and Flanders; several Enginiers having been sent thence into their Frontier Towns to take special notice of those places, gathering Soldiers regether in marching that way to accomplish their hostile designs. The States have thought sit to Commissionate the Heer Van Bracchel, &c. to expostulate with the Spanish Ambassador, in very serious terms, and to lay before him the unavoidable mischieft that may happen by a continuation of fuch actings, with an earnest request, That the Ambassador would procure, and take care, that these hostile actions may cease for the future; that no more complaints of that kinde may be brought to them; declaring, That in case no reparation or redress be made, the States will cause the said Troops to be pursued into those places. The Ambassador desiring to give his assistance, that the Marquels Castel Rodrigo's many professions in the name of the King, may be effectually made good.

By the same Letters we are informed, that the Divan will fend a more numerous A my to fall upon Corfu; but the Inhabiants fear not their affaults, being well provided against all Invalions, and the Fort impregnable, though very near

the enemy, who much defire to be mafter of it.

This City is now upon the defign of making a Bank of a Million and 500000 Duckats, with which they intend to provide 30 Vessels, to convoy Merchants, and make Reprisals upon the Enemy. To which end, divers of the Nobili-ey and Matchants have already subscribed.

We have formely given some accounts of the Arabians and Jews actions in Arabia; the more full relationals we have

it, runs thus.

In Arabia Felix, lies the Kingdom of Elal, in which is the populous City of Aden, full of Jewish Merchanis, it lying near the Re! Sea. In this City, we are informed, there is a Jew called Giorobaon, who by his powerful Oratory, hath in a few days reduced all the Citizens to his Devotion; who have flain their Basia, and forced the Garrison to submit to them. In little time after, that party grew very numerous, and gave the absolute command of themselves to this Giorobaon, calling him their Propliet; who every day growing greater by the affistance of Porti d'Ugusto and Lira, drew presently after him all the Arabians of the Mountain Arzira or Cabuburra. Since which time, growing more formidable, they marched to the Cape of Zibil, without refisfunce, taking the City of Ziden: By the same advise, we are told, that in little more then three moneths, with a very vast Army they past the Cape of Zibil into Arabia Petres, and were possest of the City of Medina, and afterwards of Mecca; from whence they wrote to all the Jews of Paumea and Syria, to prepare for their reception, and that they were resolved in a short space to free them from their

flavery to the Turk.

Southwold, Feb. 22. This morning we saw a Squadron of Ships East off of this Town, plying to the Southward, and in a shore time after were out of fight this Evening. Vessel of this Town came out of Tarmouth Roads, the Master saith, he saw above Twenty Sail standing to the Northward, but they were fo far off, that neither our Townsmen, nor the Master of the Vessel, could discover what they were. He reports surther, That 40 or 50 Sail of Colliers, with the Convoys, in a thick, wayed Anchor, and are gone

to the Northward.

Vienna, Feb. 12. The Count d' drach is returned from Spain; affoon as he alighted, he was sent for by the Emperor, who seemed very well pleased with the Relations the Count gave him, and in particular, with that part that concerned his Imperial Spoule, who is to part from Spain about the 4 of March.

Count Lesiy, by a Courrier, informs the Court from Adrianople, of his departure from Constantinople with a guard, That he received great Testimonies of Kindness and Currefie from the Turks; and such Honors, as never yet were given to any other Ambassador. On the contrary, the French Ambassadors have had but little satisfaction, being treated by the Grand Seignor at the first Audience but coldly, and had onely eight Veils, and those very ordinary ones.

We are advised from Constantinople, that the Military preparations against the Republick of Venice are much hastned, the Chiauses being dispatche into all places, in order to bring

their forces together the beginning of March.

The Grand Visier intends in person to march with the Army; to give life and force to their defigns, and to make what impression is possible upon the Kingdom of Candia.

Zealand, Feb. 22. The Deputies of this Province of Zealand reflecting upon the great liberty the Papists have taken ince the hostile invalion of the Bistiop of Munster, have shought it requifit to take care to have order fent to all the

other Provinces, that the Statutes against them formerly made be put in execution, and that all priviledges granted to Monks and Priests be recalled.

At the same time we are told by Bevering, that the Emperor liath fent to all the Electors and Princes of the Empire, to know their respective complaints and grievances against this State, by which we Ominate ill to our selves from that Court and the Empire.

Tarmouth, Feb. 23. Testerday we discryed between Cromer and Winterson, 14 Men of War, and 2 Galliots, which we suppose may be Sir Christopher Minnes Squadron. There is here delivered out of the Charity, a Prize, 514 Cask of Sugar, which come out very well conditioned; the day of sale will be on Thursday come sevennight.

There kath not one died here of the Plague these ten

days.

Hague, Feb. 23. It hath been observed that several Enginiers have been known to pass disguised through our Frontier Towns to make observation of the strength of our Garrifors. Beuningen writes from Paris, that he shall suddenly know the time when the F. ench Kings ships will be ready, who promise all diligence in setting out to Sea, to be there before the English.

Marseilles, Feb. 19. The 6 Dutch, with the Merlin, and a Ketch arrived here two daies fince from Cadiz, bringing with them 2 prizes: They are strangely allaimed here upon the news of the English Fleet, and use all possible industry to fit out their Fleet, which they pretend shall be very considerable. They have ordered 10 Gallyes to post forthwith to Tholon, to lye in the mouth of the Harbor, to prevent the attempts of the English Fleet.

The French King contrary to former practices, hath ordered an Impress of Scamen to be made in all these parts, finding that without it, be shall not be able to man his Fleet,

the Seamen generally declining the service.

Rockel, Febr. 9. The ten ships that were intended from this West Coast to the English Plantations in America, are near ready to fail, being already Tallowing, and its faid here, there are five Dutch to joyn with them, and so to pals

in company together upon that design.

Newcastle, Febr. 20. Yesterday came into this Harbor ten Sail of small Coasters, most of them to load with Salt, we every day expect the great Fleet of light Colliers, which we think to be near the Bay of Burlington, expecting a

fair wind.

Tarmouth, Febr. 21. This day were seen off of Liestoff fifteen great Ships, judged to be the Squadron under Sir Chr. Minns; they past by the back of our San is to the Northward. A Veffel came in this day along the Coast from London, which makes us suppose the Coast is clear that way; this day also arrived two Sloops, and a Billander from Ostend.

Waymouth, Febr. 21. In the Evening there were thirty Sail of Ships descried to be about three leagues distant from the Westlide off the Isle of Portland, what they were we cannot learn, they passed along to the Westward, without any stay; its supposed they are a Fleet of our own Mer-

chants outward bound.

Harwich, Febr. 22. Yesterday morning sailed to the Northward about forty Vessels, great and small. The last night and this morning we described about a dezen more, all Northward bound. A French Hoy, with about thirty men, has forced two trading Vessels into us, she is now near the Nage, attempting a Merchant Ship, but she having six Guns, makes the French-man stand off; however there are two Ketches under brisk wind, with four Guns apiece, well mann'd, gone hence to relieve her.

Falmouth, Febr. 17. The fifteenth instant passed by this Harbor fourteen Sail of Merchants, with a Convoy from Plymouth; three more went to them out of this Harbor; fome bound for Tangier, and some for the Streights.
Whitehal, Feb. 24. Yesterday His Excellency the Earl of

Sandwick, His Majesties Ambassador Extraordinary to the K. of Spain, having taken leave of His Majesiy, set forward hence towards Portsmouth, where he is, in few days, to embark withhis Train for Spain.
