Rome, October 9.

**T**HE Duke of Savoy's Minister at this Court has given in a long Memorial, by which he presses the Pope to revoke the Decree of the Inquisition against his Royal Highness's Edict in favour of the Vaudois, but has yet received no Answer to it. Here is much talk of a new promotion of Cardinals, to which the Pope seems to be the more inclined, that he may, among others, gratifie Don Livio Odescalchi, Nephew to Innocent XI. who now desires that Dignity, which he formerly refused.

Milan, October 12. The Armies in Piedmont are going to their Winter Quarters, and the Marquis de Leganes, our Governor, is on his return hither. The German Troops are to have their Quarters again in the Territories of the Dukes of Mantua, Parma, and other Princes, who hold Fiefs of the Empire, and Commissaries are appointed to provide all things necessary for them in their march thither. By some Persons that came lately from Casal, we are assured, that the Garison of that place is very much diminished, and that they suffer extremely by the scarcity of Provisions, and want of their Pay, which they have not received in many months.

Venice, October 16. The last Advices from the Levant inform us, that the Venetian Fleet lay still near the Island of Andros; several days having been spent in getting together the Ships that were scattered by the great Storm they met with at their entrance into the Archipelago, and in repairing the damage they had sustained. The Captain General had received notice, that the Turkish Fleet was ordered to sail from Constantinople, and had sent out several small Frigats to observe them; But the Winter season coming on, the Auxiliary Gallies had represented, that 'twas time for them to return home; however they had been prevailed with to continue with the Fleet some time longer, to see whether an opportunity would offer of coming to an Engagement with the Enemy at Sea, or making an attempt upon some of their Islands in the Archipelago. We are told from Dalmatia, that the Turks, who were drawn together on the Frontiers of that Country, are separated and returned to their Quarters, the ill condition they found their Troops to be in discouraging them from making a second attempt upon Cyclus, which seem'd to be the design of their coming into the Field; and that General Delfino seeing nothing was to be apprehended from the Enemy, has likewise dispersed the Forces which he began to assemble in order to oppose them.

Vicenza, October 16. The Winter Quarters being fixed for the Imperial Forces, and an Express dispatched to General Caprara with the repartition of them, the Army, which by our last Letters

from Hungary, was encamped near Fusacke to refresh themselves, will shortly separate, and the principal Commanders return hither. All the Advices from the Frontiers make mention of the great discouragement the Turks are under by the ill success of this Campagne, in which they had at least promised themselves the re-taking of Peter-Waradin; 'Tis confirmed that they have lost almost a 3d part of their Army; and that the Cham of Taryary is gone home in great discontent; and 'twas believed the Complaints he had sent to the Port against the Visir, would occasion his Disgrace. We are told from Transilvania, that General Venterani was going likewise to put his Troops into Winter Quarters.

Liege, October 26. The Elector of Cologne, our new Bishop, arrived in the Suburbs of this City the 23d at night, and lodged in the Convent of St. Leonard, where he was Complimented by Count Serclaes of Tilly, General of the Troops of Liege, by the great Dean, and the rest of the Chapter, and the 24th in the afternoon his Electoral Highness made his publick Entry here with much solemnity. The Brandenburg Troops which have been raising Contributions in the Duchy of Luxemburgh, are marched to their Winter-Quarters.

Madrid, October 13. The Letters from Alicant of the 4th Instant give an account, that Admiral Russell had been ill of a Fever, but was perfectly recovered, after having been several days ashore at that place, and designed to return on board on the 6th, in order to sail with the Fleet; which had in the mean time been as far as Minorca, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Aylmer, to look after the French, and came to an Anchor again before Alicant on the 2d of this month. The Enemies Fleet, according to the last Advice we have of them, was still at Toulon. We are told that 6 Dutch Privateers cruising lately near Malta, came up with two French Men of War, one of 60, and the other of 44 Guns, being Convoy to four Merchant Ships richly laden from Smirna, and fought them several hours; that the biggest of the Men of War was so ill treated in the Fight, that he was forced to bear away for Malta, to save himself; and that the Privateers took the other, together with the 4 Merchant Ships. There arrived at Alicant the 27th past the Dragon Man of War, with the Leopard, and Oxendowne, Merchant Ships, from Messina, who say, that the Turkey Convoy failed by that place some time before with a fair Wind. The 17th of this month arrived at Cadix Thirteen Sail of Dutch Merchant Ships, with a Genouese, from Amsterdam. Here is a Discourse, that the Conde de Benavente, first Conde of Spain; The Marquis de Villena Viceroy of Catalonia; The Duke of Medina Sidonia; and the Conde de San Estevan Viceroy of Naples will suddenly be declared Counsellors of State.

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
