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From Thursday August 23. to Monday August 27. 1694.

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Madrid, August 18. N. S.
Admiral *Ruffel* arrived the 8th of this month before *Barcelona*; where he still continued on the 14th. He had met with a great deal of contrary Winds, which made his Voyage somewhat tedious; tho' every moment was improved to hasten it. His coming into the Straights has extremely rejoiced the Spaniards, seeing it has not only saved *Barcelona*, and their other Maritime places, but has obliged the French to quit the Sea, and to shelter their Fleet under the Fortifications of *Toulon*; which has very much lessened the reputation they were endeavoring to set up in the *Mediterranean*.

The English and Dutch Merchant Ships bound to *Turky* were on the 8th at *Cartagena*; and we hear they are since proceeded upon their Voyage, under a good Convoy.

They have taken up a hundred Guns, with several Stores belonging to the *Cambridge*, and *Lumley Castle*, which were cast away some time ago between *Gibraltar* and *Malaga*, and they do not doubt but to recover likewise the rest.

On the 2d instant, the King of *Spain* sent an Order to the President and Council of the *Hazards*, to procure with all speed four Millions of pieces of Eight, which is to be employed for raising and maintaining a Body of Germans and Soldiers for the defence of *Catalonia* the next year; And they are treating with the Marquis de *Balbases* for 10000 men; The whole number of Foreigners intended to be raised for this Service, being 18000.

Venice, Aug. 15. We have adviced that the Turks after having been repulsed in several attacks which they made upon the Tower of *Colur*, with great loss, raised the Siege on the 3d instant, and that their Troops were dispersed, and returning to their several Quarters.

Jurin, Aug. 16. The Duke of *Savoy's* Forces have been encamped at *Cavours* since the 8th of this month; His Royal Highness came under the 13th from the Army, and this morning he parted again from hence with Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, and the Lord *Villour*, *Galway*, towards *Cazal*, to see what posture things are in there, and to give the necessary orders for the closer blocking up of the place. On Monday last a Troop of Dragoons, with about 60 Foot, marched from *Pignerol* to surprise the out-gard of the Spanish Troops, which lay between *St. Cecond* and *Osasque*, but mistaking their way, they came in sight of our Camp before they knew where they were, and were attacked by a Regiment of Horse, which killed most of them, and took the rest Prisoners. The *Vaudois* have likewise had this week a successful Encounter with the Enemy; having defeated 3 Battalions who were posted to secure the passage of the Convoys to their Army; They took divers Horses and Mules with a considerable Sum of Money that was designed for the payment of the French Troops.

Vicenza, August 18. The Count de *Hyderstein*, General of the Imperial Horse parted from hence on the 8th instant; and it is all probability he is by this time with the Army, which continues encamped between *Fracke* and *Peter Waradin*; General *Capra* being recovered of his Indisposition, intends to set out on Monday next for *Hungary*; From whence we are told by our last Letters that a Body of Tartars was marching through *Valachia* to join the Ottoman Army on the *Danub*; and that the Report on the Frontiers was, That the Grand *Vizier* arrived the 6th of this month at *Belgrade*; but that his Army would not consist of above 30000 men, besides the Tartars. General *Schoening* parted from hence on the 9th for *Dresden*.

Frankfort, August 26. The Confederate Army Commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* marched the 17th nearer to *Darlach*, where they were joined the next day by the Saxon Regiments, which his Electoral Highness has sent to reinforce his Troops on the *Rhine*. The French Army lies still about *Creutzbach*, destroying all the Country round. On the 13th instant a Party of the

Garison of *Rhinfelt* of 200 men, meeting with a Party of the Enemies, consisting of one hundred and fifty Dragoons, and 100 Grenadiers, Commanded by Monsieur de *Stretesche*, Governor of *Homburg*, after a sharp dispute, the latter were worsted, and many of them killed and wounded, among which were 4 Captains, and several other Officers; and Monsieur *Eretschke* himself escaped with much difficulty, being dangerously wounded.

Paris, Aug. 20. The Letters from *Thoulon* of the 13th instant give an account, That the Marshal de *Tourville* continued still in that Port, without any appearance of his sailing from thence; and that one of his Scouts had brought him advice, That the Enemies Fleet had been seen off the Islands of *Majorca* and *Minorca*, taking their Course to the Eastward. They write from *Piedmont* of the 10th, That the Duke of *Savoy* decamped on the 5th from *Buinasque*, and passed the River *Cluson*; and on the 8th his Royal Highness marched again with the whole Army towards *Cahours* and *Saloffis*, except the Spanish Troops, who have intrenched themselves near *St. Second*; 'Tis thought that the 5000 men who were lately detached from the Confederate Army on that side, to reinforce a Twa given out the Blockade of *Casal*, are marched to *Final*, with orders to pass from thence by Sea to *Barcelona*. The Marshal de *Castin* came the 8th instant to *Pignerol*; his Troops remaining in their former Post about *Rockacord*. The Advices from *Catalonia* say, That our Forces were marched from the Neighborhood of *Offavrick* into that of *Elaves*, encamping along the River *Tordera*, and the Marshal de *Noailles* taking his Quarters in the little Town of *Blans*, situated on the Sea side; A Captain of the *Miquelets* had sent to the Marshal de *Noailles* to let him know that he had possessed himself of a Castle on the River *Lebrugat*, about 4 Leagues above *Montferrat*, which commands the little Town of *Corbera*. We are told from *Germany*, That the Marshal de *Loge* continues in his former Post. The French Court returns tomorrow from *Mayn* to *Versailles*.

Paris, August 23. An Express is arrived here from the Marshal de *Noailles*, with advice, That on the eighth instant Admiral *Ruffel* anchored with the Fleet under his Command; before *Barcelona*; And that on the ninth arrived there the Spanish Gallies, with that of *Naples*, *Sicily*, *Sardinia*, and *Turisy*; The Letters from *Provence* confirm this news, and the alarm it occasions all along those Coast. They write from *Piedmont* of the 11th, That the *Vaudois*, commanded by the Marquis de *Parville* had that morning attacked a Battalion of the *Marine*, and the Regiment of *Cabour*, who were posted about a League and half from Monsieur *Catinat's* Camp, to secure the passage of our Convoys, and that after a short dispute our Troops fled, leaving the Enemy Masters of that Post, and of a considerable Store of Provisions, and Baggage; And that the *Vaudois* had afterwards plundered and burnt several Villages thereabouts.

Paris, August 27. The last advices from *Piedmont* inform us, That the Spanish Forces marched the 12th instant from their Camp near *St. Cecond*, and posted themselves between *les Hoquets* and *Ville Franchois*; The Duke of *Savoy*, and the Germans, continued near *Cavours*; There was still a Dispute of their Beheading *Casal*. They write from the Marshal de *Noailles* Camp at *Blimes* of the 14th, That 22 of the Enemies Gallies appeared the same day before that place, and for two hours together Cannonaded the French Troops that were posted near the shore. The Marshal de *Tourville* was by our last Letters still at *Thoulon*. The French Court removes the 15th of the next month to *Fontainebleau*; where the Dauphin is expected about the same time from *Flanders*.
