2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Howard Kilbourne Harris, Essex R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command and controlled the operations with great coolness and skill. He was of the greatest assistance both in the preparations for and in the execution of the assault.

*2nd Lt. Alfred Marshall Langton Harrison, Gurkha Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative when in command of an advanced party during night operations. He pushed forward with great dash under heavy fire, rushing two piquets with the bayonet and successfully bombing three pontoons full of the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Colin Heather, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally led two patrols to reconnoitre the enemy's position, and succeeded in obtaining most valuable information. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) Frederick Stanley Hill, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great dash during the fighting in the enemy tront line, himself killing one of the enemy and capturing two prisoners. Later, he organised and led a bombing attack. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. Edward Hopkinson, Notts. and Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a reconnoitring patrol. He inflicted many casualties on the enemy and successfully repulsed all attacks made against his position. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. George Dall Howarth, Intell. Dept.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command and successfully withdrew an infantry regiment from a very difficult situation.

2nd Lt. Ernest Russell Hicks Hudson, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company and led it in the most gallant manner. He contributed very largely to the success of the operations.

Capt. Eric Conway Irwin, D. of Cam. O. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a patrol. He carried out a successful raid on a strong hostile position and accounted for twelve of the enemy.

2nd Lt. Tom Cyril Jackson, Essex R., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his battery of trench mortars with marked skill, and successfully cut wire for a special operation under constant heavy enemy retaliation. 2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Oswald Montague James, E. Surr. R., attd. R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with marked ability throughout the attack and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

Lt. Edward William Francis Jephson, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward under heavy fire to look for an observation post, and on his way succeeded in accounting for several enemy snipers.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Ernest Lionel Jones, R. Fus. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a difficult reconnaissance under very heavy fire and obtained most valuable information. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Lionel Baker Jones, Welsh R., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as an observer. He has on many occasions assisted in beating off hostile machines. He has done exceptionally fine work in artillery observation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Joseph Nicholas Douglas Keys, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He kept his men under perfect control and led them to their objective. Later he assumed command of the second wave and supervised the operations with marked ability.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Landman, Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. Although severely wounded he continued to lead his men, and succeeded in carrying out the task allotted to him. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Herbert Langman, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with great skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Philip James Vaughan Lavarack, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While on a photographic patrol he shot down and destroyed a hostile machine. He has done consistently good work in artillery observation and photography throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Norman James Macdonald, R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although the trenches were knee deep in mud, he gained his objective, and succeeded in accounting for many of the enemy. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Eugene Bernays Markus, R.S. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When a party was held up by uncut wire he went forward and almost succeeded in getting through the wire, when he was
