Capt Thomas Whittle Martin, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res., attd. R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was of the greatest assistance in organising the evacuation of the wounded across "No Man's Land" during the operation. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Walter Mitchell Martin, High, L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of and led his company in the most gallant manner, and succeeded in gaining his objective.

2nd Lt. Francis Percy Mawditt, R.W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When all the officers in the leading company had become casualties, he went forward under very heavy fire and re-organised the attack.

2nd Lt. Wilfred John May, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol in the most gallant manner, and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

Temp. Capt. Francis Lorne McKinnon, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally led a search party up to the enemy wire in front of the village, under very close rifle and machine-gun fire. He succeeded in recovering two wounded men.

2nd Lt. Harold Musker, R.G.A., Spec. Res., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of very heavy hostile shelling, he continued to direct the fire of his trench mortar, and succeeded in silencing two enemy guns. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Albert Leslie Neale, Lincoln R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on many occasions. He carried out two successful contact patrols, flying for a considerable period very low and on our barrage, rendering very complete reports on each occasion. He has rendered particularly good service in observing for siege batteries.

Temp. Capt. Nelson Rayner Neate, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative throughout the day. Although wounded, he refused to leave his company until he was convinced that the line was safe against counter-attack.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Hamilton Norton, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. He reconnoitred the enemy's wire at the height of 300 feet, and brought back most valuable information. He has at all times displayed great courage and skill.

Temp. Capt. Charles O'Brien, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he insisted on remaining in command of the bearer division of his field ambulance, and in so doing materially expedited the removal of the wounded from the field.

Temp. Lt. Charles Palmer, York and Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of being subjected to the most intense hostile fire, he maintained his position and repulsed a strong enemy counter-attack.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Richard Peirson, North'd Fus., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a bombing party in the most gallant manner against a barricade, and himself shot two of the enemy with his revolver.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Alexander Reid Prentice, Sco. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in gaining his objective. Later, he assisted in bringing in several wounded men under very heavy fire.

Lt. William Ralph Prescott, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his Company most gallantly in the attack, and on one occasion when some of his men advanced too far he personally conducted their retirement through a heavy barrage.

2nd Lt. James Edwards Weeks Rance, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established a post and maintained his position for over 30 hours in spite of very heavy hostile fire. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Carlton Francis Roberts, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance under very heavy fire and brought back most valuable information. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Frank Wright Robinson, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised an attack on an enemy strong point and succeeded in capturing the strong point, together with 22 prisoners. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. Capt. Adam Harry Robson, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally taped out the line for a new trench under very heavy fire, and eventually succeeded in completing the
