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Venice, August 7.

THE last Letters from the *Morca* are of the 28th of *June*, which give an account, That the Captain General had sent a Squadron of Men of War to Cruise in the *Archipelago*; and that there was a discourse, that the Venetians would attack *Scio*. By a Felucca which came hither two days ago from *Da'matia*, we have advice, That 16000 Turks, commanded by the Bassa's of *Albania* and *Bossina*, were come before *Ciclut*; that they had begun to batter the place; and that the Proveditore General *Delfino* was advanced with the Forces of this State within two Leagues of the Enemies Camp.

Genova, July 31. A Bark is arrived here in 30 days from *Alicant*, who met the Gallies of *Naples, Sicily, and Sardinia*, taking their course towards *Barcelona*. The last week arrived here three French Ships to lade Corn for *France*. Two Barks belonging to *Final* have lately taken two French Vessels which came from *Marseilles*.

Warsaw, July 26. The King of *Poland* is now on his return hither with the whole Court from *Zolkiew*; The 15th of the next month is appointed for the solemnizing the Marriage between the Elector of *Bavaria*, and the Princess of *Poland*, for which very splendid preparations are making. The Letters from *Lemberg* of the 21th of this month, say, That the Forces of this Crown were encamped, the Horse at *Mawsteri*, and the Foot near *Mariempol*; They make not together above 16000 Men; The Governor of the Fort *de la Trinite* had sent out several Parties, who had destroyed all the Corn about *Caminiec*, that the Enemy might not have the benefit thereof; and they had taken several Prisoners, who reported, that the last great Convoy, which was conducted thither by the Tartars, had supplied the Garison of *Cami-*

niec with Provisions for several months; and that they are promised another great supply towards Winter. The Turks make no preparations of War on this side, and the Advices from *Moldavia* and *Valachia* assure us, That their Army in *Hungary* will not be either so numerous, or so early in the Field this year as it was the last; They have dispatcht several Chiautes to the Han of *Tartary*, to hasten the succours he is to send them, but the Diversion the *Cossacks*, who inhabit the Country near the River *Berisl-bones*, have given the Tartars, by the Inroads they have made into the *Crimee*, has so employed the Han in the defence of his own Territories, that he is not at leisure to assist others; at least we have yet no news of his having sent any Troops towards *Hungary*.

Vienna, August 7. The Letters from *Hermenstat* in *Transylvania* of the 26th of the last month, tell us, That a Body of 5000 Turks had on the 13th passed the River *Maros*, between *Chonar* and *Eculack*, from whence they detached 1500 Horse, to put a Convoy of Provisions into *Giula*, which they effected, but in their return they were attack'd by a strong Party of Hussars, who killed above 100 of them, and brought back several Prisoners and Horses. General *Caprara* continuing so ill of the Gour that he cannot yet begin his Journey for *Hungary*, the Count *de Heydersheim*, who is General of the Horse, has orders to repair with all the diligence he can to the Army, and to take upon him the chief Command of it, till Count *Caprara* arrives there. The Imperial Forces are in the mean time encamped within two Leagues of *Peter Waradin*; and have made Provision of heavy Cannon for Battery, Mortars, Bombs, &c. which looks as if they designed to attack some place; and this the Turks seem very apprehensive of by the great care they take to furnish their Frontier places with all things necessary for their defence. Some Letters from the Frontiers say, they had advice, that the Grand Visier was come to *Soplia*; but that he had with him but a small number of Troops; and we do not yet hear they have any in

a Body about *Belgrade*, besides 12000 that are posted near *Semendria*.

Mentz, August 10. The Canons of this Church are all summoned to meet here on the 3d of the next month, to choose a Coadjutor to the Archbishop of *Mentz*, in the room of the late Great Master of the Teutonick Order; There are several Pretenders to this Dignity; but in all appearance the choice will fall upon the Bishop of *Bamberg*. The Baron *d'Ecke* is coming hither to assist at this Election on the part of the Emperor.

Dublin, August 17. On Monday last came into this Harbour the *Talbot* Pink from cruising: She met the Friday before with a French Privateer of 14 Guns, with whom she exchanged several Guns, but the Privateer got away. On Saturday the *Talbot* Pink anchored under *Ireland's Eye*, and the Commander having heard that the Irish did frequently give intelligence to the French Privateers, to be satisfied therein, put up French Colours, and ordered all his men, in case any appeared from the Shore, to go under Deck, except such as could speak French or Irish; Soon after a Boat came off with 4 Irish men, who taking her for a French Ship, came on board, and gave the Commander an account of several things, and among others, of what Ships there lay in the Bay; upon which he caused them to be seized, and sent hither, where they are now Prisoners, and orders are given for their prosecution. Last Friday in the evening came in Their Majesty's Ship the *Dolphin* with 3 Merchant men under her Convoy from the *Leeward Islands*, bound to *London* and *Bristol*; And on Monday they sailed again with another *Bristol* Ship that was here before, bound home from *Antegoa*. On Sunday came into this Bay the *Dover Prize* and the *Pearle*, who are ordered by the Lords Justices to sail, together with the *Talbot* Pink, towards the Coast of *Wexford*, where some French Privateers have appeared within these few days. From *Kinsale* of the 10th they write, That the *Ruby* came that day to an Anchor in the Harbours Mouth, and sailed again the same Evening.

Plymouth, August 19. The 17th instant arrived here the *St. Nicholas* of *Venice*, bound to *London* from the *Streights*.

Bristol, August 20. On Saturday last arrived here the *New England* Frigate in seven weeks from *Nevis*, having left that Island in a very good condition.

Yarmouth, August 20. This day a great Fleet of laden Colliers appeared in sight of this place, bound for the River.

Deale, August 21. My Lord *Berkeley* sailed on Sunday last about ten in the morning, and stood over towards the French Coast;

but the Wind growing very high at W. S. W. he returned with the Fleet the same Evening into the *Downes*, where he still continues; the weather being very tempestuous.
