HEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

And whereas by Order in Council bearing date the 7th day of January, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to extend the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, to the Isle of Man, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas it is necessary further to adapt the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, in its application to the Isle of Man:

And whereas further legislation has been passed by the Imperial Parliament on the subject of Trading with the Enemy which it is desirable to extend to the Isle of Man

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, shall be further adapted, as hereinafter set forth, in its application to the Isle of Man, and that the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1915, the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916, and the Trading with the Enemy (Copyright) Act, 1916, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations, that is to say:—

A. THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY AMEND-MENT ACT, 1914.

In Section 1 (1) for the words "England and Wales, for Scotland, and for Ireland respectively" there shall be substituted the words "Isle of Man," and omit the words "and if any question arises" to the end of the Sub-section.

For Sub-sections (2) and (3) of Section 1 the following provision shall be substituted:—

"(2) The Public Trustee for England and Wales shall be appointed to be the Custodian for the Isle of Man, and shall have such powers and duties with respect to the property aforesaid as may be prescribed by Regulations made by the Lieutenant-Governor with the approval of the Treasury."

In Sections 2 and 3 for the words "passing of this Act" or "commencement of this Act" respectively, wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "date of the Order in Council extending the Act to the Isle of Man."

In Sub-section (4) of Section 2, after the words "the Trading with the Enemy" there shall be read the words "(Isle of Man)."

B. THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY AMEND-MENT ACT, 1915, THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY (EXTENSION OF POWERS) ACT, 1915, AND THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY AMEND-MENT ACT, 1916.

1. For the words "United Kingdom," wherever they occur in such Acts, there shall be substituted the words "Isle of Man."

Wherever the expressions "the Trading with the Enemy Act, 1914," "the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914," "the Trading with the Enemy Acts, 1914 and 1915," "the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1915," "the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1915," "the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915," "the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916," or "the Trading with the Enemy Acts, 1914 to 1916," occur in such Acts, there shall be read before the word "Act" or "Acts" in such expressions, the words "(Isle of Man.)"

For the words "under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts" or "summary conviction" respectively, wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "before a High Bailiff or two Justices of the Peace"; for the "passing of the principal Act" respectively, wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "date of the Order in Council extending the principal Act to the Isle of Man" or "date of the Order in Council extending this Act to the Isle of Man," respectively; and for the words "Board of Trade" or "the Board" respectively, wherever the same occur (except in Sub-section (8) of Section 1 of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916), there shall be substituted the words "the Lieutenant-Governor."

2. In Sub-section (3) of Section 1 of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act. 1915, after the words "the Customs (War Powers) (No. 2) Act, 1915," there shall be read the words "(being an Act of the Imperial Parliament)."

3. In the last Paragraph of Sub-section (2) of Section 1 of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916, for the words "England and Wales" there shall be substituted the words "Isle of Man," and for the word "receiver" there shall be substituted the word "trustee."

4. At the end of Sub-section (8) of Section 1 of the last-mentioned Act there shall be read the words "and in the case of persons, firms and companies carrying on business in the Isle of Man in a newspaper published and circulating in the said Island."

5. In Sub-section (2) of Section 4 of the lastmentioned Act for the figures "1893" there shall be substituted the figures "1903."

6. For Section 13 of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916, the following provisions shall be substituted:—

"13. The Custodian under the Trading with the Enemy (Isle of Man) Acts, 1914 and 1915, shall have power to charge such fees in respect of his duties under those Acts, and this Act, whether by way of percentage

or otherwise, as the Lieutenant-Governor may fix, and such fees shall be collected and accounted for by such persons in such manner and shall be paid to such account as the Lieutenant-Governor directs, and the incidence of the fees as between capital and income shall be determined by the Custodian."

Omit Section 14.

C. The Trading with the Enemy (Copyright).

Act, 1916.

In Section 1, for the words "Trading with the Enemy Act, 1914," there shall be substituted the words "Trading with the Enemy (Isle of Man) Act, 1914."

Instead of Section 2 thereof, the following provision shall be substituted:—

"2. This Act may be cited as the Trading with the Enemy (Copyright) (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, and shall be construed as one with the Trading with the Enemy (Isle of Man) Act, 1914."

