Naples, August 24.

OUR Vice-Roy has ordered several small Vessels to be Armed out for the security of our Coasts against the Corsairs of Barbary, who have of late very much infested them, having Landed in several places, and carried away divers of the Country People. By a Vessel from the Levant we have Advice, that the Popes Gallies, and those of Malta, had joined the Venetian Fleet, and that there was a talk of their Besieging Negrepons.

Legborne, August 30. The War that broke out this Summer between Shaban Dey of Algiers, and Mahomet Bey of Tunis, goes on with great success on the side of the former, who being encouraged by his late Victory, and the Surrender of several places that followed it, marched on to the City of Tunis, and undertook the Siege of it: Mahomet Bey put himself, with the best of his Troops, into the place, seeming very confident that the Algerines would not attempt so difficult an Enterprize with the small Army they had there, or if they did, would be baffled in it, but he soon after changed his resolution, and retired from thence in the Night, committing the Chief Command to one whom he confided in, with a promise that he would use his utmost Endeavours, and Diligence, to gather a sufficient force for his Relief. The Algerines on the other side, pressed on the Siege with greater vigour since the retreat of the Bey, and were full of hopes of succeeding in it. This News we receive by a Vessel, which came about the 20th of the last month from the Bay of Tunis.

Kingsale, September 7. Yesterday came here the Joseph of London, bound for

the Maderns, who being very Leaky, began to unlade this day, to find out the Leak, and when refitted, will proceed on her intended Voyage.

Pembroke, September 14. On Tuesday last sailed the Dunkirk, the England Frigate, and the St. David Hulk, with about 50 Merchant Ships, some of them bound to Ireland, and the rest to other parts.

Palmouth, September 17. On the 15th sailed the Spanish Expedition Packet-Boat for the Groyre. Yesterday morning arrived here their Majesties Hired Ship the Friendly Society, with several small Vessels, and Coasters, under her Convoy.

Plymouth, September 18. This day arrived here from Milford, their Majesties Ship the Prince of Orange, and Quaker-Kerch, and under their Convoy about 20 sail more. The same day came into this Port the Robert Yacht of London, from Seilly; The Juffrow Corneliz, of, and for Amsterdam; and the Number Four for Rotterdam, both from Ireland: As also the Fisher of London from Bilbao; and the Gacey of Fishing from Cruising, the latter being a Privateer of 14 Guns.

Comes, September 19. The 17th passed through this Road a small Vessel from Antegoa; and the Thomas of London from Boston, came to an Anchor here.

Yarmouth, September 21. The Light Colliers that sailed out of this Road two or three days ago with their Convoy, were put back by the contrary Winds yesterday; since which, the Weather has been very Tempestuous, and three Vessels are Cast away, two at Laystoffe, and the other as she was coming into this Haven.

Deale, September 20. On the 16th Instant, Sir Martin Beckman, with the Bomb-Vessels, joined Sir Cloudsly Shovel, who Anchored the same day before Calais: The 17th in the morning, it being fair weather, the Bomb-Vessels went in, and threw some Shells into the Town, but it blowing

blowing very fresh towards Evening, and there running a great swell of Sea, they were oblig'd to come off again. That Night, and the 18th and 19th, it continued to blow very hard from the N. W. to the W. which made *Calais* Road very unsafe to our Ships; and some of the small Vessels received some damage in their Masts and Anchors: And yesterday, Sir *Cloudesly Shovell* returned into the *Downes* with his whole Squadron, except Rear-Admiral *Vander Goes*, and the *Sally Rose*, who were forced from their Anchors, and are not yet come in.

Whitehall, September 23. This Evening arrived the Mail from the *Groynes*, by which we have the following Advice:

Madrid, Sept. 19. The Fleet Commanded by Admiral *Russel*, passed by *Milicant* on the 5th Instant with a fair Wind: On the 6th, the *Mary-Galley* came into *Cartagena*, and the same day in the Afternoon, the whole Fleet passed by there, together with the Spanish Men of War, but the Gallies were ordered back to *Cartagena*; And on the 15th, Admiral *Russel* was before *Malaga*. The King of *Spain* has ordered a Refreshment of Oxen, Sheep, Wine, Oil, &c. for the Fleet, which we hear, is to Winter in these Seas. We have an Account from *Catalonia*, that the Marquis de *Conflans*, with the Spanish Army, and a Reinforcement of 3000 new Raised Catalans, was marched to Besiege *Ostalic*, and had already taken the Posts about it; He had with him 12 Pieces of Cannon and 5 Mortars, which they would begin to Play the 4th. The French were marched to attack *Castel Folet* in the Mountains, with which it's believed they will end the Campaign, being reduced to a miserable condition by Sicknes; in-somuch, that their whole Army does not now consist of more than 12000 men, Horse and Foot. The French Fleet was, by our last Advice, still at *Toulon*, where they have laid a strong Chain and Boom cross the Entrance of that Port, for fear of the English Fleet. There has been Publick Notice given at *Cadiz*, that the Galeons shall depart this Year for the *West-Indies*.

There are four Mails due from Holland, including that of Friday last.
