Leghorn, October 11.

THE French Fleet was on the 5th Instant still at Toulon, having taken on board 4000 Men, and 'twas said 6000 more were embarking for Catalonia. There continues to be a great want of Corn in the French Territories.

Turin, Oct. 11. Three Regiments came hither the last week from the Duke of Savoy's Camp; two of which are since marched to Coni. Some Regiments are likewise sent to Trin and other places, where they are to remain in Garrison this Winter, and the rest of our Army continues encamped at Chivas, from whence his Royal Highness went some days ago towards the Valley of Aouff to view the Passes on that side, and his chief Engineer is likewise gone thither, to give Directions, as 'tis thought, about some new Fortifications that are designed to be made there. The Spanish Forces passed the Po on the 6th Instant near this place, and are marched towards Milan, whither the Marquis de Leganez went from hence on the 9th, having before adjusted with the Minister of Genoa the Difference that has been depending for some time between that Republick and the Spaniards about the selling of Salt at Final. The Duke of Savoy is expected again to day or to morrow in his Camp at Chivas, from whence he will go and visit the Garrisons of Coni, and Demont, and return hither about the 15th or 16th of this month; by which time 'tis probable the rest of the Forces will be separating and going into their Winter Quarters. The French Troops have quitted the Hills about Dibleon, and have begun to file off towards Provence; and we are told that the Marechal de Catinat will suddenly return to Paris. The Vaudois continue to make frequent Incursions upon the Enemy with good success.

Venice, Oct. 16. The great Convoy designed for the Levant is still detained here by the contrary Winds. The last Advices from Dalmatia confirm the former News of the Turks having again drawn their Forces together on the Frontiers of that Countrey, but tell us withal, that 'twas not believed they would venture to make any new attempt upon Giulet, seeing that place is, by the Care of the Proveditors General Desjio, put into a very good posture of defence.

Vienna, Oct. 16. The Letters from Hungary do all say, that the Grand Visier with the whole Turkish Army re-passed the Save on the 5th and 6th of this month, being diminished one third part by Sicknes, and the losses they had suffered. The Tartars had left them in much discontent, and were marching home. The Imperial Army had passed the Danube at Peter-Waradin, and was encamped near Feusack to refresh themselves, having many sick Men in their Camp. General Veterani, who commands the Emperor's Forces in Transilvania, was advanced to the River Mura, and will doubtless observe the Tartars in their Retreat, and make use of any opportunity that may offer to attack them. In the mean time an Express has been dispatched from hence to General Caprara with Directions about the Winter-Quarters for the Imperial Troops. There is still a Discourse, that a Detachment will be made to attack Guala.

Frankfort, Oct. 23. Prince Lewis of Baden being informed that some French Troops were moving towards the Black-Forest, to prevent any design they might have of posting themselves there, he detached two Regiments of Foot and one of Dragoons, who marched thither on the 11th Instant under the command of Major General Spitzberg. The 12th the Confederate Army decamped from Munchenhausen, and marched to Kretzingen, the 13th to Gundelshin, and the 14th to Eppingem, where they rested the 15th to give time to their Artillery and Baggage (which could not march so fast by reason of the badness of the Ways) to rejoin them; and on the 16th they encamped near Haidheim, where part of the Army still continues,

the rest being marched to several Garisons. Prince Lewis is gone to Gantzburg, where the Count de Hohenlo has met him, with Directions from the Emperor about settling the Winter Quarters. The French Troops are all separated; The Marechal de Lorge and most of the French General Officers, are at present at Strasburg; whither the Marechal de Joyeuse (who has sent those Troops that lately marched with him towards Simmeren, to their Winter Quarters on the Saar and the Moselle) is gone likewise.

Cologne, Oct. 26. Four Regiments of Brandenburg Horse, and 4 Battalions of Foot, are marching this way from the Meuse, being to Winter in this Diocesis, the Upper-Rhine both Armies are separated, and gone into their Winter-Quarters.

Paris, Oct. 25. The Letters from Toulon tell us, that Monsieur de Benjen parted from thence on the 8th of this month, with 8 Men of War and some Fire-ships, on which were embarked several Regiments designed for Catalonia; and that the Marechal de Tourville set sail with the rest of the Fleet on the 10th, but met with such Tempestuous Weather, that many of our Ships were obliged to return to Toulon, having lost their Masts, and received other considerable damage; and there is a report, that the whole Fleet was come back, of which we must expect the certainty by our next Letters: The 6 Gallies they had with them were come to a place called La Tour du Bouc; the other 24 being returned to Marseilles, where they are laid up. Several Expresses have been lately dispatched to the Marechal de Tourville, occasioned by the different Advices of Admiral Russell's Motions in the Mediterranean, which do very much perplex the Ministers here; and 'tis talk'd, that the last Orders sent him were to continue at Toulon, but that they came too late to prevent his sailing. The Marechal de Noailles, has represented the ill condition of the French Forces under his Command in Catalonia, and how much they are weakened since the beginning of this Campaign; so that the Regiments which are sent thither from Provence, seem rather to be designed to recruit the Army, than to undertake any new Enterprize. Though there cannot be found Buyers for the multitude of new Offices which have been already erected, yet they are necessitated here to have recourse still to the same Methods to raise Money; for this week was published an Edict, creating a great many new Offices to look after the Magazines of Salt in every Town. 'Tis said that another Edict is coming out, laying a Tax upon all Persons that have Fountains in their Houses; and a third appointing Commissioners to Examine the Accounts of all Persons that have been employed in Payments of Money belonging to the Marine since the year 1658. We are told, that to encourage the rebuilding of Diepe, the French King has promised an Exemption of Taxes for 10 years to such as shall undertake the same.

Brussels, Oct. 27. The Elector of Cologne parted from hence the last week for Liege, where he intended to make his publick Entry this day. The Pope at the same time he confirmed his Election to that Bishoprick, declared those of Frisingen and Ratisbon, which he held before, vacant, and has given leave to the Canons of those Churches to proceed to an Election of two new Bishops; The same Bull requires also, that his Electoral Highness shall for the Management of the Spiritual Affairs of the Bishoprick of Liege, chose a Deputy out of the Body of the Canons to be approved of by the Pope. On the 22th and 23th Instant 10 Dutch Battalions, and 5 Regiments of Spanish Horse, came to this place, where they are to continue all the Winter; by which our Garison is compleated to 13 Battalions of Foot, and 12 Regiments of Horse. The Forces of the Allies are all gone into their Winter-Quarters.