HEREAS by the Summer Time Act, 1916, it is provided that during the prescribed period in each year in which the Act is in force the time for general purposes is to be one hour in advance of Greenwich Mean Time; and it is further provided that His Majesty may in any year subsequent to the year 1916 by Order in Council made during the continuance of the present War declare the Act to be inforce during that year, and in such case the prescribed period for that year shall be such period as may be fixed by Order in Council:

And whereas by Order in Council of the 23rd May, 1916, the Act was extended with certain adaptations to the Isle of Man, under the title of "The Summer Time (Isle of Man) Act, 1916."

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the Summer Time (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, shall be in force during the year 1917, and the prescribed period in that year shall be from two o'clock in the morning Greenwich Mean Time on Sunday, the 8th day of April, until two o'clock in the morning Greenwich Mean Time on Monday, the 17th day of September.

#### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the Representation

of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in any City or Town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that Burials in any City or Town, or within any other limits, or in any Burial Grounds or Places of Burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in such City or Town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, Burials in such City or Town, or within such limits, or in such Burial Grounds or Places of Burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that Notice of such Representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parishes affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered: Provided also that no such Representation shall be made in relation to the Burial Ground of any Parish until 10 days' previous Notice of the intention to make such Representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such Parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Llanbadarn Odyn, in the County of Cardigan, 10 days' previous Notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Llanbadarn Odyn, in the County of Cardigan, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that Burials should be discontinued therein as herein-after directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 29th day of February, 1916, to give Notice of such Representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 11th day of April, 1916, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that Burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

LLANBADARN ODYN.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Padarn, Llanbadarn Odyn, in the County of Cardigan, and in the Churchyard attached thereto, as existing on the 31st December, 1916.

The following Address was presented to the King on Friday, the 23rd February, 1917, when His Majesty, accompanied by the Queen, opened the School of Oriental Studies (London Institution) at Finsbury Circus:—

To His Most Gracious Majesty King George.
THE FIFTH.

May it please Your Majesty:

The Governing Body of the School of Oriental Studies, London Institution, desire to express to Your Majesty their humble duty on the occasion of the visit which Your Majesty has paid us to-day in order to declare these buildings open. Your Majesty has already conferred prestige on the School by becoming its Patron, and this further mark of your interest in its welfare will afford great incentive and encouragement to the Governing Body in the task before them.

The creation of a great school of Oriental studies in the capital, adequate to the needs of an Empire which includes nearly four hundred million Orientals, has been long contemplated and too long delayed. Teaching in Oriental languages has indeed been given in London, both at University College and at King's College, for many years past and by scholars of high distinction, but this teaching has been on a scale limited by narrow resources.

a scale limited by narrow resources.

Our School has been founded in general accordance with the recommendations of a Departmental Committee of the Treasury, presided over by Lord Reay, and of a Departmental Committee of the India Office, presided over by the late Lord Cromer, and, during Lord Cromer's illness, by Lord Curzon of Kedle-We have had many helpers, but to these three statesmen our School owes a greater debt than to any others. With the rest of the nation, we mourn the death of Lord Cromer, in whom our Institution has lost a devoted friend and wise counsellor. It is sad that though he lived to see the School at work, he passed away before its formal opening.

The Senate of the University of London have consented to transfer to the School the Oriental Departments of University and King's Colleges, and steps are being taken to carry out the terms of the Article of the Royal Charter granted to us which provides that, subject to compliance with the University Statutes, the School shall be a School of the University of London. We regard the inheritance of University traditions as a valuable and important factor in our constitution; and we hope to work in cordial harmony and co-operation with the older Universities, whose Oriental Schools, particularly those at Oxford and Cambridge, have won so high and deserved a reputation. Under the terms of our Charter these Universities are represented on our Governing Body.

