Naples, September 14.

ON the 8th Instant about Noon an Earthquake happened in this City, which lasted several minutes, and another in the Evening, but not so violent as the former; which so frightened the Inhabitants, that they ran in Crowds into the open Fields; Several Churches and Houses were much shattered; but the damage was greater in several Provinces of this Kingdom, where the Earthquake happened about the same time, and threw down divers Churches, Castles, and Private Houses, several Persons of Quality being buried under their Ruines, among whom are the Governor of *Sr. Angelo*, and the Duchess *de la Guardia Caraccioli*, with her two Sons, and most of her Family. We hear from *Sicily*, that there have likewise happened, since the beginning of this month, several Earthquakes near *Catanea*, but they were not so violent as to do any great damage. We are told also, that Mount *Atna* has within these few days cast out vast quantities of Ashes, and a kind of black Sand, which has covered the Country round about the thickness of half a foot, and spoild all the Fruits on the Ground.

Rome, Sept. 18. The Congregation for the business of *Lige* met again this morning, and having fully considered the several Papers presented to them concerning the same, did unanimously confirm the Election of Prince *Clement of Bavaria*, Elector of *Cologne*, to that Bishoprick; which being approved by the Pope, Expresses were immediately dispatched, with an account thereof, to his Electoral Highness, and the Popes Nuncio at *Cologne*. The Minister of the Duke of *Savoy* at this Court has had Audience of the Pope, to desire the Revocation of the Decree made by the Inquisition here against the Edict lately published by his Royal Highness in favour of the *Vaudois*, which decree his Royal Highness has forbidden to be published within his Territories upon pain of death: The great Rains occasioned this week the overflowing of the *Tybre*, which has done much mischief.

Genova, Septemb. 20. We hear that the Difference between this Republick and the Governor of *Milan* about the Salt Business, is finally adjusted. *Don Francisco de Mols* arrived here some days ago with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*, and has had his publick Audience of the Senate. We have an account of the death of the Duke of *Modena*, and that his Uncle the Cardinal *d'Este* has, as his Successor, taken upon him that Government with a design to quit the Cardinalship, and to Marry. This week parted from hence 4 great Vessels laden with Corn (which the French continue to buy up in these parts) for *Provence*.

Venice, Sept. 24. The Senate have received no Letters from the Caprain General since his depar-

ture from *Napoli di Romania*, but by the way of *Ragusa* they have advice, that our Fleet came the 18th of the last month before *Metelin*, an Island in the *Archipelago* (which formerly belonged to the Venetians, and was taken from them by *Mahomet* the 2d) and having landed their Forces, had begun to attack the Fortress of that name, both by Sea and Land; However this news not coming from hands we can depend upon, we must expect the confirmation of it. We have advice from the *Morea*, that the Turks, to make use of the advantage which they thought the absence of the Venetian Army gave them, were advanced with 7 or 8000 Foot and 4000 Horse towards the Isthmus of *Corinth*, in order to attack the Works that have been lately raised there by the Venetians for the security of that Pass, but found them in so good a condition, and our Troops that are posted there under the command of Major General *Niebieli*, so well provided to receive them, that they did not think fit to make any attempt, but retired again to their Quarters. Several new raised Troops are come to the *Lido*, and will Embark on the Convoy which is now making ready for the *Levant*, and may sail by the end of this month.

Vicima, Sept. 29. Our last Letters from the Imperial Army near *Peter-Waradin*, are of the 23d, which give an account of the arrival of the Brandenburg Forces, and of the four Imperial Regiments of Horse commanded by Major General *Polland*, making together about 8000 Men; Our Troops were in a good condition, and very well supplied with Provisions; our Cannon had played with such good effect upon the Enemy, that it had obliged them to quit the Island, (from whence they endeavoured to annoy our Bridge) after having ruined the Batteries they had raised upon the Point of it; and their Fleet was so exposed to our Shot, that they were forced to retire to a greater distance; Most of the Imperial Horse was encamped on the other side of the *Danube* for the conveniency of Forage; and to hinder the Enemies landing on that side. The Ban of *Croatia*, with the Forces under his command, is marching in order to give the Enemy a Diversion; and we are told that General *Veterani* marches towards the *Danube*, having left General *Heister* to command those Troops that remain in *Transilvania* for the security of the Passes on that Frontier. Major General *Rabutin* is arrived here from *Piedmont*, and has given the Emperor an account of the State of Affairs on that side.

Hailbron, Octob. 4. The Confederate Army commanded by Prince *Lewis of Baden*, is now encamped at *Momickensturn*, from whence the Baron *de Freydenburgh* was detached two days ago with

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1000 Horse, and several hundred Foot. A great quantity of Corn; part of what the Imperialists brought over the Rhine with them, is put into the Magazine here, and the heavy Artillery is returned to this place. The Marechal de Lorge is encamped between Landau and Philipsbourg, and 'tis reported that he intends, about the 24th of this month, to return towards Paris. The burning of the great Magazine of Hay at Strasbourg is confirmed.

Mentz, Octob. 5. The Forces of Hesse, Munster, and Wolfenbuttel, encamped the first Instant about half a German Mile from this City, and on the 2d they all repass'd the Rhine here, and lie at present in the Villages near that River, where it's believed they will continue till they go into their Winter-Quarters. The Bridge of Boats which was removed some days ago towards Oppenheim, is brought back to Costheim.

Hamburg, Octob. 8. The Letters from Poland inform us, that the Electors of Bavaria would set out the 10th Instant towards Flanders, taking her Journey by the way of Dantzick and Steirn. The King of Denmark arriv'd the 27th of the last month at Rensbourg, and having stay'd there some days, went to Gluckstadt, from whence it's believed He will return to Copenhagen. The Disorders that were at first begun in this City by the difference between *Herbicus* and *Meyer*, are not yet compos'd; The Burghers met again yesterday, and presented several demands to the Magistrates relating to those matters, which they not agreeing to, the Burghers broke up their Assembly at 5 this morning, and resolv'd to meet again on Monday next.

Liege, Octob. 8. We have an account from Huy, that they were at work to repair the Fortifications of Fort Picard, the Red Fort, and the Castle; and that of the Troops which were employed in the late Siege, the Cavalry, with 6 Battalions, and some Field Pieces, were march'd towards Luxemburg, and 'twas said they would possess themselves of *La Roche*, in order to enlarge their Winter-Quarters on that side; The rest of the Forces are march'd back to their Quarters, except those that are gone into Garrison at Huy. The Elector of Cologne, our new Bishop, is expected here in few days.

Dublin, Oct. 3. The Dolphin Frigate, Captain Stepany Commander, is sail'd from hence to Convey some outward-bound Merchant Ships. On the 27th of the last month sail'd from Kinsale the *Speedwell* of London, with above 300 French Prisoners for *St. Malo*. They write from Derry of the 29th, that the day before arriv'd in that Harbour the *America* of *Plimouth* laden with Tobacco from *Virginia*.

Deale, Octob. 9. The Captain, Crown, and Dover, with several Dutch Men of War, are sail'd from hence to the Gunfleet. Just now are come in two Dutch Men of War, with divers Merchant Ships from *Holland*.

London, Octob. 10. Yesterday was Launched at Their Majesties Yard at Chatham a new Hulk named the *Chatham* Hulk, which exceeds all that have been before built of that kind.
