From the Imperial Camp near Peter-Waradin,
September 13.

ON the 9th Instant, early in the morning, the whole Turkish Army advanced within half a German mile of our Intrenchments; and possessed themselves of all the Highs on this side the Danube; At 10 they pitched their Tents; Their Infantry encamped towards our Front, and their Cavalry and the Tartars towards our Left. About the same time their Fleet, consisting in 110 Vessels, (ten whereof are great ones) came within Cannon Shot of our Gallies and Barks, and ranged themselves in order of Battle; The rest of the day passed in Skirmishes between the Huslars Hungarians and Radziens, and the Turkish Parties and Tartars; and that night a Deserter came to our Camp, and informed us of the Enemies design upon our Bridge of Boats; upon which 300 Horse were commanded to secure it; and all our Baggage was sent over the Danube. On the 10th we expected to be attacked, and therefore put our selves in a readiness, but the Enemy continued quiet in their Camp, having made a Line to cover their Infantry; There happened some Skirmishes, as there had the day before. The 11th about break of day we saw 3 or 400 of the Enemies Standards drawn up behind a Line which they had cast up in the night, within 800 paces of us; and we played upon them both with Cannon and Small Shot. The same day some of the Enemies Troops landed on the other side of the Danube to attack our Baggage, but the alarm being given, they were beaten off and put to flight. About the same time a Deserter came over to us, and several of the French who had deserted the French Army in Germany, went over to the Turks. And this day we laid another Bridge over the Danube. The 12th by break of day the Turks began to play on our Camp with their Cannon from all sides, and their Vessels advanced as far as the Point of the Great Island, and Cannonaded our Bridge of Boats, and our Fleet; From which they were answered in like manner, as also from our Batteries on Land; The Enemy planted two Pieces of Cannon on the point of the Island towards our Left; several others of the French deserted, but two of them were shot by the Watch. This day a Moor came over to us who had formerly served General Piccolomini, and a Christian Slave taken in the *Mores*; Two of our Ammunition Wagons were set on fire by a shot from the Enemy, and about 30 Men were killed by this accident, and Count de Solms Herberstein, Lieutenant Colonel, was killed by a Cannon Shot. The 13th by break of day, the Cannon began to play again on both sides more violently than before; The Turks have planted 4 Pieces of Cannon on the Point of the Island, which we endeavour all we can to dismount from a Battery we have raised on the Waterside. The Turks play upon us with above 500 Pieces of Cannon as well by Land as by Water, though hitherto without any great damage. The Enemies chief design seems to be to destroy our Bridges, that they may the better make their

Inursions on the other side of the Danube; and therefore Orders are sent to our Troops on that side, to guard the Passes, and to the Governor of *Segedin*, to be ready to join them. We hourly expect the Auxiliary Troops of *Brandenburg*, with 4 Regiments commanded by Major General *Pulini*, and with this Reinforcement we hope to give the Turks some difficulty to retreat.

Liege, Sept. 28. The Duke of *Holstein-Plön* arrived the 16th in the Camp before *Huy*; The 17th the place was formally invested; The Count de *Guiscard*, Governor of *Namur*, (who came thither on the 9th to view the several Posts, and to put things into a posture for a long defence) returning towards *Namur* with a Convoy of Dragoons some hours before, having left the Command of the Place in the Hands of *Monieur de Reignac*, who had with him the Regiments of *Poisou*, and *Augustois*, and a Company of Dragoons. The same day the Town of *Huy* was surrendered upon Articles; The Garrison retiring into the Castle and the Forts; and two of our Battalions entering into the Town. At night we began to work on our Batteries, the Enemy all the while making a great fire with their Cannon and Mortars, though with little effect; They made a Sally the same day, but were quickly beaten back with loss. The 21th the Trenches were opened; and our Batteries being finished, they began to play the 22th in the morning, and the same was continued with such success, that they beat down the Enemies Batteries; and dismounted their Cannon. The 23d at night the Trenches were advanced to the Foot of the Counterescarp of Fort *Picard*, and two other Batteries were finished, on which, and those before-mentioned, were planted 60 Pieces of Cannon, and 20 Mortars. The 24th it was resolved to Storm Fort *Picard*, and the *Red Fort*; and accordingly the *Brandenburgers* who were upon the Guard that day, prepared every thing for the assault, which they began between 3 and 4 in the Afternoon, and by 5 they were Masters of the said Forts, those that defended them being put to the Sword, except some few that were made Prisoners, together with *Monieur de Condron* who commanded in the *Red Fort*: The *Brandenburgers* lost in this occasion about 20 Men, with a Major of the Guards. After this our Troops made their approaches towards the Castle, and carried on the attack with such vigor, that the Governor and Garrison fearing a Storm, Capitulated yesterday in the Afternoon, and the Place was to be surrendered this morning.

Brussels, Sept. 29. The Elector of *Bavaria* has given the Government of *Audenarde*, vacant by the death of the Count de *Liberchies*, to the Count de *Thian*, who commands at present our Flying Camp near *Wacquen*. The Elector of *Cologne* is gone to see the Cities of *Bruges*, *Ostend*, and *Newport*; and will return in a short time to *Liege*. Besides *Deynse*, *Dixmuyde*, *Ninove*, and *Grammont*, 'tis said the Allies intend to fortifie *Hall* and *Engbrien*, and several small Castles, by which means our Frontiers will be much more advanced into the Enemies Country than they were the last Winter. 'Tis said also, that they have resolved to fortifie several Posts on the Frontiers of *Liege*, to cover that Country against the Enemies Inursions.

