Venice, August 27.

Four Companies of Foot are Shipt, who are to pass over to *Dalmatia*; and eight more will follow the next week. The last Letters from thence give an account, That the *Proveditore General Delfino* was come back to *Spalatro*, and was preparing for some new Enterprize; and that in the mean time a strong Party of our Troops had made an Incurfion into the Enemies Country; where they had burnt several Villages, and taken about 200 Prisoners. The News we had by a Vessel from the *Marea* of the departure of our Fleet from *Napoli di Romania*, is confirmed by the way of *Otranto*; and that they had taken their Course towards the *Archipelago*.

Dantzicke, Sept. 1. The last Letters from *Wofaw* tell us, That there was a great concourse of the Nobility, who came to assist at the Ceremony of the Marriage of the Elector of *Bavaria*, with the Princess of *Poland*, which was celebrated with great solemnity, and very splendid Entertainments for several days together; But 'twas yet uncertain when her Electoral Highness would begin her Journey towards *Flanders*. These Letters add, That the Forces of *Poland* were encamped on the Frontiers of *Podolia*; That those of *Lithuania* were on their march to join them; and that together they would make about 20000 men. The Tartars have not of late given any disturbance to the Frontiers of *Poland*, being diverted as well by the Employment the Cossacks give them, as the Succours they are obliged to send to the Turks in *Hungary*.

Vicna, Aug. 28. Several Councils of *VVar* have been held here this week about the Affairs of *Hungary*; and General *Caprara*, who, that he might be present at these Consultations, has staid here some days longer than he intended, having now received his Instructions, will certainly set out in a day or two, to put himself at the head of the Imperial Army, which in all probability will not enter upon any action till his arrival, and for that reason continues in its Camp near *Peter Waradin*. The Letters from the Frontiers say, That the Grand Visier is come to *Belgraze*, but they do not all agree in the report of his having passed the *Sava*; nor can we yet hear with any certainty what num-

ber of Tartars have joined him, some Letters speak only of 5 or 6000, and others of 10000; But these are only part of the Troops which the Han is to bring to his assistance; and we are told, that another and greater Body is marching through *Valachia* towards the *Danube*, which they are to pass at *Widin*, over a Bridge which has been made there for that purpose. They write from *Transilvania*, That General *Veterani* had posted his Troops so as that they might be best able to observe the Tartars in their march, and to attack them if they saw an opportunity: And that Colonel *Antonio*, who commands the *Radziens*, had defeated 400 Turks near *Temeswaer*, and taken several Standards in this occasion, which he had sent to General *Veterani*. Above fourscore small Vessels are come down the *Danube* from *Germany*, which are to make part of the Fleet that is to act on that River, under the Command of the *Sieur d'Assenberg*, who parted hence the last week for *Essecke*. 'Tis said that the Count *de Kaunits*, who was named by the Emperor some time ago to go in Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to *Holland*, will now be dispatched very suddenly, and that he has Orders accordingly to put himself in a readines for his Journey. The Prince *de Lichtenstein* is shortly expected here from his Embassy at the Court of *Rome*, to be Governor to the Archduke *Charles*, but no body is yet appointed to succeed him in that Employment.

Warwick, Sept. 5. This day about 2 in the afternoon a Fire suddenly broke forth in the Western part of the Town, which by a violent Tempestuous Wind then blowing from the West, instantly got head, and within the space of half an hour, the Town was in Flames in several places, far distant from each other: The swiftness and fury of which, was such, that all the resistance could be made was ineffectual; so that in few hours space, several whole Streets in the principal Trading part of the Town were entirely consum'd, with most of the Inhabitants Goods; together with the great Church, and many Buildings in other parts of the Town: The manner of it was so dreadful, as is not easily to be imagined, and the loss such, as cannot yet be computed, tho' tis very great.

Falmouth, Sept. 8. This morning sailed hence the Spanish Alliance for the *Groyne*; and several Suedes and Portuguese Ships for *Lisbon*.

Plymouth, Sept. 9. This day arrived here the *Olive Branch* of this Port, laden with Tobacco from *Virginia*; and the *St. Nicholas* from *Stockholme*. And this day failed hence the *Hans* and *Jacob* of *Stockholme*, bound for *Riga*.

Hull, Sept. 8. Yesterday arrived here divers Merchant Ships from *Rotterdam*, under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War, one of 58, and the other of 40 Guns; The last of which is gone on with the Ships bound to *Scotland*.

Beale, Sept. 11. Sir *Cloudesty Skovell* failed out of the *Downes* last Sunday in the Afternoon, with the Squadron under his Command, and came the same Evening to an Anchor off the *South Foreland*. He failed again yesterday morning; and this day came in an Advice Boat, called the *Post-Boy*, who left him within three Leagues of *Dunkirk*.

Corunna, Sept. 15. The Letters from *Madrid* of the first instant say, they had advice of the 23th past from *Barcelona*, that Admiral *Russell* intended to Sail that day. The Viceroy of *Catalonia* has sent an account to the Court of *Spain*, that there is a great sickness and mortality among the French Troops in that Country, which has put them into so ill a condition, that 'tis thought they will not be able to attempt any thing farther this year. They have taken up at *Malaga* 105 of the Guns belonging to the English Frigats that were some time ago cast away on that Coast, and in few days they would have taken up the rest. Yesterday arrived here the Spanish Expedition, Captain *Glies* Commander, in 8 days from *Falmouth*, and brought in with him a French Frigate of 6 Guns, and 60 Men; They fought some time, but the French Man was forced at last to yield, having had 20 Men killed, and 10 wounded, and his Foremost Shot by the Board; Captain *Glies* lost but one Man in the fight.

There are due two Mails from *Holland*.