The main block of the beautiful buildings which Your Majesty has consented formally to open for the purposes of this School was originally designed for the London Institution, a literary society founded at the beginning of the last century, which had a long and interesting history. It was with the concurrence of the proprietors of the London Institution that an Act of Parliament was passed in 1912 transferring their site and buildings to Your Majesty's Commissioners of Works for the purposes of the School of Oriental Studies. Par-

liament also voted a sum of £25,000 for the restoration of these buildings and for the erection of our new block of seventeen class-rooms on vacant ground adjacent to the main block. Your Majesty's Government, the Government of India, and the London County Council have made substantial grants to the School. consider ourselves especially fortunate in having our home in the centre of the City of London, and we are indebted to the Lord Mayor and the Corporation and to several of the great City Companies for generous sup-But while our buildings are unique in character and admirably situated, we are still short of the income necessary to carry on the School on the footing for which it is designed; we trust that this deficiency may quickly be made up from private liberality, and, if necessary, by further aid from public sources.

The main objects of the School may be ex-

pressed as follows:-

First, to provide a place where our young men, who will presently be engaged in governing or garrisoning the Oriental and African parts of the Empire may learn the languages and study the literature, the religions, and the customs of the peoples with whom they will so soon be brought into contact, and their influence over whom will largely depend upon their familiarity with indigenous character, ideas, and institutions.

Secondly, to offer a training to those who are about to proceed to the same countries to take part in commercial enterprise or other avocations, or for purposes of study

and research.

Thirdly, to furnish to the capital of the Empire a meeting-ground and focus for scholars from the East of various nationalities, where, on their visits to this country, they may be assured of a sympathetic welcome, and find at hand, if they desire them, opportunities for study among those engaged in kindred pursuits.

We wish more especially to emphasise the importance of this School as a centre of Indian studies, and its creation as in some measure a recognition of the great position which India

occupies in the Empire.

We take Your Majesty's gracious presence as a sign that Your Majesty is fully cognizant of and impressed with the importance to the Empire of the study of Oriental and African languages and civilisations on a scale which Great Britain, alone among great countries of the world interested in the East, has not hitherto regarded as necessary; and we have planned that our School shall be at least equal to the Oriental Schools in foreign capitals, and -adequate to imperial needs. We propose to teach the languages of eight hundred million The imports and exports of the United Kingdom alone with the peoples of whom we are to teach the languages amount to between two and three hundred millions sterling annually. But the magnitude of our scheme cannot be expressed in terms of money or of the mere number of languages taught. Our teaching is only a means to an end. The greatness and solidity of this vast Empire in its internal and its external relations rest on the comprehension of, and the just and sympathetic dealing with, men infinitely varied in race, religion, speech, character and upbringing. lieve that the training given in our School will materially contribute to the fuller realization of

the nation's ideals in the distant parts of Your Majesty's dominions, and to the prosperity and the efficient working of the Empire as a whole. If, with the approval of Your Majesty's Government we are starting our new career at this crisis, it is because we are deeply convinced that the task we have to fulfil, both in view of the war and of the period which will immediately follow, could no longer be safely neglected or delayed.

We desire to express to Her Majesty the Queen our humble duty and sincere pleasure at her presence here to-day. We are well aware of the great interest which Her Majesty has shown in the higher education of women, and we hope that especially in view of the part which women doctors and other women workers play in the East Her Majesty will take a special interest in this School. We already have women teachers and women students, and equal opportunities will be given in every way to men and women alike.

We desire humbly to thank Your Majesties for your presence to-day to sanction and encourage our great undertaking.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

I thank you for your loyal and dutiful address. I am glad to be the Patron of the School of Oriental Studies, and it gives Me particular gratification to take part to-day in the ceremony of opening this fine building in which the School is henceforth to carry on its work.

I cannot sufficiently emphasise the wide scope and vast importance of that work. The School will afford fresh opportunities of study to those Services which have been the pioneers of progress and the instruments of good government in India and Egypt. It will furnish with a fuller technical equipment the pioneers of commerce and industry who in each successive generation undertake the duty of upholding the honoured fame of British trade in the East. Its work will serve to develop the sympathy which already so happily exists between My subjects and those of My Far Eastern Ally, Japan.

