

2nd Lt. John Fenn Roberts, Essex R., and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in getting his machine-guns up to the foremost position captured, whence he brought fire to bear on the enemy, thereby greatly assisting the further advance of the infantry.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Duncan Robertson, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance under heavy shell fire and continuous sniping. In spite of these trying conditions he completed his task and returned with most valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Joseph Rogers, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded he carried several men, who were unable to walk, a distance of nearly a mile to the dressing station over open ground subjected to heavy bursts of shell fire.

2nd Lt. Algernon Winter Rose, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained communication by despatch riders when his signalling equipment had been destroyed by shell fire. Although wounded he worked continuously, showing great courage and determination.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) James Ross, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company most gallantly, and in spite of strong opposition took up an advanced position, from where he was able to complete the rout of the enemy.

2nd Lt. Cecil Rennie Ruddle, Sco. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in a very advanced post with a machine-gun and team when the post was practically surrounded by the enemy. Despite heavy machine-gun and rifle fire, he held the post and eventually drove the enemy off. He displayed the utmost courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. David Alfred Rutherford, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He sent back most valuable reports on the situation, and eventually succeeded in establishing a telephone line in close proximity to the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank Eric Digby Rutter, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great skill and courage to their final objective. He consolidated the position under heavy fire, and later, though wounded, he continued to command until the company was relieved.

2nd Lt. Joseph Ryland-Whitaker, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At great personal risk he extin-

guished a fire, thereby undoubtedly saving a gun and a large quantity of ammunition from destruction.

2nd Lt. Cecil Lawies Sagar-Musgrave, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While in command of a patrol he engaged an enemy party twice his strength, and subsequently succeeded in gaining valuable information.

Temp. Capt. Arthur Paul Saint, R.A.M.C., attd. K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under heavy fire. His devotion to duty saved many lives.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Geoffrey Charles Taylor Salter, E. York. R., Spec. Res., and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his Tank with the greatest skill and gallantry, and although under heavy fire, he cleared a trench of the enemy, which he handed over to the infantry.

Temp. Capt. George Samuel Sansom, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although attacked three times by hostile aircraft, he remained in the air with his balloon at its maximum height, and completed his task. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Capt. Charles Kenneth Scott Moncrieff, K.O.S.B., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men with great courage and determination in the face of heavy fire. Later, although badly wounded, he continued to direct operations and encourage the men until the position was consolidated.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Humphrey Patricius Senhouse, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He behaved with the utmost gallantry in going out under an intense bombardment to the assistance of a wounded officer. Owing to this officer's wounds, he had to crawl with him on his back very slowly to a dug-out some distance away.

Lt. Eric James Shearer, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward 200 yards across the open under heavy fire and succeeded in closing a gap in the front line. Later, he carried out a valuable reconnaissance. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. William George Shipway, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great gallantry and initiative in the face of heavy fire, withdrawing his men to a better position, and holding it with complete success.
