Venice, July 30.

THE last Letters from *Dalmatia* give us an account, that the Turkish Troops, who were drawn together with design as 'twas thought to endeavour the regaining of *Ciclut*, perceiving the difficulties they were like to meet with, are separated again, and returned to their Quarters. Several new raised Troops are come within these few days to the *Lido*, and more are expected, and in the mean time Transport Vessels are providing to carry them to the *Levant*; from whence 'tis confirmed that part of the Fortifications of *Negrepont* are thrown down by an Earthquake, and that this Accident would probably encourage our Forces to make an attempt upon that place. There are Advices from *Turkey* which say, that the Arabians had defeated the Ottoman Forces that were sent to suppress them, which as well as the great Treasure they had taken at *Mecca* and *Medina*, where they put all the European Turks to the Sword, had given them such a reputation that their strength was greatly augmented by the Arabians that came in to them daily.

Turin, Aug. 2. The Duke of *Savoy* decamped the 31th of the last month from *Ayrasque*, and marched to *Bruasque*, within a League of *Pignerol*, his Royal Highnesses Quarters being at *Mazel*; The Spanish Troops lie between *Diesasque* and *St. Cecand*; and according to the Advice we receive from the Camp, the whole Army will march again in a day or two. The *Mareschal de Cazinat* continues in his old Camp near *Feneffrelle*, without any appearance of his removing from thence. On Saturday last passed through this City two Regiments of Switzers in their march towards *Cazal*, to reinforce the Troops appointed for the Blockade of that place. We have an account from *Pignerol*, that a Fire happened there the last week, which burnt a great Magazine of Hay.

Vienna, Aug. 4. The Imperial Army assembles at *Eudack* within 3 Leagues of *Peter-Waradin*, where 14 Regiments of Foot, 4 of Horse, and 2 of Dragoons were encamped on the 22th of the last month; 2000 *Lunenburghers* were to join them the 23d, and Major General *Crossfelt* was with several Regiments of Horse not above two days march from them. The Imperial Troops commanded by the Baron *de Pollant* had lately a Rencontre with a Party of the Garison of *Tepeswaer*, in which many Turks were killed, and some taken Prisoners. The Advices from the Frontiers say, that the Grand Visier arrived the 5th of July at *Philippopoli*, and intended to part again from thence on the 9th towards *Sophia*, but that the Asiatick Troops had not yet joined him. They write from *Peter-Waradin*, that they had Advice of the Visiers arrival at *Sophia*; That the Turks were forming a Camp near *Widip*; and that

they shortly expected there 15000 Tartars. General *Caprara* is still here, being indisposed. A great many Deferters, who are come over to us this Campagne from the French Army on the *Rhine*, being formed into Companies, are sent from hence to *Hungary*, to serve in our Army against the Turks. The Letters from *Transylvania* tell us, that General *Veterani* was posted with the Troops under his command near the *Iron Gate*; and that Colonel *Anthony* who went out with a Body of *Radziens* to destroy the Enemies Bridge over the River *Morava*, having advice that several Boats were passing down the *Danube* with Provisions for the Garison of *Belgrade*, he advanced towards them, and took 5 of the Boats, having first routed the Turkish Troops who marched by the River side to guard them; but *Ali Bassa* coming to their assistance with several Barks and Gallies, the *Radziens* lost two of their Prizes, and sunk the other three.

Meitz, Aug. 6. The Chapter of this Church is appointed to meet on the 6th of the next month to choose a Coadjutor in the room of the great Master of the Teutonic Order deceased, and in all appearance the Election will fall upon the Bishop of *Bamberg*, who is gone in the mean time to confer with our Elector at *Steinheim*. The Hussars of this Garison have frequent Rencontres with the Enemies Parties, and bring in many Prisoners.

Frankfort, Aug. 12. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* continues encamped at *Ebischym*, about an hours march from *Bruchsal*; There is at present no talk of his passing the *Rhine*, seeing the Country on the other side of that River is so destroyed by the French, that his Army could not subsist there. The *Mareschal de Lorge* lies still near *Creuznach*, his Troops being very much weakened by Sickness and Desertion: The *Marquis de Chamilly* is posted with some French Troops near the *Rhine*, to guard the Intrenchments they have cast up there. They write from *Alsace*, that the People of that Province are grievously oppressed by the French, being not only obliged to raise great Sums of Money, but to furnish likewise the French Magazines with a certain quantity of Corn, which they cannot comply with, without leaving themselves destitute of what may be necessary for their own subsistence; and because these occasions great murmurings and discontents, which they fear the effects of when an opportunity offers, they have disarmed all the Inhabitants as well Gentlemen as others, except such as are in the French King's service.

