For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a party of bombers and led them forward in the most gallant manner. He was largely responsible for saving a critical situation.

32932 Spr. J. W. McTierman, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while ferrying troops across the river. He steered a pontoon across four times under very heavy fire. He set a fine example to all ranks.

68214 Gnr. A. Mann, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the battery was being heavily shelled by enemy gas shells, he went out and gave the alarm to each dug-out. Finding he could not make himself heard through his gas mask, at great personal risk he removed it.

200573 L. /Cpl. W. B. Marchant, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. The advance being held up by an enemy strong point, he led a support section, and entering the trench dispersed the enemy and put the position in a state of defence. He showed the greatest gallantry and determination throughout.

A.2096 Sjt. C. S. Martin, K.R.R. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When several officers had become casualties he was conspicuous by his gallantry in rallying the company to continue the attack.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When a party of his men were held up by an enemy post, he rushed at it and opened fire, killing several of the enemy and breaking up the post, thus causing the objective to be obtained without further loss.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance in close proximity to the enemy's trenches, and brought back most valuable information.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He singlehanded established a bombing block and maintained his position until reinforced. He displayed marked initiative and coolness throughout the day.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded his tank with the greatest gallantry and skill. He put many enemy machine guns out of action, and took a large number of prisoners. He rendered invaluable assistance to the infantry.
