Temp. Capt. John Donal Carroll, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. An observation post had been hit, he immediately went to the spot and attended the wounded, although the enemy continued to concentrate heavy shell fire on the post.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Thomas Cartman, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He showed great coolness and courage in organising the consolidation and defence of the position under very heavy fire. Although wounded, he continued to direct operations until compelled to retire.

2nd Lt. William Victor Cavill, W. York: R. Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, while in command of a small patrol. He remained in the enemy's front line for a considerable time, finally securing a prisoner and important information.

2nd Lt. Leonard Saunders Chamberlen,

Rif. Bde., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the utmost courage and determination under heavy fire. Although wounded and having frost bitten hands, he personally  $\mathbf{and}$ supervised maintained communications throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Morris Tonge Chambers, Linc. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the second wave of his company with great dash and initiative. When held up by an enemy machine gun, he led his men through the wire and charged the gun. Capturing the gun, he turned it on the enemy, causing great execution. He set a fine example to his men.

Lt. James Cottingham Chaplin, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to When commanding the leading squadron of the brigade in the face of heavy shell fire, he continued his advance without hesitation, thereby securing most important positions.

Temp. Lt. James Douglas Chassereau, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He succeeded in cutting the enemy's wire, and although wounded, coolly guided the assaulting parties through gaps. Later, he assisted a wounded officer back to safety. He was himself again wounded.

2nd Lt. Donald Chippindale, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He did exceptionally good work as F.O.O. The trench in which he was posted was shelled continuously. In spite of this he maintained communications, and three times reported the enemy massing for an attack, thus enabling steps to be taken which brought the enemy attack to nothing.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Frederick William Clifton, Linc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He displayed great initiative and courage when part of the attack was held up by uncut wire. Later, under heavy fire, he superintended the consolidating of the objective with utmost skill and gallantry. His example and leading were largely responsible for the success of the enterprise

Lt. John Coburn, R.G.A., attd R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of a survey post close to the front line, and, though subject to almost continuous shell fire for a fortnight and under most trying conditions of weather, he maintained communications throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Gerald Cocks, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination in laying out a line of assembly. Though wounded, he insisted in carrying on the work. This he succeeded in doing under heavy shell and machine gun fire.

2nd Lt. Edwin Stewart Travis Cole, R.F.C.,

Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to On one occasion he, in a scout, attacked and brought down an enemy twoseater biplane. He has brought down two hostile balloons. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. John Henry William Collins, N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to When cut off from all help and attacked by overwhelming numbers, he held out for many hours, and eventually succeeded in joining up with another party.

Temp. Capt. James Alphonsus Conway, M.D., R.A.M.C., attd Ox. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked indefatigably under heavy fire, and by his personal attention saved the lives of a number of men. He set a fine example to all ranks.

Lt. Melville Charles Dymoke Cordeaux,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He displayed the greatest skill and courage when in command of his section in moving his position when they had become untenable. This was always carried out under heavy shell fire. He set a splendid example to those under him.

\*Temp. Capt. Charles Stephan Cowan,

M.M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He caused his armoured car to be driven straight through the enemy trenches, and inflicted heavy loss on the enemy with his machine gun. He has previously done fine work.
