Capt. (now Temp. Maj.) Ronald Hugh Macdonald, Can. A.M., Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. One of our aeroplanes was shot down, the observer was wounded and pinned beneath the wreck. This officer and a bearer went out in full view of the enemy, who were shelling the machine, and extricated the wounded man and removed him to safety. He himself was severely wounded while doing so.

Lt. Merrill Whedon Macdowell, Can. Mtd. Rifles.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great courage and skill in spite of severe losses, to within fifty yards of his objective, and maintained his position, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy in a counter-attack.

Lt. John Fullerton Macintosh, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. As transport officer he displayed the greatest courage and determination in bringing up supplies to the front line. He had consistently to lead his train through heavy shell fire over exposed ground, and throughout rendered most valuable service.

Lt. Kenneth Royal MacKinnon, Can. Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his signallers to the objective under heavy fire, and quickly established communication. Throughout the action, by his courage and tenacity, these communications were maintained, thereby rendering invaluable service.

Capt. Robert James Manion, Can. A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While going forward through a heavy hostile barrage to establish an aid post, he at great personal risk stopped and dressed alone nine wounded men.

Lt. John Melville Massey, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great gallantry and determination when leading a raiding party. Although wounded, his example so encouraged the men that they succeeded, under heavy fire, in reaching their objective.

Capt. James Ernest Matthews, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the attack with the greatest courage, and showed marked ability in reorganising them after heavy casualties and in consolidating his position. His judgment and skill during a subsequent advance of 2,500 yards enabled him to establish contact with the enemy without casualties.

Lt. Frank Randolph May, Can. Garr. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His observation work was carried out under heavy shell fire, and as battery signalling officer he laid and maintained lines under heavy fire with the greatest coolness and ability.

Lt. Herbert Daniel McDonald, Can. Garr. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. As forward observation officer his conduct and disregard for danger under fire was a wonderful example to the other officers of his battery, and his work was consistently of the greatest value.

Lt. William Alan McGregor, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great skill through heavy artillery barrage. When seriously wounded he refused to be attended to until the men of his platoon had been seen first.

Lt. Ernest Hanbury Minns, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion. He led a daring reconnaissance, and obtained valuable information. Later, he volunteered to take a stretcher-bearer party to the front line over heavily shelled ground, and was of the greatest assistance in clearing the wounded. No work was too dangerous for him.

Lt. Lucien Georges Morissette, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a small party against an enemy post, capturing it and two machine guns. His prompt action removed a serious obstacle and saved many casualties.

Lt. Dudley Anson Gordon Parsons, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great courage and success. His splendid example in the face of stubborn resistance largely assisted in the capture of the objective.

Capt. Alphonse Gustave Routier, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed untiring energy and skill in preparing his company for the attack. During the assault he gave an example of great coolness and courage to his men, and held and controlled them with splendid determination.

Lt. Edward Stanley Sawell, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of the company, and, despite further opposition, he rallied his men under heavy fire, and, rushing the position, captured thirty prisoners and two machine guns. He undoubtedly saved a serious situation.