But more than this is to be looked for from the School. If it happily succeeds in imparting to the pupils sent out as teachers of unselfish government and civilised commerce a clearer comprehension of the thoughts and lives of the diverse races of the East, the good effects of that success will extend far beyond the immediate and tangible results. The ancient literature and the art of India are of unique interest in the history of human endeavour. I look to the School to quicken public interest in the intellectual tradition of that great Continent and to promote and assist the labours of students in these departments of knowledge to the mutual advantage of both countries.

The School is about to open its doors in the midst of an unparalleled crisis in the world's history. For more than two years the Peoples of My Dominions, with loyalty and devotion, have vied with each other in offering their blood and treasure for the prosecution of a righteous War. The sense of common sacrifice and common endeavour has drawn us all nearer to one another in feeling and sympathy.

Meanwhile we believe that the peaceful labours of this Institution in spreading accurate and scientific knowledge of Eastern life and thought will foster the spirit of loyalty and patriotism and knit together still closer the

many Nations of My Empire.

I am very conscious of how much we owe to those distinguished Scholars and Statesmen whose undaunted efforts have largely aided in establishing this School. I deeply regret that one of the most illustrious, Lord Cromer, has not been permitted to see the completion of his share in the work. Had he lived his wise judgment and unrivalled experience would have been of priceless value in Council.

I recognise and appreciate the debt of gratitude which this School owes to the public-spirited benefactors who have contributed so liberally to its Endowment Fund. In so doing they have rendered a service to the Empire, and I trust that the beneficence of the community will endow the School with funds adequate to meet all demands upon its teaching capacity.

I now declare the School of Oriental Studies open. May God bless its labours in the advancement of learning, unity and good government among My People of every race and language.

# Foreign Office, March 30, 1917.

The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from His Majesty's Ambassador at Rome the following translation of certain additions to and modifications in the list of goods declared by the Italian Government to be Contraband of War on February 27th, 1916. The decree proclaiming the present alterations is dated February 22nd, 1917, and was published in the Italian Official Gazette on March 17th, 1917.

The following additions are made to the list of articles of absolute contraband attached to the decree of February 27th, 1916:—

Under No. 8, after "sulphur" add "sulphate of barium."

Under No. 9, oxalic acid and the oxalates, fermic acid and the formiates, phenolates, sulphites and metallic hyposulphites; sodalime and bleaching powder; strontium salts; lithium salts and their compounds.

lithium salts and their compounds.

Under No. 33, after "vanadium," add
"titanium," "uranium"; after "nickel"
add "zinc"; after "steel containing tung-

sten or molybdenum" add "or titanium or uranium."

Under No. 35, alloys of aluminium.

Under No. 40, ferro-titanium and ferro-

Under No. 41, strontium and lithium ores. Under No. 44, bone black.

Under No. 45, quillaia bark.

58. Zirconium, cerium, thorium, and all; their alloys and compounds; zirconia and monazite sands.

59. Silk cocoons.

60. Uncut diamonds for industrial uses.

61. Platinum (ore metal and salts) and similar ores (iridium, osmium, ruthenium, rhodium, palladium, etcetera), and their salts and alloys.

The following modifications are made in the above-mentioned list of absolute contraband:—

No. 4 is modified as follows: "emery, corundum, carborundum in all their forms, and all other abrasive materials, whether natural or artificial, and articles made of these materials."

In No. 8 replace "ethyl alcohol, methyl alcohol" by the following: "alcohols, including fusel oil and wood spirit, and their derivatives and preparations."

In No. 41, replace "wolframite, scheelite, molybdenite" by "tungsten, molybdenum, vanadium, titanium, and uranium ores."

vanadium, titanium, and uranium ores."

No. 50 is replaced by the following:
"gold; silver; paper representing money; shares; negotiable instruments of credit; cheques; drafts; money orders; coupons; letters of credit, authorisation or advice, advices of credit or debit or other documents; which on being filled in or used by the receiver authorise, confirm or render effective the transfer of money, credits or shares."

The following additions are made to the list of articles of conditional contraband attached to the Decree of February 27th, 1916:—

Under No. 5, after "fuel other thanmineral oils" add "including charcoal."

17. Raw and dressed sponges.

18. Glues, gelatines, and substances used in their preparation.

19. Empty barrels and cases of all kinds. and their component parts.

The present decree comes into force on theday of its publication.

