Leghorn, August 16.

**B**y a Vessel which is arrived here in 3 days from *Toulon*, we are informed, that the French Fleet continued in that Port; and that for their greater security they had raised several Batteries of Cannon and Mortars towards the *Marine*; They have likewise planted several Pieces of Cannon on the Islands near *Marseilles*.

*Venice, Aug. 20.* This week 8 Companies of Italian Foot were mustered at the *Lido*; where several others are daily expected; being all designed for *Dalmatia*. Last Saturday arrived here a small Vessel from the *Mores*; the Matter whereof reports, that before he came away the Venetian Fleet was sailed from *Napoli di Romania*, directing their Course towards the *Archipelago*. The Letters from *Rome* of the 14th Instant tell us, that the Congregation met the Monday before about the Election of *Lige*, but that the final determination of that Matter was put off till the 20th of the next month, when they are to meet again.

*Turin, Aug. 19.* We have already told you of the Rencontre the *Vaudois* had the last week with the French in the Valley of *Pragelas*, and can now acquaint you with some farther Particulars of it. A Detachment of our Troops, to the number of about 400 Men, having joined with 1200 *Vaudois*, they entered the 11th Instant into the Valley of *Pragelas* near the Village of *Traverses*, where the French had posted several Battalions to guard a Pass; The *Vaudois* divided themselves into 3 Parties, and attacked the Enemy the 12th about an hour before day; The French made but little resistance and fled; Our Men got a very considerable Booty of Money, Arms, Horses, Mules, and Provisions; They burnt the Enemies Camp, and 3 Villages that were near it; divers of the French perished in the flames, and many more were killed and taken Prisoners, among the latter is the Major of the Regiment of *Villars*; and a Lieutenant: We lost on our side but 5 or 6 Men.

*Turin, Aug. 25.* The Duke of *Savoy* returned hither the 19th, having been to view the Posts about *Cazal*, in order to a closer Blockade of that place: And yesterday his Royal Highness went back to his Army; which marched the 21th from *Caours* to *Villa Franca*, the 22d to *Pancalier*, and this day to *Piobes*; at which last place a fire broke out soon after they were encamped, and gave some disturbance to those that had their Horses and Equipage there, but little harm was done besides burning a parcel of Hay that was laid up in that Village; 'Tis said the Army will march in a day or two towards *Rivoli*, and that a farther Detachment will be sent from thence, to strengthen the Blockade of *Cazal*, if not formally to attack the place. The *Marschal de Catinat* is still in his old Camp, having with him but a small Army. In *Provence* the Enemy continue to be very much alarmed; The Duke of *Vendosme* their Governor has been to visit all their Maritime places, and to make the necessary provision for their defence; At *Toulon* they have fortified the Entrance of the Harbour with a Boom and Chain, which they have laid between the two Cattles.

*Vienna, Aug. 25.* The Letters from *Peter-Waradin* of the 18th give an account, that the Imperial Infantry commanded by Count *Guido* of *Starenberg*, was encamped near that place; That the Cavalry lay near *Petche* on the *Theysse*, except 4 Regiments who were posted under the Command

of the Count de *Herberville* at *Cabila* between *Peter-Waradin* and *Titul*; That the Count de *Heyderheim*, General of the Horse, arrived the 16th at *Peter-Waradin*, and went thence the same day to take a Review of the Foot, as he did the day following of the Horse, having the Chief Command of the Army in the absence of General *Caprara*; who will part from hence, to morrow, or next day. The Advices from the Frontiers confirm the Officers arrival at *Belgrade*; and that the Han of *Tartary* was come to, or near the *Danube* with his Troops, that are to join the Ottoman Army. They write from *Transylvania*, that General *Veterani* was encamped near *Millenbach*.

*Frankfort, Sept. 1.* The Confederate Army continues encamped at *Kreuzingen* near *Durlach*; and the French on the other side the *Rhine* near *Creutlingen*. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* has summoned in several hundred Wagons, with a good number of Pioneers, from *Franconia* and *Saxia*, who have orders to repair to our Camp by the 2d of this month. On the 26th a Party of Hussars belonging to the Garison of *Mentz* cut off 50 of the Enemies Foragers, and defeated the same day another French Party, and brought back several Prisoners and Horses.

*Hamburgh, Sept. 3.* We have an account by the last Letters from *Warsaw*, that the Marriage of the Elector of *Bavaria* with the Princess of *Poland*, was solemnized there the 15th of the last month, and that her Electoral Highness would begin her Journey the 25th towards *Holland*. They write from *Copenhagen*, that the King of *Denmark* intended to go to *Holstein*, and to be at *Reusburg* about the end of *September*.

*Paris, Aug. 30.* The Letters from *Pignerol* of the 22th tell us, that the Duke of *Savoy's* Forces decamped from *Carroux* the day before, after having consumed all the Forage thereabouts, and marched to *Ville-Franche*; That they designed to march on towards *Rivoli*, which is at the Entrance into the Valley of *Susa*, and being arrived there, 'twas said they would make Detachements from the Army for the Siege of *Cazal*. The defeat of 3 French Battalions by the *Vaudois*, in the Valley of *Pragelas*, is confirmed, and our loss appears to be greater than was at first reported. They write from *Catalonia*, that the French Troops continued in their Quarters about *Blanes*. The *Marschal d'Humieres* died here on Saturday last.

*Paris, Sept. 3.* We have advyce, that Admiral *Russell* was on the 21th of the last month still before *Barcelona*; The French Fleet continues at *Toulon*; The Inhabitants of *Marseilles* have removed their best Goods to *Aix* and other places. The *Marschal de Noailles* intended to march from *Blanes* the 25th towards *Castelfewillet*. The Office of