Cologne, Aug. 14. The Letters from the *Upper-Rhine* tell us, that the two Armies continued in the same Stations mentioned in our last; The Germans near *Bruchsal*; and the French near *Creuznach*; among the latter there was a discourse of sending a Detachment of Horse towards *Flanders*.

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Paris, Aug. 13. The French Army in Flanders lay, according to our last Advice, still at *Vignation*; but Forage was grown very scarce; The *Marschal de Boufflers* with several Battalions had passed the *Maese* at *Huy*, and 'twas thought the rest of the Army would do the like; The Dauphin is expected by the end of this Month at *Fontainebleau*; whither the French Court removes on the 20th. From *Pradmont* they write on the 4th, that the Duke of Savoy's Forces approach'd the day before within half a League of *Pignerol*, which made them think his Royal Highness designed to attack that place; though at the same time there was a discourse of his besieging *Casal*. In *Catalonia* the French Forces have not attempted any thing since the taking of *Ofalric*; but their Foragers have had a Rencontre with some of the Spanish Troops in which several were killed on both sides. The Letters from *Provence* of the 4th say, that the *Marschal de Tourville* continued with the French Fleet at *Toulon*; but that 20 Gallies were returned from thence to *Marseilles*. They write from *St. Maio* of the 8th, that they were alarmed there by 5 English Men of War who appeared the same day before that place, and fired several shot against the Fort *de la Couchée*, about a League from the Town; and afterwards stood off to Sea again. The Pope's Nuncio had Audience two days ago of the French King about the business of *Liege*; which, it's believed, will be determined in favour of the Elector of *Cologne*.

Brussels, Aug. 15. We have an account from *Liege* and *Maeffricht*, that the Parties of those Garrisons do extremely annoy the Enemies Foragers, and that they have within these 8 days taken above 1000 Horses from them. On the 10th Instant died here of a violent Fever the Duke d'Avery Grandee of Spain, Knight of the Order of the Golden-Fleece, and Admiral of the Spanish Low-Countries.

From the Kings Camp at Mont St. Andre, Aug. 16. The Troops of *Liege* in two Rencontres they had with the French the last week took from them between 7 and 800 Horses, and entirely defeated two Squadrons of Horse of their Forage Guards. On the 10th a Party of 16 Spaniards brought in 40 Prisoners and 50 Horses, which they took from the Enemy the day before on the other side of the *Maese*. On the 13th the Right of our Army foraged near the Enemy. The two Armies continue still in the same Camps; but the French are preparing to pass the *Maese*; and it's believed that we shall march in a day or two towards *Flerus*; Our heavy Baggage was sent yesterday under the Guard of Colonel *Wime's* Dragoons, towards *Louvain*. His Majesty took this morning a Review of all the Light Horse in the English Pay.

Hague, Aug. 17. The Baron *Van Heckeren* came hither on Saturday last from the Army, and will shortly return to *Sueden* with his former Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the States. Don *Bernardo de Quiros*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain*, returned hither two days ago from *Brussels*. The President *de la Tour* is going to the Court of *Brandenburgh*, to Negotiate some Matters, relating to the *Brandenburgh* Troops that are now in the service of the Duke of *Savoy*.

Plimouth, Aug. 7. This day came into this Port Their Majesties Ship the *Dartmouth*, with a small French Privateer of 4 Guns, which she took in *Mounts-Bay*.

Deale, Aug. 10. My Lord *Berkely*, who was sent for to Court from *St. Helens*, came hither on Wednesday last, in order to go on board again in the *Downes*; where the Fleet arrived this afternoon, being commanded by Sir *Cloudfly Shouell* in the absence of his Lordship. Vice-Admiral *Hopsen* lies with a Squadron of English and Dutch Men of War near *Dunkirke*.