#### ORDER.

#### EXPERIMENTAL MANUFACTURE OF AEROPLANES.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers enabling him, hereby orders as follows:

(1) On and after the 1st day of April, 1917, no person shall without a licence from the Minister of Munitions commence or proceed with the experimental manufacture of any aeroplane or seaplane or any part thereof other than any kind of aero-engine. Provided that where a first application for a licence under this Order shall have been made and is pending for the carrying on of any experimental manufacture which shall have been commenced before the said 1st day of April, 1917, nothing in this Order shall prohibit the carrying on of such manufacture until the licence shall have been refused.

(2) For the purpose of this Order the term experimental manufacture shall mean any manufacture which is not under or for the direct purpose of fulfilling a Government contract, and shall include the preparation of any working drawings but not the preparation of

general arrangement drawings.

(3) All persons desirous of obtaining licences to commence or carry on any such experimental manufacture as aforesaid shall apply in writing to the Controller of Aeronautical Supplies, Air Board Office, London, W.C. 2, for such licence, and shall give full particulars of the manufacture for which the licence is required, and such further information as the Controller may require, and shall comply with any restrictions or conditions subject to which the grant of such licence may be made.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (CON-SOLIDATION) REGULATIONS, 1914. Order.

Dated the 27th day of March, 1917.

By virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, and the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of all other powers and authorities them thereunto enabling, the Lords Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom do hereby order that from and after the 10th April, 1917, all ships (save those which are hereafter excepted) shall, while navigating in any part of the pilotage district stated below for the purpose of entering, leaving, or making use of any port in such district, be under the pilotage of a pilot appointed by the Senior Naval Officer of such district, or of a Master or Mate possessing a pilotage certificate for such district granted by the Senior Naval Officer, and shall not be obliged to employ any other pilot. If any such ship is not under pilotage as hereby required, after a pilot appointed as aforesaid has offered to take charge, her Master shall be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914.

Where this Order has effect section 633 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall apply, and the Pilotage Act, 1913, shall not apply. This Order, which shall come into operation on the 10th April, 1917, shall not apply to (a) ships belonging to His Majesty; (b) British ships trading regularly to the port of Stornoway; (c) British fishing vessels and other British vessels employed in connection with the

.Fishing Industry.

Nothing herein contained shall impose on the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty any liability for any loss or damage occasioned by any act or default of any Pilot appointed by the Senior Naval Officer.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to No. 731 L./Sjt. (now 2nd Lt.) Frederick William Palmer, R. Fus.

For most conspicuous bravery, control and. determination.

During the progress of certain operations,. all the Officers of his Company having been shot down, Sjt. Palmer assumed command, and, having cut his way under point blank machine gun fire, through the wire entanglements, he rushed the enemy's trench with six of his men, dislodged the hostile machine gun which had been hampering our advance,. and established a block.

He then collected men detached from-other regiments, and held the barricade for nearly three hours against seven determined counter-attacks, under an incessant barrage of bombs and rifle grenades from his flank. and front.

During his temporary absence in search of more bombs an eighth counter-attack was delivered by the enemy, who succeeded in driving in his party, and threatened the de-fences of the whole flank. At this critical moment, although he had been blown off his feet by a bomb and was greatly exhausted, he rallied his men, drove back the enemy and maintained his position.

The very conspicuous bravery displayed by this Non-commissioned Officer cannot beoverstated, and his splendid determination and devotion to duty undoubtedly averted what might have proved a serious disaster in-this sector of the line.

In Regulation II. it is proposed to substitute for the words "That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty'' the following words:-

"(A) That save as hereinafter provided he

is a British subject.

"(B) That if he (being a British subject) or his father or his mother was not born within His Majesty's Dominions and allegiance then at the time of his birth his father was a British subject and that such father still is or continued to be till his death a British subject.

"Provided that a ruler or subject of any State in India in respect of whom the Governor-General in Council has made a declaration under section 96A of the Government of India Act, 1915, as amended by section 3 of the Government of India (Amendment) Act, 1916, may be considered

eligible.'

It is intended that the change shall come into force for the open competitive examination of

1917 and subsequent years.