Hague, October 1. The States-General received yesterday by Express from the Duke of *Holstein-Plön*, an Account of the Surrender of the Castle of *Huy*; The Garrison beat a Parley the 27th about Two in the Afternoon; upon which Hostages were Exchanged, and the following Capitulation was made and signed the same day.

ARTICLES demanded by *Monieur de Reignac* commanding in *Huy*; with those that were granted thereupon by the Duke of *Holstein-Plön*, who commanded the Forces of the Allies.

I. That the Garrison shall march out with Arms and Baggage, Drums beating, Colours flying, March lighted at both ends, and pass through the Breach.

Granted.

II.
That they shall take with them two Pieces of Cannon, and two Brass Mortars, that are in the place, as the Sieur de Reignac shall choose.
Refused.

III.
That the said Garrison, with the Officers of the Artillery, Commissaries, Engineers, Miners, Chirurgions, &c. and generally all such that are employed for the Kings Service in the said Castle, shall march out to-morrow morning at Nine a Clock, with the said Sieur de Reignac, and shall be conducted by Water to Namur, with their Baggage, Equipage, and the Wounded and Sick Men, at the Charge of the Allies. That they shall be furnished with Boats, Boatmen, and Horses, and a Convoy of 100 Horses for their security, who shall be ready to-morrow by Nine in the morning, that they may arrive the same day at Namur.

There shall be Boats provided for the Baggage, and for the Wounded and Sick Men, that are in a Commission to leave the place: The Garrison, as well as the other Persons mentioned in this Article, shall march on foot to Namur by the shortest way, with a Convoy, and shall march out to-morrow, at Nine in the morning at farthest.

IV.
That the Sick Men, who cannot be removed, shall remain in the Town, and shall be lookt to at the Charge of the Allies, till they are in a condition to rejoin their Regiments; and they are to be furnished with sufficient Passports at their return.

Granted.

V.
The Soldiers that have Deserted, shall not be molested on either side.

Refused.

VI.
That all the Officers and Soldiers, which have been made Prisoners during the Siege, shall be Released without Ransom.

Granted for the Prisoners of the Castle only.

VII.
That no Officer or Soldier shall be stopp'd for Debt, or any other Cause, no more than those who are in the Castle, and are compris'd in the said Capitulation.

This Article shall be observed in the same manner, as was practis'd by the French when they took Huy; that is to say, For what concerns the Officers that are Indebted to the Burgbers, the Governour shall oblige himself to cause the same to be paid.

VIII.
That there shall not be demanded, or expected, any Restitution of the Provisions, which may have been taken in the Town, or the Neighbouring Villages, and brought into the Castle, or carried elsewhere.

Granted.

IX.
The Baggage of the Officers and Soldiers that march out, shall not be visited or prejudic'd.

Granted.

X.
After the Capitulation is fully Executed, the Hostages shall be returned on both sides.

This shall be done.

XI.
When this Capitulation is Signed, the Duke of Holstein shall cause the Gate of the Castle, where there is a Draw-bridge, to be secured by 50 Men.

The Gate of the Castle shall be delivered up this day, and secured by 100 Men, and the Magazines shall be left in the same condition they are at present, and the Mines shall be faithfully discovered, and shew'd to the Hostages.

Done the 27th of September.

In pursuance of this Capitulation, 100 Men took possession the same Evening of the Gate of the Castle.

Falmouth, Sept. 24. Yesterday came into this Port from Cruising on the Coasts of Biscay and Galicia a Dutch Privateer of 18 Guns, called the *Sommer of Middleburg*, who had lately taken four French Prizes, two of them laden with Wooll and Rozin, one with Fish, and the fourth with Tobacco and Indigo from the *West-Indies*, and sent them to Galicia.

Farmouth, Sept. 28. Yesterday and this morning passed through our Road to the Southward abut 200 Sail of London Colliers with their Convoy.

Deal, Sept. 29. Sir *Cloudesly Shovel* continues in the Downs with the Ships under his Command, Admiral *Alderman*, and Vice-Admiral *Seley*, sailed this morning for *Flores*. We have Advice, that the *Sally-Rose* is put into the *West-Indies*.

London, Sept. 28. On the 26th Instant was launched at Mr. *Fowlers* Yard at *Rotherhithe*, a Sixth Rate Frigate of 26 Guns called the *Drake*; and another the 27th at Mr. *Haydon's* Yard at *Limn-House*, called *The Sea-Horse*.

London, Sept. 29. Yesterday *John Sweetapple*, and *William Coles*, Esquires, were at the *Guildhall* Sworn Sheriffs of *London* and *Middlesex* for the year ensuing; and this day the Common Hall met, and unanimously Elected Sir *Thomas Lane* Kt. one of the Aldermen, to be Lord Mayor of this City; being all Persons of known Ability, and Affection to Their Majesties Government.
